## Johnson Holds Sway At Demo Conclave

In line with the sentiment that prevailed all over the Texas Panhandle—and especially so in rural areas—Friona Democrats turned down Gov. Allan Shivers in favor of Senator Lyndon Johnson at their precinct meeting Saturday afternoon at the school.

On the crucial balloting of a motion by John Lamb that the precinct convention endorse Johnson, the vote went 26 to 18 against the governor. Friona's nine-vote delegation was then instructed to support Johnson.

Nelson Welch, who opened the convention as temporary chairman, gave up the chairmanship to W. H. Sheehan, and Dan Ethridge was elected secretary.

Delegates to Tuesday's county Demo convention were Sloan Osborn, Wright Williams, G. B. Buske, Nelson Welch, Frank Spring, William Sheehan, H. K. Kendrick, Dalton Caffey, and Dan Ethridge. Alternates are these men's wives.

Lamb's motion, incorporated into a resolution, read, "It is hereby resolved that the delegates be instructed to vote for Lyndon Johnson as chairman of the Texas Democratic delegation to the Democratic national convention."

# County Democrats Underwrite Sen. Johnson at Convention

In action that surprised no one Tuesday at the courthouse in Farwell, the Democratic county convention delegates instructed Parmer's two messengers to the state meeting to vote for Lyndon Johnson.

Parmer County, which carried more than 3-to-1 in favor of Shivers over Yarborough last year, fell in with the groundswell that has been

building up in recent weeks for Sen. Johnson, who is not only booked as Texas' favorite son candidate for the presidential nomination, but also as chairman of the state delegation to the national Democratic convention.

Except for frequent mixups regarding parliamentary procedure, the convention went smoothly Tuesday. Shivers supporters were simply outvoted.

No discussion on the merits or demerits of any individual candidate was heard.

Bill Sheehan of Friona and R. W. Anderson of Farwell will represent Parmer County at the state gathering, and alternates are Dalton Caffey, Friona, and Bob Brooks, Farwell.

## Friona Drags Her Feet On an Important Duty

Friona, which has so many things to be proud of, can hardly brag about the part this community is playing in the civil defense effort—which may some day turn out to be the most important duty of any.

Notably lacking in this field of endeavor is the community's GOC unit. That's Ground Observer's Corps to the uninitiated.

This organization is backed by the military might of the country, and though it seems strange to say it, the radar networks, all-weather jet interceptors, and Strategic Air Command (SAC) could conceivably be pitifully inadequate under certain conditions, were it not for this thin line of resistance depending on volunteer action.

## Bindweed Threatens Farms, Says Jones

Bindweed, a noxious plant that spreads across farmland like cancer spreads through the human body, is more serious this year than last, in spite of control measures undertaken across the county in 1955, reports County Agent Joe Jones this week.

"This is the time of year to get after bindweed," he says. "And farmers surely ought to be on the lookout for the little blooms—which later turn pink—that indicate the spread of bindweed."

Once bindweed has taken hold of some ground—whether it's a square foot or 200 acres—retirement of the land from crop-growing is paramount if control is to be effective.

The method Agent Jones recommends is to first isolate the infection with a border, apply soil sterilant, and then irrigate with about three inches of moisture. This dissolves the chemicals and puts them to work on the unwanted plants. Don't over-water, however, cautions Jones, as that practice may carry the sterilants down into the soil below the bindweed root zone.

"Bindweed is moving in on Parmer County from all directions," warns Jones. He pointed out that new patches of the infectious pest have sprung up all over the county.

\*Learn to identify bindweed

seed," Jones admonished farmers. "Check some plants and see for yourself what the seed looks like, and then watch for it in the seed you plant."

He says that infested planting seed can be serious, if bindweed is not spotted.

Another point to watch is transient combines, which may move the seed from one field to another, unknown to the farmer.

"Don't forget that bindweed is like cotton," says Jones. "That is, it produces seed at the same time that it is blooming. Now is the time to start control measures—don't say 'I'll wait until it gets ready to make seed.'"

Sodium chlorate, the most common chemical in use for controlling bindweed, should be handled with caution because of its inflammable nature. It is locally available and recommended, but Jones suggests that farmers obtain bulletins on its use at his office.

He also cautioned farmers about using Karmex W, which renders soil sterile for many years, and in addition, may contaminate more land than desired because of its tendency to be carried down the row by irrigation water.

Payments for buying and applying bindweed control chemicals are available through the ACP program again this year, and a news letter setting forth details of this practice will soon be mailed. The

government participates to the extent of about 50 percent of the total cost.

"Money is now available for this use," says Jones, but he emphasizes, "It won't be available indefinitely, and farmers should act soon if they intend to take advantage of this program."

