BACKWARD CHILDREN COSTLY TO STATE

Recent Survey Shows One State
Paid \$25,000 in Year for
"Repeaters."

Retarded school children in one mid-western state last year cost that state \$25,000, according to figures given out at the headquarters of the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, in St. Louis, after an investigation of the health of the school children in that state. These children were what are known as "repeaters," that is, children who failed to pass their examinations and had to be sent back to do over again the work that had not been successfully done.

Only 3 per cent of these children were backward because of mental defects. The rest had physical defects, easily corrected, but which acted on their mental capacity and their bodily strength to do the school work. Of those who underwent some treatment for the correction of their physical deficiencies every one without an exception caught up in his or her class and kept up with the rest of the children from that time.

The defects consisted of tonsils and adenoids sufficiently diseased to cause irregular attendance at school; defective teeth which were responsible for a considerable amount of malnutrition, and physical weakness; a few cases of defective hearing, and still fewer cases of defective vision, the latter of which was easily correctible by properly adjusted glasses.

This survey was made in an effort to determine the value of a public health nursing service in the schools. The conclusion was that with a public health nurse installed in connection with county school systems, a considerable saving in expense to the state would result.

According to the Director of Nursing Service in the Southwestern Division, one public health nurse should be sup-

plied for every 1,000 children. For reasons of economy, however, the nurses frequently have many more than this number and they also have to look after the health and welfare of the adult community.

"Supposing in a given community," said this director, "200 children should have to repeat their school work because their physical condition made them slow in their studies and frequently absent. This would cost the state \$12,500 a year. A public health nurse for the same period, whose duty it would be to see that the children were kept well and therefore would not have to repeat, would cost \$3,000. The public health nurse in the school inspects the children at regular intervals. If they are found to be subnormal, they are examined by a physician. If the subnormality is due to any physical trouble the physician or the nurse, if working alone, recommends to the parents that the child be sent at once to its family physician for treatment so that, although the ailment is slight, it may be corrected in time and thus prevent serious trouble later on as well as to put the child into better physical condition for its school work. That is one phase of the public health nurse's work.

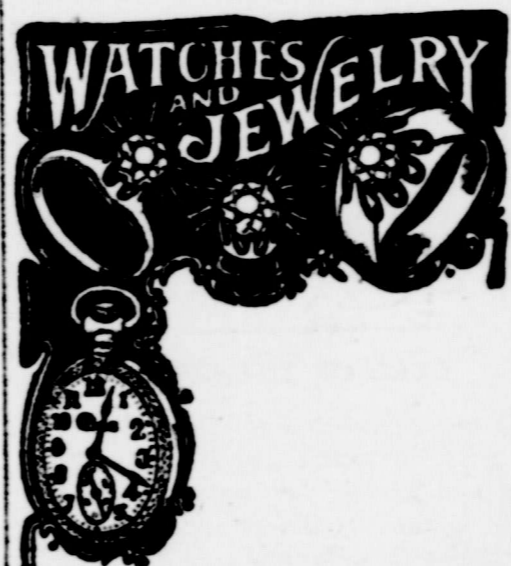
"The next phase is a step beyond, that of educating parents to the point of requiring physical examinations of their children before they reach school age so that they are ready for their school work. Some difficulties of childhood might be eliminated by care of the mother during pregnancy and expert attention during the time of confinement. Infants, apparently well, will benefit by careful inspection at regular intervals. Experiments where these inspections are made with the advice of skilled physicians and nurses, has been eminently successful.

"A third feature of the public health nursing work which should be considered in the question of educating these backward children is that of the delay caused by ill health in bringing these children to the point of economic independence, that is, fitness for life and its responsibilities. Thinking people, educators and welfare workers are being greatly attracted by the usefulness of school instruction in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick for mothers of families, for high school girls and even for younger students. In my opinion there is no better way to teach prevention of illness, good health habits through sanitation in the home, and personal cleanliness than by giving thorough intelligent knowledge of care at the time of illness for the protection of others as well as for the comfort of the patient."

This work is being constantly emphasized in the Southwestern Division and is growing greatly in public interest throughout the division.

CITIZENS AID IN CHILD WELFARE AND FLOOD RELIEF

Red Cross Rendered Much Volunteer Assistance in Southwestern Division.

Volunteer work in the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, has been unusually active during the last year, according to reports which have come into the division office in St. Louis recently. The volunteer committee of the Port Arthur, Texas chapter is regarded as one of the mainstays of the service which the chapter at Port Arthur renders the community. Through this committee arguments are collected, sorted and kept in order to be used whenever needed. In Independence, Kansas, the volunteer committee of the Red Cross chapter has conducted better baby contests and children's clinics with marked success.

