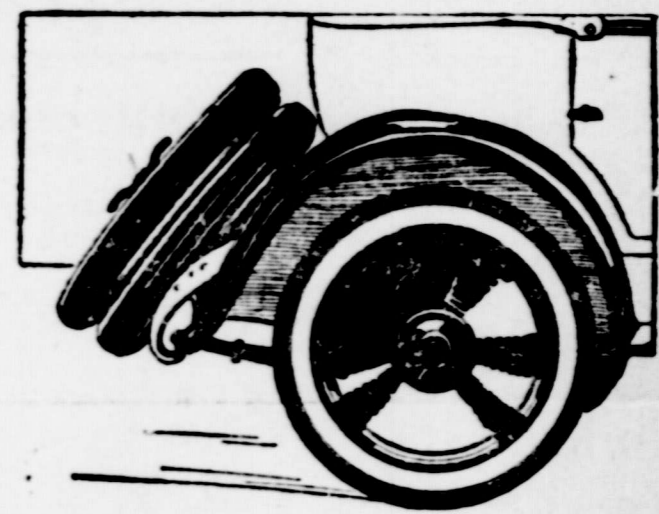

MINERAL WELLS CAMP SITE INFORMATION

Mineral Wells, April 14.—The Camp Site Committee has arranged for four large camp sites and a number of smaller ones. Each camp site is being laid off in a systematic manner with streets traversing the grounds north and south and east and west. Camp lots are numbered and located so that each camping party has access to streets without interfering with other campers. When a camp lot number has been issued, party holding same will be protected and can rest assured no one else will occupy said lot.

Water, light, sanitary facilities for cooking purposes and community kitchens, sufficient to meet requirements of each camp will be provided. Natural gas will be furnished where possible, otherwise wood for cooking purposes will be furnished. Cook stoves will be furnished with kitchens. No cooking utensils will be furnished.

Rates.—Camp lots will be rented for 50c per day per car, with free access to community kitchen tents; rentals must be paid in advance for full time of convention. Army sleeping tents will be from \$3 to \$5 per day, according to size. These tents will accommodate from 6 to 10 people. Army cots will be rented 25c per day. Parties expecting to camp while here should reserve tents and cots as early as possible.

Police.—Camps to be patrolled 24 hours per day by National Guard.

THE PROGRESSIVE SOUTH

(From the New York Times)

When Grant at Appomattox allowed the Confederates to keep their horses so that "they would be able to put in a crop to carry themselves and their families through the next winter," the Southern States were "shot to pieces."

A beginning had to be made all over again. The natural resources—cultivable lands, forests, rivers—were the only capital the Southerners had, except their own physical strength and a will to work. Industry was in ruins, agriculture stagnant. Instead of money for development, there was crushing obligations to meet. Education would have to wait until the necessities of food, clothing and housing were supplied. Carpetbag government came to cripple the energies of the people. For years the South made so little progress that to the North it seemed to stand still even to retrograde. In fact, it is only within the memory of middle aged men that the South was able to reorganize its industries, re-establish agriculture and put its educational system on a sound basis. Today the South is not only solvent but rich beyond the dreams of the youngest men who surrendered to Grant and Sherman. What magic has made the South a land of plenty, an industrial giant, agriculturally independent, educationally self-sufficing?

Few people in the North comprehend the great peace victory that the South has won. Mr. B. C. Forbes tells the story. It should be prefaced that since the opening of the century, and especially during the last ten years, the South had to be "reborn" intellectually, socially, industrially, agriculturally, financially, and transportation-wise. Every second city has a college or university. Per capita the South now has more churches than any other section. It is spending more money on hospitals. It is leading the country in building big hotels. It is beautifying towns and cities with parks. "The South today," says Mr. Forbes, "is spending almost twice as much on its schools as the whole of the United States spent in 1900. To put it into figures: \$35,037,000 in 1900 and \$323,067,000 in 1922. "The Julius Rosenwald fund alone has brought into being more than 2,600 negro schools." Mr. Forbes says he has seen no finer high school in the country than the Richard J. Reynolds school at Winston-Salem. The Southern universities are being liberally endowed; their enrollment in many cases has gone up to thousands; their standard of teaching has made the South independent of the North. Everywhere the civic spirit is robust.

At the close of the Civil War the roads of the South were often mere trails. Metal highways now abound. The sum of \$140,000,000 is spent annually on new construction and repairs. Where does the money come from to pay for the new South? In 1923 the value of farm products was \$6,127,430,000—trebled since 1909.

