TERRY COUNTY TO BUILD **NEW COURTHOUSE**

Possibly less than half the voters of Terry county participated in the election held throughout Terry county Saturday to determine whether or not Terry county would issue bonds to build and equipp a \$120,000 courthouse and jail. For only 814 votes were cast in the election. Of couse many of the more than 1700 who had pol! tax receipts were not qualified for the reason that they must also be property taxpaying voters, but we are sure that the quilified voters would have been around 1500 or 1600.

The election passed off quietly and no disturbances whatever, and most all voters seemed to have had their minds made up one way or the other before going to their polling places. Only three boxes in the county returned an anti vote, being Meadow, Tokio and Scudday, all county line boxes. The latter cast their whole 19 votes against the courthouse.

The Herald is proud of all the boxes that stood for progress, and wishes to thank them here and now, but it especially wants to hand the two boxes at Gomez a large bouquet of American beauty roses. When the Herald man came here 16 years ago, four years after organization of the county, there was still quite a bit of bitter animosity between the two little town over the results of the county seat election. By their 2 to 1 vote for the courthouse Saturday, they proclaimed to the world that they had not only forgot but forgiven, and now stand squarely with Brownfield for modern improvements. Gomez, your former rival extends the glad hand!

Marriages That Led

Swing Plays Part in Hindu Religious Rites

One often finds in the near vicinity of a Hindu temple, says a writer in an Indian paper, two high stone pillars, sometimes 30 feet high, with a stone crosspiece, from which hang iron chains. These swings play an important part in the various festivals of the year, especially for the young people.

The very act of swinging on this sacred structure is pleasing to the deity of the temple, and when it is possible to combine both pleasure and worship, then it is not unnatural this form of exercise should be greatly appreciated. In certain seasons, especially the harvest season, the swing is in great demand, and religious ceremonies are performed by the priests of the temple. On the top bar of the swing it is not unusual to find a number of earthenware chattels, which are the home of the sacred pigeons connected with the

These swings are often built in the middle of the street, and they not infrequently constitute a real obstacle to traffic. But the authorities would certainly have great difficulty in persuading the temple people to agree to the removal of them.

Death in Triumph

Edouard Remenyi was a famous Hungarian violinist who made several world tours and settled in New York for some years. He died of apoplexy on the stage of the Orpheum theater, San Francisco, on May 15, 1898. This was his first appearance on the vaudeville stage and he was enthusiastically received on playing two or three classical pieces. He responded with "Old Glory," which created tremendous applause. Match This for Twins!



Basilica Greek Name for Hall of Justice

The word basilica is of Greek origin. being derived from the Greek work (written with Latin letters), "basil kos," meaning kingly. From that word has been formed the English adjective, tain parts or substances on account of their supposed importance or efficiency. The word basilica, as a term of architecture, meant originally at Athens a portice on the agera in which the archon-basilens dispensed justice, that is, at Athens the basilica was the porch of the courthouse. Later, when Rome had become the mistress of the world. the word basilica meant a rectangular hall, divided into nave and aisles by ranges of columns, and with a raised platform, called the tribune, at one end. It was used as a hall of justice, a hall for the use of the high courts. It was in such a hall that the practors held their courts and later under the emperors the prefect's courts met in a basilies. The prefect or judge sat on the tribune or platform, with the assessors or law advisers on either hand. Sometimes an emperor presided when the case was an appeal, in a criminal matter, from the decision of a governor of a province. It was before such a court, held in such a hall, that the appeal of St. Paul was heard. In later years when Christianity had spread throughout western Europe, the Caristians often adopted the basilica as the pattern of their larger places a church built on the plan of the basil-

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

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



Growth of Jellyfish

In most cases the beginning is an egg, which, lying on the bottom, produces a beautiful tree-like growth. The "tree" fastens itself to the bottom and brings forth buds which, when ripe, drop off and develop into jellyfish. The latter, in turn, lay eggs and the process is repeated, as told in London Tit-Bits.

Most of the very large species have a different way of reproducing themselves. The egg is set free in the water and develops into a pear-shaped larvae, which for a while swims about rapidly, being provided with hair-like appendages that serve the purpose of ears. Then the larvae settles down, anchors itself to the bottom, increases in size rapidly and finally splits up into thin, flat discs which swim off and grow up into large jellyfishes.

It is said the Arabs were the first to appreciate a horse's intelligence and to treat him accordingly. They kept the history of their horses written on tablets of ivory and traced their parentage back to the time of the pharaohs. In private practice and as a solicitor general of the United States he has had that intimate contact with our laws which is the best foundation for a sound understanding of their spirit, their truth and their wisdom. He understands the practical application of the Constitution to actual affairs of life.

"While we cannot all be trained in the technicalities of the law, we should all have some idea of our fundamental institutions. We need to know their relationship to our daily life, the reason for their existence, the benefits we derive from them, and the necessity to ourselves for their perpetuation. We must know that the Court is our Court.

"The Constitution is not self-perpetuating. If it is to survive, it will be because it has public support. Such support is not a passive but an active operation. It means making adaquate sacrifice to maintain what is of general benefit.

"The Constitution of the United States is the final refuge of every right that is enjoyed by any American citizen. So long as it is observed, those rights will be secure. When ever it falls into disrespect and disrepute, the end of orderly government, as we have known it for more than 125 years will be at hand. The Constitution represents a government of laws. There is only one other authority and that is the government of force. Americans must make their choice between these two. One si of another. Iron Rust Drives Fish

From River in Siberia

Can you imagine a river that gets rusty? There is one which is subject to this phenomenon-the River Ob. which falls into the Arctic ocean and runs through the north of Siberia.

The Ob contains a great amount of iron. Every year when it freezes over the iron is cut off from the air. The result is that the metal precipitates, or, in other words, instead of being dissolved in the water, becomes a

The whole underside of the ice is covered thickly with rust, and even the fish and other creatures become rusty. In the lower reaches, where ice does not form, the water, ordinurlly quite clear, becomes cloudy and discolored. The whole river, 2,300 miles long, becomes poisonous.

People living near it have to quench their thirst with melted snow, and most of the fish leave the river and seek safety in the sea. They are told by instinct when the time arrives for their annual exodus.

In the spring the ice thaws and the air renders the river free from poison. The fish immediately return. They swim up the stream in such vast numbers that they are packed tightly together. Any boat that tries to navigate the river at this time forces thousands of fish onto the flat banks, where the natives kill them with

All Men of Unusual Strength Are Samsons

The story of Sampson is found in Judges 13, and the three following chapters. This man takes his place in Scripture as a judge or ruler, an office which he filled for 20 years; as a Nazarite, that is, one bound by a vow of a peculiar kind to be set apart from others for the service of the Almighty. The obligation was really for a definite time, and during that time the Nazarite was bound to abstain from wine and every production of the vine, and from every kind of intoxicating drink. He was forbidden to cut the hair of his head, or to approach any dead body. In the third place Samson appears as a man endowed with supernatural physical strength. It is this latter quality that first comes to one's mind when he is mentioned, and it is because of that wonderful quality that any man of unusual strength is called a Samson. For instance, a London carpenter, named Thomas Topham, has been called "the British Samson." It is related that in Cold Bath fields, London, on May 28, 1741, in the presence of thousands of specof water, weighing 1,836 pounds. Topham was born in 1710, and died in 1753.