Volunteers in the six towns of Texas County, Oklahoma, also have been holding child welfare clinics and conferences and have been able to accomplish much good towards the better health of the community by calling the parents' attention to slight physical defects of their children, which corrected now amount to nothing, but which if permitted to run on might become serious for the child.

In Little Rock, Arkansas, dancers have been able to play an important part in reconstructing the impaired brains and nerves of the patients in the U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 78 in that city, by teaching men to dance and thus assisting the other occupational therapy work in stimulating the dormant mental faculties of the veterans.

Volunteer members of three chapters in the Southwestern Division also have had ample opportunity to demonstrate their enthusiasm in the administering of flood relief during the last summer and fall. Thirty-four hundred dollars was raised by the Winfield, Kansas, chapter to take care of the recent victims of the floods of the Walnut and Arkansas rivers. At Ft. Smith, Arkansas, the Sebastian County

chapter handled the acute needs of the refugees of the floods of last June in the district between the Arkansas and Potomac rivers, and at Tulsa, Oklahoma, volunteer Red Cross workers conducted relief headquarters where 148 persons were fed, clothed and furnished with sleeping quarters for six days until the water subsided sufficiently for them to return to their homes.

RED CROSS ENABLES MOTHERS TO ATTEND TEXAS STATE FAIR

The "Greatest Mother" Cares for Babies While Their Mothers See the Sights.

Women who never before had found it possible to attend the state fair were present at the West Texas Fair at Abilene, Texas, this year, according to reports received from that city at the division headquarters of the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, in St. Louis. This was because the Red Cross of Abilene was on the job to assist the mothers in the care of their children and to give them an opportunity for resting when the sight-seeing of the fair became too strenuous.

"I never would have thought of coming to the fair," said one mother in expressing her appreciation of the care given her baby at the Red Cross tent during one day. "If I had not known that the Red Cross would be here to help me take care of my baby."

Babies of all sizes and ages were cared for in this day nursery and during the hour of the races there were 65 babies under the charge of the Red Cross nurse and volunteer helpers while their mothers cheered on the running horses, sharing the pleasure of their husbands in this "sport of kings."

Miss Mary Kennedy, Red Cross Advisory Nurse for Texas, for the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross, was present and in charge of the tent. The Red Cross tent and First Aid station was set up by the Abilene Chapter and members of that chapter took turns in the management and conduct of its various departments.

COURT UPHOLDS PATENT SALE

U. S. Suit Against Chemical
Foundation Dismissed by
Judge Morris.

CONSPIRACY CHARGE FAILS

Conduct of Chemical Foundation
Praised in Use of Former German
Patents for Benefit of Ameri-
can People.

Wilmington, Del.—In a sixty-two page decision which swept away every one of the Government's major contentions as being without basis in fact or law, Federal Judge Hugh M. Morris dismissed its suit to set aside the sale of seized chemical and dye patents by the Alien Property Custodian to the Chemical Foundation, Inc.

The decision rebuked the Government for including in the bill of complaint a series of conspiracy charges unsupported by evidence at the trial and refuted by the defense as well as by documents filed by the Government.

In declining to compel the Foundation to restore the disputed patents numbering some 4,700 and bought for \$871,000, from the Government, Judge Morris held there was no evidence bearing out allegation of a conspiracy by American manufacturers to effect a monopoly through the Foundation. The court ruled that there was no evidence of fraud or deceit practiced on President Wilson, Mr. Polk, Under Secretary of State, Attorney General, Palmer and other high officials of the Administration.

Garvan's Course Upheld
The opinion praised Francis F. Garvan, president of the Foundation, and its trustees, as having met the most severe of tests in their conduct of the Foundation—"the test of actual trial." They were declared by the court to afford, through their high integrity and unquestioned patriotism, a thorough assurance of loyalty to their trust. "It has kept the faith," said the court of the Foundation's work.

Judge Morris found without merit the Government's contention that the criminal laws were violated in that Mr. Garvan, as Alien Property Custodian and thereby a public trustee sold to himself as president of the Foundation the patents in question. He had acted by direction of President Wilson and his acts, supervised by the President under the latter's wide war powers granted by Congress, could not be brought to court. Congress had not delegated legislative powers to President Wilson, as maintained by the plaintiff, and the courts could not pass judgment on the wisdom or lack of wisdom of Presidential war acts.

Judge Morris recited that although Colonel Thomas R. Miller, present Custodian, who had approved two of the sales involved, verified the complaint, in his testimony he admitted that he could not enumerate any of the facts alleged to have been with held and suppressed from him.

