### WORD SILENT AS SENTENCE WAS IMPOSED

Will Word, Terry county gunman, who was found guilty by a jury last week of murder in connection with the killing of Dr. S. H. Windham, prominent Terry and Lynn county ranchman-doctor, was sentenced to serve the remainder of his life in the state penitentiary by Judge Clark M. Mullican of the 72nd Judicial Court, Monday morning.

Word showed much interest in the call that was made for him in his cell in the Lubbock county jail Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff U. L. George, who accompanied him to the court room. He showed some surprise at being taken from the county jail but said he didn't care to leave the place for some time yet, and when he went before the judge he showed no wilingness to answer the question that was asked him regarding his trial and conviction, but stood silent'y gazing at the paper from which the sentence was read.

Word is apparently as happy as a child, and is looking forward to his visit to the state penitentiary with anticipations of enjoying the work he will do there, having been told by other prisoners in the jail he will be put to work on one of the prison farms.

He was remanded to jail immediately after the judge read the sentence to him-Lubbock Avalanche

"Replying to your favor of the 13th instant, addressed to Governor Nett, will say that Section 24 of the Game Laws provide that where any wild birds, fowls, or wild animals are destroying crops, the Commissioner is authorized to permit them to be killed, without consideration of open season or bag limits, but the commissioner must be furnished a statement of facts, sworn to by party seeking such permit, with the endorsement of the County Judge.

However, in the case of migratory birds or fowls, such as wild geese or ducks, it would be necessary to obtain a permit from the Department of Agriculture at Washington.

### CARLSBAD CAVERNS BELIEVED KNOWN AO EARLY AMERICANS

Washington, D. C .- That the huge Carlsbad caverus of New Mexico, recently discovered, were known to the early inhabitants of America is proved by a skull and other human bones, fragments of matting, and wooden mplements found by Dr. W. T. Lee, leader of the National Geographic Society expedition which is exploring the cave. The material has just been examined by experts. They find that the skulls difffer from that of the Pueblo Indian and resemble the skull of the cliff dwellers. The bones were identified as those of a man and a

The matting from the caves consists of well woven strings and has the appearance of being of Indiaa manufacture. The specialists who examined the fragments point out that the occurrence of such material in the caverus does not prove that they were inhabited, since it was customary, even with some nomadic people, to lay away the dead in caves. Such natural shelters also were use ! by early men as temorary camping

### HAS EXPLANATION OF MYTHS OF LONGEVITY

### Pennsylvania Scholar Sheds Light on Subject.

A Babylonian account of the life of Neah, giving his age at 64,800 years, making the 900 years of Methuselah pale into insignificance, forms the basis of a theory of Dr. Howard Chiera, professor of Assyriology at the University of Pennsylvania, designed to account for the extreme ongevity of these characters in early

In a paper submitted to the Crozer Theological seminary, Doctor Chiera tells of the recent discovery of a foursided prism in the Sumerian lauguage, giving a list of the kings who ruled in Babylonia from the creation to the time of Hammurabi. The prism gives he names of eight kmgs who ruled in the 241,200 years (according to the Babylonians), preceding the flood. The prism is now at Oxford university, but the comparison it makes with the lives of the Old Testament patriarchs Doctor Chiera believes "will help us toward filling many gaps in the history of ancient Babylonia."

The eight kings who ruled within a period of 241,200 years is paralleled by another list, discovered, not long ago, according to Doctor Chiera, of ten kings whose rule covered 432,000

"Did the Babylonians really believe that their ancient heroes have lived for such incredibly long periods of time?" Doctor Chiera asked. "They Brownfield. certainly did not.

"But they knew that the world was much older than the date corresponding to 4000 B. C., which was the Hebrew figure. They had historical records going further back than that date and they pushed the date of the creation as far back as they could.

"But they did not have sufficient historical and traditional records to fill up a gap in their history which would extend into hundreds of thousands of years. To avoid confessing their ignorance of history they had posed patriarchs or stretch the lives 166, Brownfield. of the personages they knew, to make them cover the whole period.

"They resorted to the latter alternative as the one which did the least violence to facts. Hence the exceptional longevity of the Babylonian he