Peters and Haynes, Lubbock architects, who drew the accepted design of the Terry county courthouse, will be here tomorrow, we understand, with complete plans and specifications.

Mr. Barrier is a prominent merchant of his city and also owns considerable property in Brownfield. He now has a two story under construction here and informed us that it would be rushed to completion.

He boosts for the church, the lodge and the school, community uplift is ever his rule. And even the football and basketball team look kindly on him in their athletic dream. I'd rather have him at my elbow each day, than to deal with some one fur-longs away. Let's make the thing mutual, and stand by our friends;

there's no place like home for the money we spend!"—Swiped.

The 35 horsepower electrically operated centrifugal pump was installed in the city well one day last week in order to keep the water pumped out while workmen were digging deeper. Dry weather still prevails in Terry county, though the eastern part got showers Sunday, but will not help much until the whole country gets well "wet up." And we don't expect this condition of affairs until they begin having too much rain down in east and central Texas.

O'Donnell had a real warm city election in which the candidates announced for the several offices, and paid for real advertising space. It is presumed, that O'Donnell, like Brownfield pays no salaries to city officials except perhaps the city marshal, and at this distance it is hard for us to figure why the rush for the office. In Brownfield the office has to seek the man, and then has a hard time discovering him.

such year as 1917, the Cow, Sow and Hen will help us through again. We certainly hope and believe that this is to be no such year, but if you see a good cow advertised cheap, or can connect with a nice brood sow or a few well bred hens, don't neglect the opportunity.

Reports from Austin are that the State Pasteur Institute has been doing a big business during the last two months. During March the institute received 334 dog heads, which breaks all previous records, and of these, 115 were found infected with rabies. The record for April so far is above that of March, and average of 12 heads per day for the first three days. There is no denying the fact that an epidemic of rabies has spread over Texas, said Dr. J. T. Wilhite, director of the institute, "and people owning dogs should be compelled to kill them or keep them penned at home. The stray dog should be taken off the street.—Slaton Slatomite.

The Legislature which has just adjourned passed one law which has been little noted in the daily press, but which we believe will prove to be most precious in its operation. The law as passed has been approved by the governor. It restricts the operation of peace officers in making a search for liquor possessed or believed to be transported illegally. Under this law as we understand it, no peace officer can legally search a car loaded down with whiskey until he first swears out a search warrant. Unless the officer has sufficient grounds on which to make an arrest of the occupants of such cars and thus detain them, they will in most cases have ample time to escape and hide or dispose of the liquor before a search warrant can be procured. The effect of the law will be to greatly hamper peace officers in the enforcement of the liquor laws. We are surprised that the legislature and the governor would thus throw a stone in the way of law enforcement. We believe that they have made a grave mistake.—Tahoka News.

Much is said and written about Easter, some of it this week under the able pen of Aesculapius our splendid Meadow correspondent. We

agree with our writer in the fact that people should celebrate the "Risen Savior," not once a year, but every Sunday. The early disciples "met the first day of the week to break bread," and the American standard revised version puts it "every first day of the week. We are also agreed with Aesculapius that the Easter day celebration started with the Catholics, and was borrowed by most Protestant denomination. Just where we get the rabbit and egg part, we are unable to fathom. Easter is only mentioned in the New Testament one time and that in connection with a Jewish feast day. The early Christians had no "special days." If God had expected us to celebrate Easter, (once a year) as a church ordinance, and Christmas, (once a year) as a church ordinance, he would not have left the date so indefinite. However, the date He was definite on "Every first day of the week" is neglected, while people seek around for one to suit themselves.

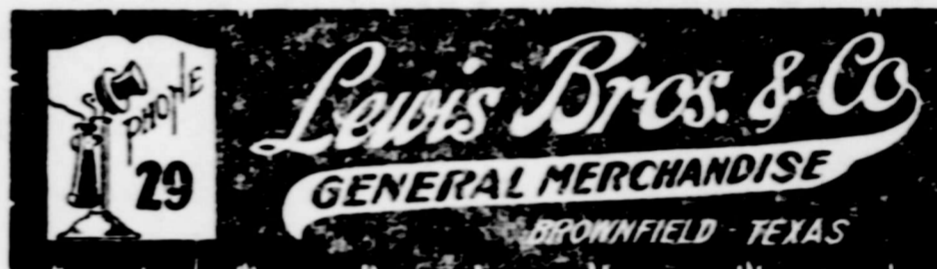