"In view of this testimony and the obvious fact that the power to charge persons with fraud and conspiracy is a weapon with which serious irreparable injury may be done to innocent persons if such charges are lightly made, it is difficult to understand why the specific charges to which the foregoing testimony relates were made," wrote the court. "Yet the remaining like charges were equally lacking in evidential support. In fact, as the argument, the plaintiff seemed

no longer to press these charges against the persons alleged to be conspirators, but it sought to have the charges sustained against the officers of the Government who formulated and carried out in the public interest the plan of sale. . . . While I know of no case where by implication of law the duty of clearing itself from imputed fraud rests upon the defendant, yet the defendant has met even this burden."

Holds Wilson Had Full Power

While the Trading With the Enemy Act at first merely authorized custodianship of German properties in this country, it was later amended to recall the Court, to give power of sale under such conditions as the President, in the public interest, should determine upon. In effect, this made the President, as agent of the nation, possessed of powers as broad as though he were absolute owner of the seized properties. Under the provisions of the act, the President was empowered to make any conditions of sale he considered necessary in the circumstances.

The sales in dispute were not made by the Custodian in his capacity as a common-law trustee, but under the extraordinary powers devolving upon him as the President's representative, under the additional sections of the act. "Because a trustee with only the usual powers may not ordinarily sell trust property at private sale for less than its fair monetary value, it by no means follows that the Custodian, acting under supervision and direction of the President, may not do so," held the Court. "Obviously, the primary purpose of the act was the protection of the nation, not the benefit of the enemy. The trust was for the benefit of the nation—a public trust, not a private trust. The statute requires the President to consider the public interest. Public interest is not a synonym for money."

In this relation Judge Morris quoted from President Coolidge's message to Congress on the Muscle Shoals problem, that "while the price is an important element, there is another consideration even more compelling. . . . If this main object (low-priced nitrates for farmers in peace and the Government in war) is accomplished, the amount of money received for the property is not a primary or major consideration."

Referring to German-owned property, the court said:

"Much of this property was not innocently held or held solely for trade and commerce. Information acquired by German-owned companies had been transmitted to Berlin, and there indexed and made available to German competitors and the German Government. The files of one company were filled not with business papers, but with pan-German literature. It was a distribution centre for propaganda in this country."

Upholds Confiscation of Patents

Judge Morris pointed out that when America entered the war she adhered to the international convention forbidding poison gas, "but it soon became apparent that America would be fighting on disastrously unequal terms unless she should make use of all the dread weapons being used against her by the foe. When Germany persisted in her attempts to destroy her opponents with poison gas in contravention of all international agreements she made it manifest that America's future safety lay in America's chemical independence. The amendment to the act was passed in the darkest days of the war following the sale of seized properties). It was thought Paris was about to fall and the Channel ports be taken." These were the circumstances, said the opinion, "which impelled Congress to grant the President the broad powers of almost absolute ownership. It was the intent of Congress to subordinate mere property rights to the welfare of the nation."

Of the value of the patents sold, Judge Morris held, in accordance with

the testimony, that while Dr. Carl Holderman, a German, asserted the Haber patents were worth \$17,000,000 to the Germans, "the evidence is overwhelming that they were and are without substantial affirmative value to American citizens. Had these patents been sold to Americans at public rather than private sale and only the net proceeds paid to their former enemy owners these owners would have suffered an almost total loss in the value of their property."

Praises Work of Foundation

As to allegations that the sale was not to obtain a fair value, but to promote the interests of the chemical and dye industries and that the transaction was in legal effect granting a subsidy to private industry, the Court commented, "this challenge to the motives of the officers making the sale is supported, I think, neither by the facts nor the law. Mr. Polk determined the public interest would be best served by a wide use of the inventions covered by the patents. If the property was sold under terms and conditions that assured its being devoted to the public use it matters not what benefits or detriments may have flowed as incidents therefrom."

"The property is in the keeping of men who have in its management no selfish interest to serve and whose devotion to the public interest has been established," continued the opinion. "No better plan for devoting the property to public use has been suggested. The plan has stood the most severe of all tests—actual trial. The defendant has kept the faith. This it has done, not by granting licenses in furtherance of the purposes for which it was chartered, but also at its great expense, by distribution of books and pamphlets showing the national necessity for practical development of chemical science in America. If perchance, those heretofore engaged in the industries have derived an incidental advantage from the plan, that incidental result cannot invalidate a transaction lawfully consummated in the public interest. The same charge would lie against the validity of every tariff act. . . . The sale was in effect to America and its citizens, not to those then engaged in chemical and allied industries."