## New Dumping Pit At Black Grain

Chalmers & Borton, Hutchinson contractors, are this week installing a new semi-truck dump at Black Grain Company, according to Paul Fortenberry of the company.

Work started last week, and completion is hoped for within a month. The new facility does not expand the company's storage capacity, but does improve grain handling capacity.

A brochure on Friona and its trade territory, long-time project of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, is about ready to be submitted to the printers, Wright Williams, C-C president, announced today.

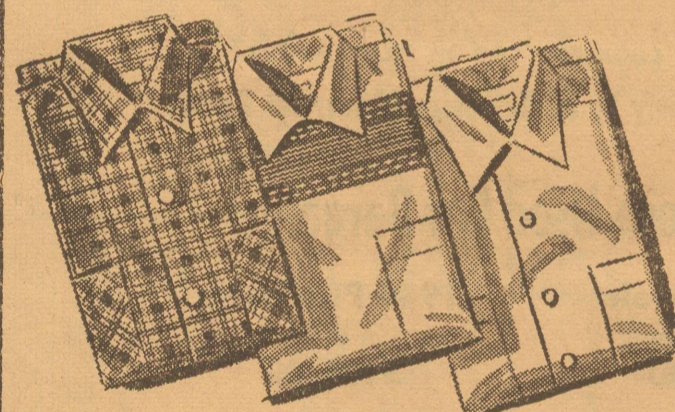

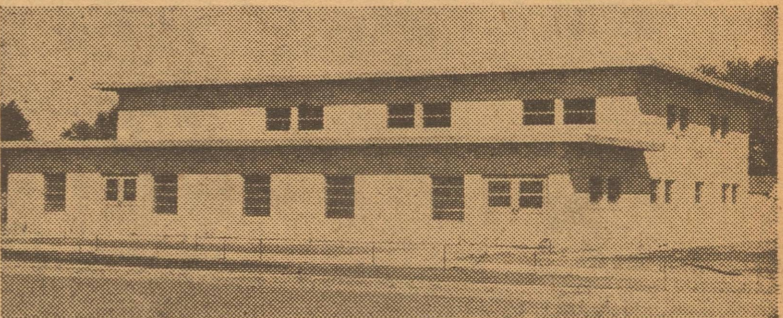

**City Commission Has Busy Session**

improvements is the fact that what the city seems to need will cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$35,000, leaving a \$10,000 deficit to be made up somewhere.

Commissioners examined preliminary plans submitted by Weldon Dickson, hoping that part of the building might be temporarily deferred from construction, but they ended the session with no definite decision.

The plans were returned to Dickson with the request that he probe deeper into estimated costs, and offer alternate possibilities with parts of the over-all plan omitted.

Wilson was optimistic over cost of the paving, and estimated that a surplus in this department might recover as much as \$10,000, which would solve the problem the commissioners were wrestling with at the time. He will refigure the bonds and funds left over and report on this at Monday night's meeting.

Plans under consideration now call for an over-all city plant of 85x46 feet in size, housing the fire department (three-truck capacity), a vault, city manager's office, main office, meeting room, police judge office, and a three-cell jail.

Firechief Charley Bainum was at the meeting, and made a request that the city purchase additional equipment for the local department. Immediate needs were listed as 500 feet of 2½-inch hose, \$780; 300 feet of 1½-inch hose, \$270; and two 2½-inch nozzles, \$100.

He also requested the installation of a phone circuit to his home so that he could sound the alarm when notified by telephone. This would result in a saving of as much as 15 minutes on occasions, he estimated. Two tires and overload springs completed his immediate needs for equipment.

Chief Bainum also asked that the city participate in sending several members of the department to a school at Texas A&M next month. This has been customary in the past.

Farwell's six delegates were uninstructed, as were Oklahoma Lane's two.

