Texas has 172 soil conservation districts which embrace 96 percent of the land area of the state. These districts represent the greatest force-and the organized, locally controlled force-for the conservation of soil, water, plants and

Each soil conservation district was organized only after land-owners of the area voted to have such a district. SCDs are legal sub-divisions of state government, comparable to counties and school districts, but they have no taxing power. Each is governed by a board of five supervisors who must be landowners themselves and who are elected by farmers and ranchers of the district.
