

location. It is built on the west bank of the Concho, which is a picturesque stream, clear water and fine shade trees, and is splendid for fishing. We presume that water supply is also obtained from in Back in the year of 1882, the writer with several others were on the Colorado when the terrible flood came and washed the old town, Ben Ficklin away. It stood a few miles from where the present city of Angelo now stands, and was the county seat of the county. The place was never rebuilt. This was the highest water I ever saw or heard of since Noah landed his ark on Ariat. If a similar one should come in the future, Angelo would be a thing of the past.

The second day out we pulled the mud to Brady City, passing through Eden. Don't think it was the original town where Adam and Eve set up housekeeping. The crops through this section was much better than any seen from Big Spring to Angelo.

We reached Mason at noon the second day and had good roads from there to Fredricksburg; in fact had fine roads to within a few miles of Austin. The highway from Fredricksburg to Austin is really a scenic road. It is graded and in the most places graveled. It winds and twists among the hills, bordering the numerous small streams found here. Not half a mile of straight road the entire distance. When the eight or ten miles near Austin are finished, it is worth the trip to driver over them.

The writer was in Austin in the fall of 1873. He was then a lad of 14. It is singular that I never visited it again in all these years, although I on the floor of the rotunda below. have often planned to do so.

The city at that time was very small; in fact it seems that along Congress avenue was about all there was to the business section. The old capitol was standing at that time somewhat further down the hill. On either side of the south intrance was his Excellency, Edmond J. By the way, I met an old gentleman while there by the name of Roberson, who told me he put the bridge there. The only building still standing that I could identify is the old land office which looks much like it did at that time.

Historically, Austin is something over a century old, Stephen F. Austin selecting the site about 1821, when he took charge of the colony after his father's death. It was called at that time, Waterloo. It did not, nowever, become the capitol of the state until the republic had ceased to exist. Its name had been changed to Austin in 1839. The danger from capture by the Mexicans caused the capitol to be removed to Houston. thence back to Austin, when president Jones transferred his powers tion was held in which many towns guess the rest. of the state were candidates for its location. Austin won out and the matter was settled for all time. I have no data at hand to verify these statements, and if wrong will thank some boy or girl to set me straight.

The present city of Austin is splendidly situated on the north side of the Colorado river, and is a succession of hills and hollows. Rome is said to be a city of seven hills-Austin can multiply this several times. The population of the city is estimated at 50,000. If this is correct it has increased rapidly since the census of 1920, which placed it at 34,876. There are three railroads. 
