## WE HAD A GLORIOUS TRIP— ALSO A CASE OF MEASLES

The editor and family left here over land for Post City, December 21, with the rain pattering down on the car. We aimed to have returned the next Saturday, December 29th, but that is another story.

About two miles this side of Mr. Nobles' place in Lynn county, the service car driver, Mr. John King, got his shift hung in low, and we poked along in low nearly to Tahoka when we met a garage man who unhooked us. We might have become grouchy had it not been that we had a "Colonel" from Kentucky and a Baptist preacher for balast. The latter was especially in a lively mood, as he was on his way home to spend the holidays, but if the Kentuckian had any julep, or any use for any, he did not divulge.

The 20th being an ideal day, the Lynn and Garza county people had dragged their roads, and it being raining constantly, we just as constantly slid from one side of the highway to the other. But we got there about 2:30 instead of 11:00 as is usually made, but as luck would have it the train was also some two hours late, and we had ample time to purchase tickets, arriving in the city of Sweetwater after dark. As breakfast was our last meal our order at a cafe was a long time preparing it seemed to us.

Here we had ample occasion to compare the services of another railroad to our own unequal Santa Fe, and we hate to tell you our honest, unspeakable comparison. In the Santa Fe stations and coaches, everything was warm, clean and snug, but the end of the depot of the other road had no windows, no steam in the radiators, and the icy wind and rain beat unmercifully upon the passengers who waited and shivered for trains five hours late. After the delayed train finally arrived, the rear coaches never got warm and the passengers huddled about all night in overcoats and wraps with a foul smell of unsanitary toilets permeating their nostrils. We arrived in Fort Worth at 11:45 instead of six something, and almost famished again.

A nice time was had at our brother, J. T. Stricklin's home until Monday, when we took the interurban for Cleburne, near which lives our farmer brother. Most of our time there was spent in hunting, eating and sleeping, having taken Christmas dinner with our brother's wife parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Benton, pioneers of Johnson county, and it was a dinner and we don't mean maybe. Another large gobble with all the trimmings was slaughtered the next day at Bro. M'feks Stricklin's home, and by that time we almost needed medical attention. On top of the big dinner, our little daughter broke out with measles, and our real troubles began keeping her in bed, but she did remarkably well, and we were on our road to Fort Worth Monday A. M. While we were in Johnson county

we had the good fortune to renew acquaintance with old friends of by gone years, and many of them are very much interested in Terry and other south Plains counties, and it would not surprise us to see many of them top the cap rock in the next few months. Of course we did not talk Terry much—we never do(?)

After getting back to the Fort, our brother kept us pretty well on the go with the sights of the city, theatres, and Lake Worth. We saw Bill Hart in his latest picture at the Hypodrome Monday night, and matinee at the Majestic Tuesday. We drove out to Lake Worth Tuesday morning and had a winter view of the bathing beaches, but it was too cold that day to thank about any water-nymphs—they are all in Florida or California for the winter, we guess. Our nephew has an interest in a private camp in about a half mile of the beaches, and we saw fish heads hanging on poles around the camp that would not go in a churn. He made us several pressing invitations to come next summer and fish all we want—and we want to, but we have our reason—perhaps our bankers could tell you the best one. But man! we would like to pull out a few of those "cats."

We took a street car from Polly in time to take the 10:30 out but it went out at 10:20 and we barely got there in time. About ten miles west of Weatherford we waited four hours for a freight wreck to be cleared and it was then we found that we were one of the sunshine special that should have left Fort Worth at 3:00 in the afternoon. The Santa Fe held their train a half hour for us next morning and we made it into Post and later home in the usual time to the best and fastest growing section of Texas. We left cotton patches that were black and long since harvested the day before, and found many still white here and the gins running almost night and day. There the harvest is over and the money all spent. Here the bank deposits are climbing near the million dollar mark.

Folks, every time we make a trip down there, we are better pleased in Brownfield, Texas. We called on Lee Thompson and family while in the Fort. They were all well, but they are thinking of returning here as he says work in the carpenter line is getting rather scarce down there.

## OVER 8,000 BALES WEIGHED IN TERRY COUNTY

We made a round of the yards here Wednesday and called the Bank of Meadow over the phone and found that the three cotton yards of the county had weighed the following amount of cotton this year:

Union yard, city.....	3872
Meadow yard, Meadow.....	2600
Total.....	8316

The gins are all crowded and the three here are running all night.

## CONTRACT LET FOR THEATRE BUILDING ON NORTH SIDE

These are experienced movie men and the fact that they have bought the show will guarantee the best productions of the movie world that can be brought to a town the size of Brownfield.

Another picture machine will be added so that a continuous picture can be run, and the house will be nicely seated with regular opera chairs, and be made into an up-to-date theatre.

Mr. Brown, the contractor is fixing to move to Brownfield, and not being able to rent a house, may build a neat little home for himself, thus adding another good family to the town.

## CITY COUNCIL EXTENDS THE FIRE LIMITS

At a recent meeting of the city dads, the fire limits of Brownfield were extended 1000 feet each way, which means three blocks each way, and for instance, will put the limit west across the railroad, and a proportionate distance each other way from the square. This was on account of the town growing so fast that it was feared that the business district outside the old fire limit would soon fill up with combustible buildings and become a menace to the whole town. They have also recently purchased a large fuel tank for the light engine that will hold a car of fuel. We also note that they have a chemical fire engine at the light plant, but just where they will use it or not in the near future, we do not know, as it does not seem to be ready for work.

