#### **FACTS ABOUT COURTHOUSE** AND JAIL BOND ISSUE

A few people are under the impression that the Courthouse Bunch and Lawyers of the county are trying to put the Courthouse Bonds and Warrants over, and that the Commissioners' Court are trying to do it on their own accord, when if they would investigate they would find a petition filed in the Clerk's vault with ample signatures to order the election. This petition had a few defects, so the Court decided to call the election on its own motion in order to save time, for if they had not, the petition would have been out 60 to 90 days, and the county would lose the benefit of the warm weather to put in the concrete work. If it carries, it will be the first of May or June before it can possibl be started, and any reputable contractor will tell you that they can afford to bid from five to seven thousand dollas cheaper on a one hundred thousand dollar building, built in the summer months, than on one built in the winter months and take chances on the concrete freezing. The Court intends to spend about one hundred thousand on the building, which will be about 60X85 feet, and fifteen to twenty thousand dollars on equipment. If the Commissioners' Court was as bad as some would make you believe, they would build the whole thing with warrants, and not let the people have a say. But the Court is very Democratic, and believe in letting them have a say on March 21st. Some don't understand why they



#### New Vitamines

Scientists at the University of Call fornia are working on two recently discovered vitamines which may prove of great importance in lengthening life and in preventing animal sterility.

One is a vitamine discovered in tea. It has been named "blos" and is supposed to have 300 times the life-giving qualities of other similar vitamines previously found in yeast. "Bios" was discovered, it is reported, as a result of observations that tea drinking peoples, including Chinese, Japanese, Irish and English, are longer lived than

some other nationalities. The second substance discovered a flake extracted from wheat, is said to have increased animal fertility to a marked degree. However, the substance is present in such small quaptities that only a few flakes were secured from a ton of grain .- PhBadelphia Inquirer.

#### Buckskin Cheaters

Buckskin, from which gloves are made, comes for the most part from

Mexico and Brazil, The skins are usually smaller than those of sheep and seldom perfect because of the wounds or thorn scratches. The latter do not weaken the gloves, however, and, in fact, a visible scratch is pretty good proof that a giove is genuine buck and not sheep dressed to imitate buckskin, says the Springfield Republican. The leather is dressed in oil and the color is obtained with colored clay dust. Because of this method of coloring every buckskin glove will dust off or crack the first three or four times it is worn. Buck leather is close fibered, soft after wearing and warm.

#### Interest Cut in Half

The United States court for China, Shanghai, recently held that the legal rate of interest applicable on judgments rendered by the United States court for China was 6 per cent per annum. In the past a rate of 12 per cent has been allowed, in conformity with an old consulate regulation permitting this rate of interest on judgments. The court held, however, that the District of Columbia code provided a legal rate of 6 per cent interest on judgments, that this was the law for the United States court for China, and that in the future only this rate would be permissible.





#### Electricity in Palestine

Plans for the electrification of Palestine by raising the level of the Sea of Galilee and harnessing the historic River Jordan, involving an opening expenditure of \$10,000,000, as described in "Palestine-Its Commercial Resources With Particular Reference to American Trade," by Addison E. Southard, American consul at Jerusalem, recently published by the Department of Commerce. The same project calls for the canalization of the Jordan valley from the Sea of Galilee to the Dead sea, where, under irrigation, it is expected that copious crops of dates, rice, sugar cane, flax and cotton can be produced. Provision for 2,000 miles of motor highways, commercialization of the Bagdad-Cairo air route, traversing Syria, and agricultural credit banks are among the other innovations contemplated in the modernization of the Holy land, as related by Mr. Southard.

#### Christmas Offers Pleasures New to Northerners.

A morning dip in the Caribbean sez, treshly gathered oranges and grapefruit for breakfast, eaten in a patic of flowers still wet with dew, a glor- and January. lously blue sky overhead-these were a few of the reasons why we left home and the frozen North at the holiday season to seek the land where poinsettias grow wild in the dazzling tropical sunshine. Even though such surroundings did not seem at all in keeping with our idea of the Christmas season, the experience of merely being there was delightful and long to be remembered, says a contributor in the New York Herald-Tribune.

Christmas in Porto Rico is a religlous holiday and not a gift day. The real celebration, such as we know, comes in January and is called Three Kings' day. The fifth, sixth and seventh days of the month celebrate the visit of the wise men to Christ's birthplace. On the evening of January 5 the children arrange boxes containing grass outside the windows of their homes for the horses of the kings. Inside are placed their shoes for the gifts that the wise men bring them, as they did the Christ child. Almost two weeks are given up to merrymaking among both old and young. There is little work done, especially among the country people, who go from house to house for dancing.