Judge Morris ruled that if the executives entrusted by Congress with power of sale acted within the scope of that power, "their acts are not subject to judicial nullification or review. Invasion by the courts to determine whether the public interest required the property be sold otherwise than under the statutory conditions prescribed and to set aside the sale should the judgment of the court be different from that of the President would be a judicial nullification not only of the President's act but also of the act of Congress conferring on the President the power to determine what the public interest required. What the public interest requires depends upon the conditions existing in the nation. Courts do not understand the 'state of the Union' and as I apprehend, are not equipped to ascertain it. . . . The statement of the reasons actuating the President does not make his act any the less an act of discretion. It is conceded the President cannot be brought into court to substantiate his reasons. The statute does not require him to disclose to the purchaser the evidence upon which his reasons were based. The statute does not limit the Executive in the assignment of reasons to such as may be supported by legal evidence or by facts available to the public."

Reason for Friendship

Almon had never taken a liking to Junior, and rarely played with him. Of Interest to Santa Fe Patrons

Have you compared after-the-war prices of what you buy and sell with those of a pre-war normal year—say, 1922 with 1915?

Santa Fe System Lines have made such a comparison, and you will be interested in the result:

The Santa Fe System sells transportation only, but buys steel, fuel, lumber and all kinds of building and construction material; and is a very large user of labor.

The Santa Fe System received in 1922, \$1.45 for hauling the same amount of freight the same distance that it received \$1.00 for in 1915, and \$1.60 for hauling a passenger the same distance it received \$1.00 for in 1915. Or, combining freight and passenger, it received \$1.50 for the same service it received \$1.00 for in 1915, the increase being 50 per cent.

The Santa Fe System paid \$2.11 for the same quantity of fuel that \$1.00 paid

for in 1915; \$1.77 for the same quantity of materials and supplies, other than fuel, that \$1.00 paid for in 1915; \$2.22 for the same number of hours of labor worked in 1922 as \$1.00 paid for in 1915. Aggregating all operating expenses, it paid in 1922, \$2.05 for the same number of hours worked and same quantity of materials and supplies as it paid \$1.00 for in 1915. It paid \$2.90 in taxes in 1922 for every \$1.00 paid in 1915.

Santa Fe System employees received an average annual compensation in 1922 of \$1.81 for every \$1.00 received in 1915, and the cost of living of such employees was \$1.62½ in 1922 for every \$1.00 in 1915.

Freight rates and passenger fares cannot be reduced until taxes and the cost of operation are reduced.

Cost of operation cannot be substantially reduced until the price of labor and material is reduced. And the price of labor and material cannot be reduced until the cost of living is reduced.

RED CROSS SERVES AT INTERNATIONAL AIR MEET

Ambulances, Nurses and Physicians on Duty for First-Aid Work.

That the Red Cross never overlooks an opportunity for service was evidenced in the recent International Air Meet in St. Louis when aviators from all over the world, representing both military and civic organizations, competed for world famous trophies. With a daily attendance of close to 100,000 in the way of spectators, and a literal army of flyers, mechanics, attendants, laborers and the necessary personnel of such a gigantic undertaking, there was real work to be done by the Red Cross.

A first-aid station was established on the field under the direction of one of the Field Directors of the Southwest Division of the Red Cross, and ambulances with nurses and physicians were on duty all day. A territory of 173 acres had to be covered and ambulances had to be ready on instant call in case of an accident to the flyers, so that a real first-aid service was maintained, with first-aid dressing station and similar activities.

The canteen was under the direction of the Women's Overseas League of St. Louis, and while the service of the First-Aid station and its personnel was given free to the public, the canteen charged for its service and the money thus raised was used for the disabled members of the league.

The St. Louis Chapter of the American Red Cross also furnished motor cars and other transportation to bring the World War veterans from local hospitals to the field to witness the flying.

Although the percentage of accidents and other casualties was remarkably small there were enough of them to keep the Red Cross workers constantly busy for the entire week of the meet, and to gain the thanks not only of the individuals who were given attention but of the officials of the meet and the representatives of the United States and other governments taking part in the contest.

He Sucks the Blood.

When mice and other small animals are abundant, a weasel makes great havoc among them, says the American Forestry Magazine, killing one after another, merely to suck a part of the fresh blood, and then abandoning the bodies for some other animal.

ARKANSANS ESTABLISH CORRECT WEIGHT RECORD

More than 1,500 men, women and children had been weighed and measured for health at the Red Cross booth at the Washington County fair held at Fayetteville, Arkansas. Best records for proper weight for age and height were found between the ages of 20 and 30, and astonishingly few were found to be over or under weight.

Washington County people made a remarkable showing in the matter of health as indicated by weight and measurement, according to experts who have looked over the records. Children between the ages of 5 and 9 were especially satisfactory in their weight and measurement. All persons showing defects in weight were given information as how to correct them.

One Parental Duty.

It is almost a crime for parents to rear children to manhood or womanhood without teaching them, or seeing that they are taught, how to swim. Everybody should know how to swim. For one never can tell when or under what circumstances ability to take care of oneself in the water may spell the difference between life and death.—Lippincott Constitution.
