**MANY LIVES SAVED BY U. S. LIBERALITY**

**Established Public Health Measures in Serbia.**

New York.—"American methods of fighting disease and promoting public health through sanitary measures and public education are rapidly being adopted throughout Serbia as a result of the reconstruction work done there since the war by the Serbian Child Welfare Association of America," said William J. Doherty, executive secretary of the association.

The health work done by the association in Serbia was one of the most important, if not the most important phase of activities which the generosity of the American people made possible. The need of Serbia, like other European allies, for aid was almost as urgent immediately following the war as during the course of the conflict itself. Specters of disease, epidemics, exposure and starvation stalked through the devastated regions of Serbia.

Nurses' School Established. "Had America, with its resources of money and trained personnel, failed to respond to Serbia's appeal the post-war losses of life in that country would at least have equaled those of the period of conflict."

Among the outstanding results of the health work instituted by the Serbian Child Welfare Association of America were the establishment of the first training school for nurses in Serbia; the organization of a health workers' school for short intensive training of nurses and other health workers, the publication of a textbook on hygiene, home and community sanitation, for which King Alexander himself wrote an introduction and assisted in placing in public schools throughout Serbia, and the formation of domestic science schools, which offered Serbian young women short courses in house-keeping, cooking, sewing, home sanitation and personal hygiene.

Three Gifts Made. "Soon after beginning work in Serbia the association enlisted the interest of the Serbian ministry of health, the medical association and various Serbian public health and welfare groups in establishing the training school. An initial gift of 250,000 dinars (a dinar normally is equal to 10.5 cents) was made for the purpose by the association. Shortly afterward the Serbian Red Cross contributed 500,000 dinars and the association raised its gift to meet this sum.

Important as was the work of the association in saving the lives and providing for 25,000 orphans and in helping to rebuild more than 300 schoolhouses in Serbia, the health work which the organization did will, in the opinion of American experts, make an even more lasting impression on the future of this little Balkan country, which suffered worse, in proportion to its size and population, than any other country during the war."

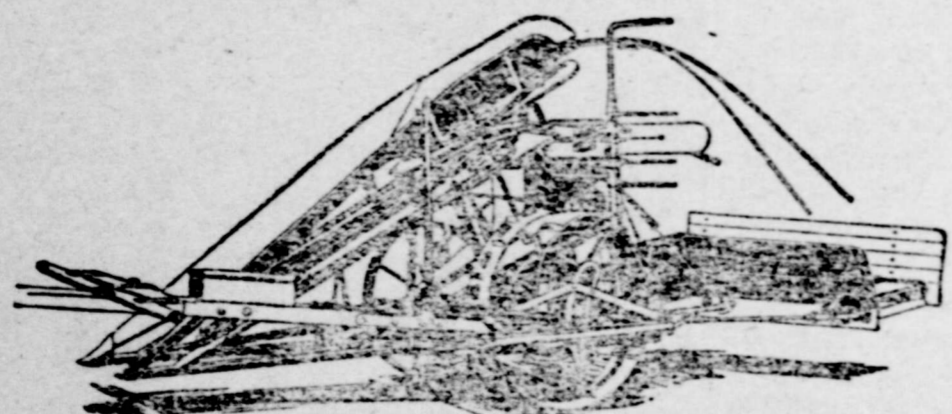

**SEAGRAVES SAYINGS**  
From the Program.

We understand that the Baptist church in this place has called a pastor for full time, and have decided to erect a parsonage. This is a move in the right direction.

We note that Mr. C. M. Armstrong, who had a large ranch out west of town some years ago, is erecting a fine residence in the north part of town, and will become a citizen of Seagraves in the near future.

The Baptist closed a very successful meeting here last Sunday. There was something like 15 conversions, and about 25 additions to the church, some by letter and some by profession of faith. Rev. Doshier of Tahoka, did the preaching.

J. S. Lanier, of El Paso, Texas, bought a section of land north of Seagraves. Mr. Lanier is a man of success financially, and after looking over a vast part of West Texas, he decided land in the Seagraves country offered best inducements for an investment point of view.

This will enable the farmers of that section to haul their cotton to the Seagraves gins, which will be fully able to take care of all that may come.

Last Monday, not far from 9 in the morning, the little son of Mr. Arthur Melton, who lives some four miles to the northwest of town, was bitten by something supposed to be a snake, but it seems the little boy who is some nine or ten years old, did not see the snake, and does not know whether it was one or not. But he was treated by a doctor for snake bite, and at this writing is reported to be better. We hope very much for his recovery.

Glorious rains have fallen all over the country within the last ten days, and things are flourishing. Everything is now pointing to a great harvest in all the surrounding communities. We have never seen better prospects since we have been in the country, and we have been here fifteen years. We hear talk of 5,000 bales of cotton being ginned at Seagraves the coming season, which should it become a fact, will put the country way forward. All indications, also, are that a large feed crop will be made; this we consider about the biggest and best and most valuable of all. The farmers of the country have paid out enormously for feeding the teams this year, but this expense is now about over with for the present time at least, as we note that already ripe maize is coming in. We have great faith in this part of the country.

They come down to breakfast, hoping that the meal may be a few minutes late, so that they can find fault. If the daily paper has not been delivered, or if the eggs are under-bolled, instead of being hard boiled, they are satisfied. There's something with which to find fault, and that is all they want. It is a tonic, and they are happily launched for the day.

Outwardly, they may seem to be in a state of great annoyance, but, inwardly, they are self-satisfied and happy. Really they are in a similar category to drug-takers. Deprive the letter of what they want, and they are touchy and unapproachable. Give them what they want, and they are happy.

Those who suffer from "annoyitis" are the same. Deprive them of annoyances, remove all opportunity of fault-finding, and they are like bears with sore heads. Give them plenty of chances of fault-finding, and they are happy. Why?

Well, it is because they have two vices. They are tyrannical and selfish. Fault-finding enables them to exercise their tyranny and to obtain enjoyment by making others miserable.

An illustration of this is afforded by one employer who went to his office half an hour earlier than usual, his heart full of anticipatory joy at the prospect of finding the staff late. But they were there, and at work, and he was so annoyed at being deprived of an opportunity to find fault that he gave them a terrible time for the rest of the day.

Despicable! Yes! But that employer has a crowd for company, and perhaps among those who read this there may be some whose consciences tell them they are in the crowd.

If so, they should get out of it!