## THIEVES GET 900 LBS. COTTON FROM LOCAL FARMER

G. M. Horn was in town Tuesday and reported that some parties in a truck had entered one of his cotton fields Monday night and loaded 900 pounds of cotton he had on the ground and drove off north with it.

It seems that they had finished a bale in that field during the day, and carried it to the gin, and had finished the field about night, leaving some over 900 on the ground, and the truck driver must have discovered it on the ground that afternoon. Officers have a good description of the hind tires on the truck, and are making an effort to locate it. Nine hundred lbs. of seed cotton is worth something these days.

## BROWNFIELD TO GET GIN OF 100 BALE CAPACITY

McDonald & Stith, of Abilene have purchased lots and machinery, and will start erection within 30 days to build a gin outfit with the very latest type of cleaning machinery to take care of 100 bales of cotton per day.

These men are experienced in the gin business and noted for building the best gins that can be bought. The site for the new plant will be just north of the cotton yard.

The total cost of this plant will be around \$40,000.00. This will give Brownfield 4 gins next season.

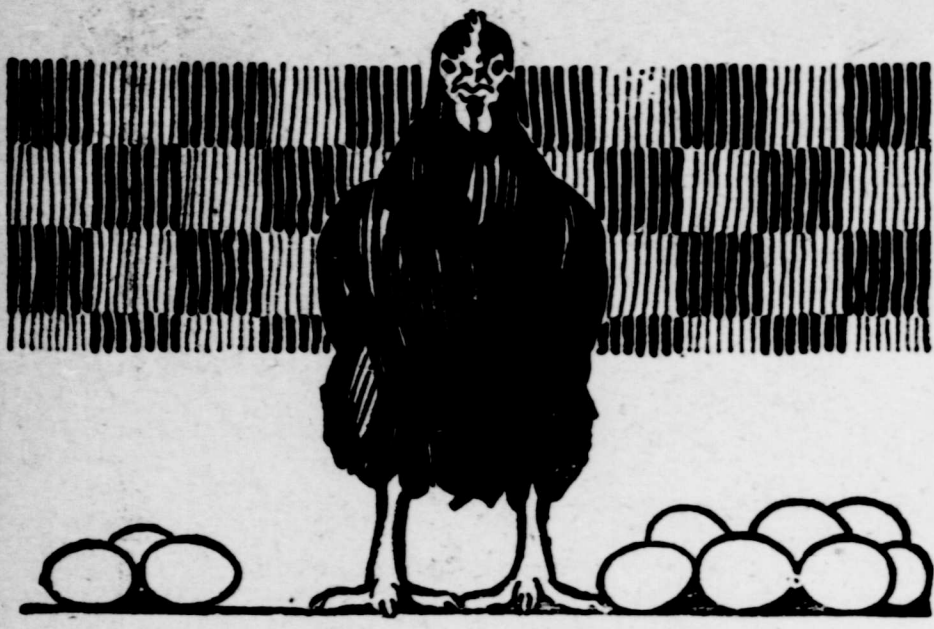

**THROTTLING NEW INDUSTRIES**

A recent decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission which denied the Virginia Railway permission to construct a one-mile extension to new coal mines on the ground that there are already too many soft coal mines in operation, carries a powerful message to thinking people.

Under the "public convenience and necessity" principle, regulatory bodies, both state and national, have prohibited the building of competing public utilities and transportation lines where adequate service was already being rendered. The theory for this was that if the state regulated rates of public utilities on one hand, they should protect them from needless and unjust competition on the other.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has gone a step further and virtually denied the right of an industry such as coal mining to open up a new property. On the same theory it might deny a common carrier permission to build a spur into a wheat country, a fruit section, a sawmill or new mine on the ground that there was an overproduction of the commodity which contemplated new development.

It would seem that this is a dangerous precedent to establish. It means the discouragement of new business and eventually the shortage of certain commodities with resulting high price to consumers. The Commission's act may have been justified in the present case but it should not have the power to place its judgment above all others in saying what new industry maybe built up.

The License fees in Texas on automobiles for the year 1924 is changed from what they have been heretofore, and the fees are by horsepower rating; also by weight. The horsepower fee on passenger autos is 17 1/2c per rated horse-power with a minimum fee of \$4.00.

The weight fees are:  
Class 1—1 to 2,000 lbs, 40c per cwt  
Class 2—2001 to 3500 lbs 50c per cwt  
Class 3—3501 to 4500 lbs, 60c per cwt

Class 4—4501 and up, 75c per cwt  
Commercial Motor Vehicles: The horse power fee is 17 1/2c per rated H.P. with minimum fee of \$4.00.

The weight fee is determined by the weight of the truck, plus the carrying capacity, equipped with pneumatic tires as follows:

Class 1—1 to 6000 lbs, 30c per cwt.  
Class 2—6001 to 8000 lbs, 40c per cwt  
Class 3—8001 to 10,000 lbs, 50c per cwt.

Solid tires 10c per cwt, additional in each class.

On and after the 1st of February 1924, there will be added a 25 per cent penalty on all cars that have been used during the year 1924.