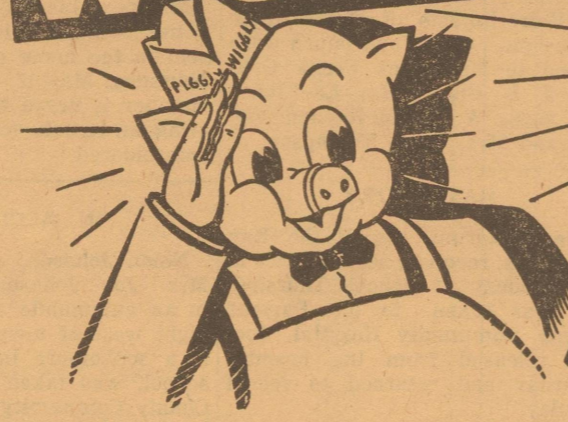

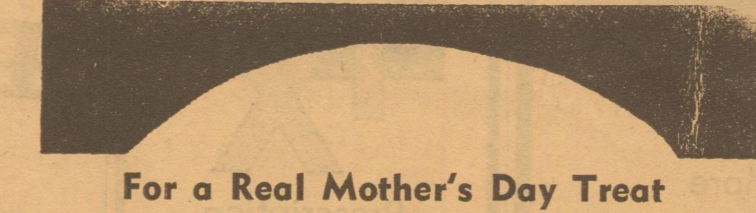

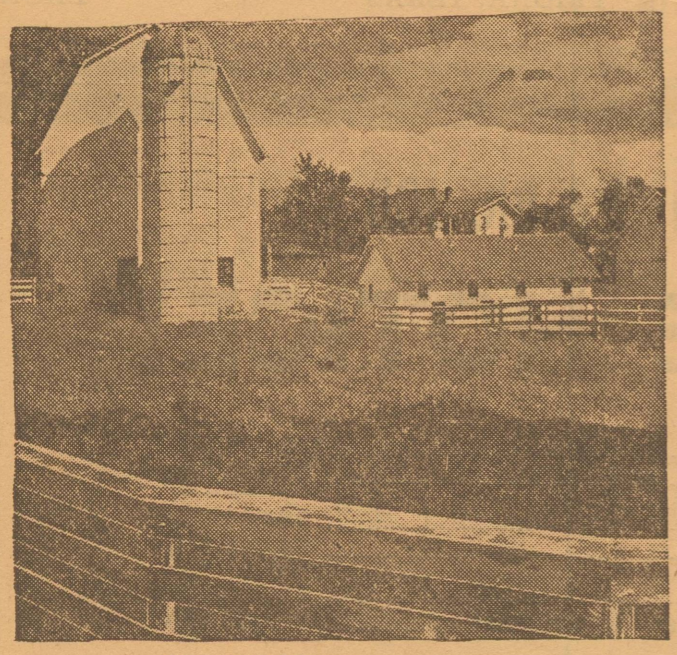

# SPECIAL WEEK DENOTES MAN'S TIE TO THE SOIL

This is Soil Stewardship Week in Texas. It began on Soil Stewardship Sunday, May 6, when many churches held special services to recall man's duty to the land.

Churches participating in giving soil conservation special emphasis this week include, according to Floyd Crume, work unit conservationist, the Friona Union Congregational Church, the Friona Methodist Church, The Rhea Lutheran Church, and the Bovina Catholic Church.

Texas has 172 soil conservation districts which embrace 96 percent of the land area of the state. These districts represent the greatest force—and the organized, locally controlled force—for the conservation of soil, water, plants and wildlife.

Each soil conservation district was organized only after landowners of the area voted to have such a district. SCDs are legal sub-divisions of state government, comparable to counties and school districts, but they have no taxing power. Each is governed by a board of five supervisors who must be landowners themselves and who are elected by farmers and ranchers of the district.

A soil conservation district helps its cooperating farmers and ranchers plan and apply conservation measures on their land. Following a master plan which was carefully prepared by farmer and rancher committees, each district works toward the goal of complete conservation for all the land in the district.

Supervisors function as a coordinating body to stimulate and guide the efforts of local groups and individuals toward achievement of the district goal. Technical assistance is provided by various agencies, such as Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, and vocational agriculture teachers.

Any landowner can become an SCD cooperater by applying to the board of supervisors. Becoming a cooperater does not involve any financial obligation. Texas SCDs now have 172,000 farmer and rancher cooperaters, and the figure grows by 15,000 each year. Last year these cooperaters covered 1,180,000 acres and stubble-mulched 256,000 acres of Texas land. They controlled brush on 1,322,000 acres and had 6,963,000 acres under deferred grazing. They built 10,700 miles of terraces, 7,540 miles of waterways, built over 10,000 ponds and leveled 74,000



acres of land for proper irrigation. SCS personnel for Parmer County include Crume, Melvin Swartz, conservationist farm planner; and J. D. Sanders, conservation aid.

Personnel on the County SCD board of supervisors include A. L. Black, Friona, chairman; Joe Blair, Farwell, secretary; Lloyd Prewett, Black, vice-chairman; and Matt Jesko, Lazbuddie, and Carl Schlenker, Rhea, directors.

This has been a big year for improvements on the farms of county cooperaters, says Crume. The two big items for this year are bench leveling and installation of concrete irrigation tile.

Two-hundred acres of land have been bench leveled in 1956, as compared with about 150 last year, he points out. Also, approximately 25 miles of pipeline have been laid, and with more to come after wheat harvest, the total should beat last year's 30 miles, he thinks.

Bench leveling and concrete irrigation pipe are two of the most popular water-conserving improve-

ments, and are receiving great attention in this newly developed well irrigation area.

We've made several resolutions about attending the next one—hope we don't forget them before convention time again.

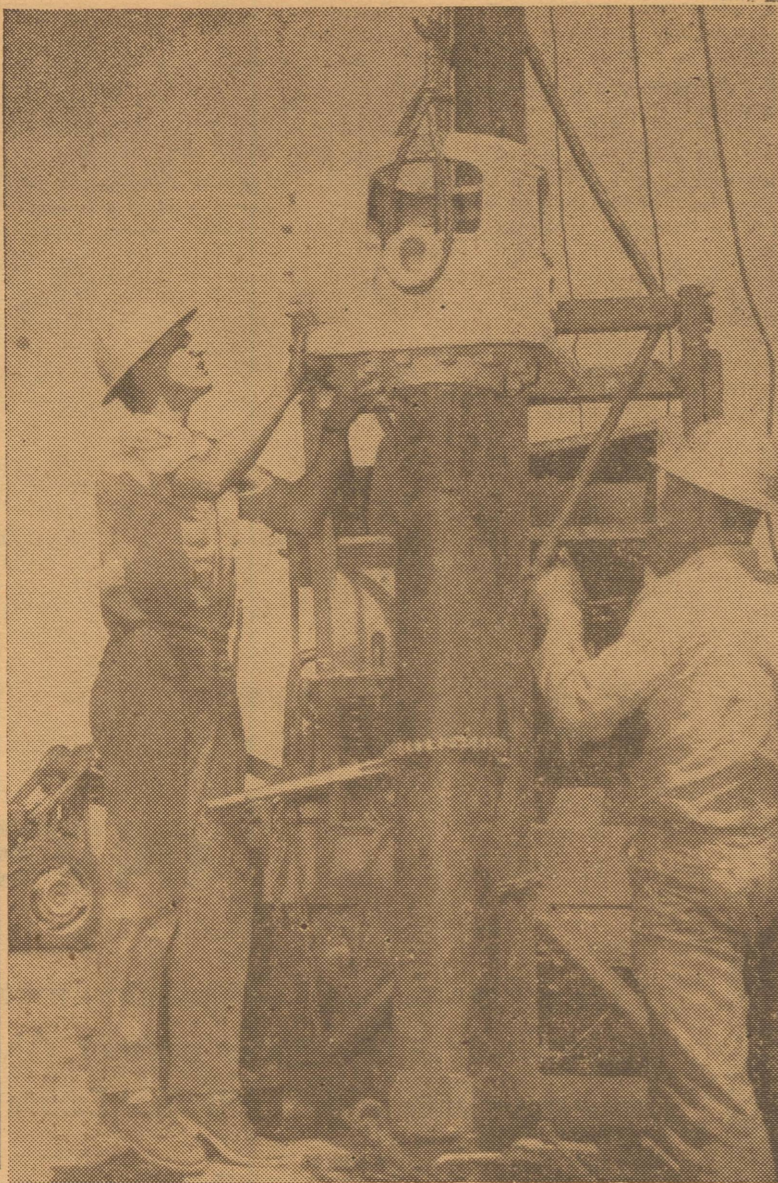
### 2-B—BAVOUSETT

"I believe God created the earth by His divine processes for the benefit of man, not one man, nor one generation, but mankind for all time.

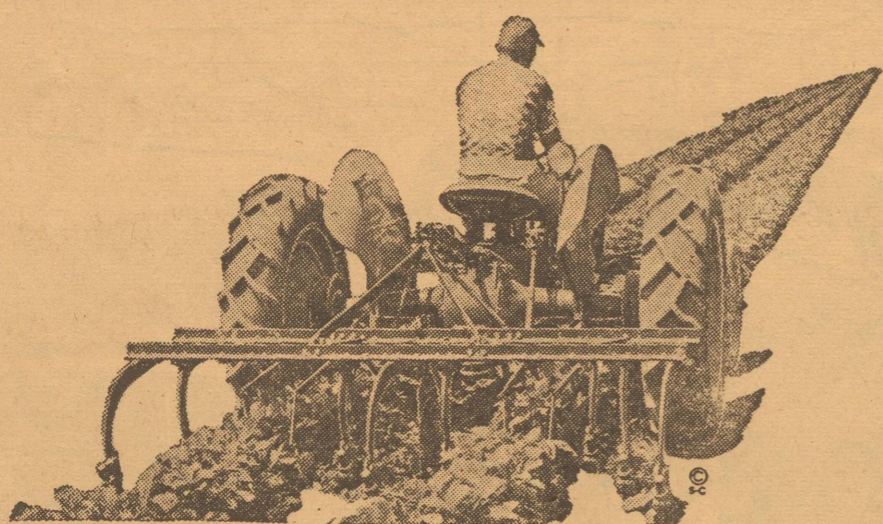
