

condition. The present school board realizing the situation, after having been petitioned by fifty qualified voters, have called for a bond election to build more to the High School building.

The New High School building put up last year is a fine begining for meeting the housing situation. But it is at least four rooms too small now, to say nothing of the growth the next two years. The Manual Arts and the Science Departments cannot do work in a standard way in this crowded condition. So at present we can only hope to standardize the departments that have room to work.

One big obstacle in the way of success of this term of school is that we have no place where both schools may be called for assembly. The auditorium are so badly crowded when both schools are together that it is almost impossible to maintain order or get attention. An auditorium that would seat a thousand or more would go a long way toward giving bigger returns on the money already invested in the school plant in Brownfield. Many of you would take more intterest in your childs education had you a better place to meet with us on special occassions. When we have gatherings here to which every one should come, many have to be turned away at the door because there is not sufficient seating capacity. Have you not heard that remark more. than once? If not, ask those who come to entertainments given by the school. Some would say they are against the Bond Issue because taxes are now too high. 

Throughout the winter months when the variety of fresh fruit is limited and the fruits on the market are very expensive, every housekeeper should turn a share of her attention to dried fruits, says Miss Veda Strong of the New Mexico A. & M. College.

These dried fruits have in the last few years been brought to such a degree of tempting perfection that they no longer occupy the lowly position in the diet which was accorded them in the past. Evaporated or dried peaches, prunes, dates, raisins and apricots as delicate, tender and delicicus when properly dried, and the finished product today is quiet different from that of a few years ago. Of course careful cooking is necessary to make them more appetizing and tasty.

Dried fruits are rich in calcium, iron and other mineral salts which are very necessary in building up body tissue and blood.

Dates are a favorite and nutritious product. A few date cut up and added to your breakfast cereal and eaten, with cream, make an ideal dish. Dates are an excellent addition to steamed pudding, date bread and cookies, and are delicious in muffins, or as sandwich filling when chopped with raisins and nuts.

Dried apricots may be used in pies. pudding, sherbets, apricot jelly roll or apricot cobler.

Raisins are perhaps used more extensively in cooking than the other dried fruits as nearly everyone uses raisins in bread, cookies, cakes puddings and pies. They are delicious in candy also.

Other dried fruits are palatable. but perhaps are not used as extensively as those mentioned, in any other form than stewed.

Since such delightful desserts can be made from dried fruits without a great deal of trouble and cost, why not include more of them in your diet each week?



Great Master of Music Under Heavy Handicap

There is a false impression that Beethoven in his later years was able to play beautifully, despite his deafness. This seemed so incredible to one who has always insisted with his piano pupils "that the ear is the greatest guide to good planoforte playing," that he carried his investigations to the contemporaries of Beethoven. Finally, a trustworthy account of his playing was found in the autobiography of Ludwig Spohr-unbiased because Spohr was a great friend of Beethoven. Beethoven did not play well after he had lost his hearing. literally from Spohr's autobiography. Spohr went to a rehearsal at which Beethoven played one of his trios. He writes:

"The impression was bad, since Beethoven from the very first notes played the plano very poorly. It was obvious that Beethoven heard literally nothing, and also that there was no remnant left of the virtuosity he possessed when he had his full powers of hearing. In forte passages he played so loud that the wires clashed, and in plano passages so softly that whole groups of notes were entirely inaudible. Deafness is a terrible affliction for anyone, but for the master it is beyond comparison."

When Sabbath Was Day of Rigid Observance

is Connecticut, perhaps more than auywhere else, Sunday was a sort of repular idoi, nor did the rigor of its observance abate perceptibly until long after the Revolution.

This extreme scrupulosity about Sabbath keeping was doubtless the moving cause of the building of the "Szhbath-day houses"; these were litfie shantles standing on the meeting house green, each intended to accommodate a family during the interval between the two services.

Some Sabbath-day houses were built with a stall at one end to shelter the horse, while the family took refuge in the other, where there was a chimney and a meager furniture of rude seats and a table.

Here on arrival before the first service the owners lighted a fire and deposited their luncheon, and to this camplike place they came back to eat their doughauts and thaw themselves out after their first long sitting in the Arctic climate of the meeting house. Sometimes two families had a Sabbath-day house together.

But some parishes in Massachusetts and perhaps elsewhere, had a common "noon house" for all comers to rest in. Fireside assemblages on Sunday. whether in the parsonage or the noon house, were in danger of proving delightful to those who were prone to enjoy the society of other human beings, and hence the pastors "were put upon their best contrivances" to have most of the interval between the services filled up with the reading aloud of edifying books and other exercises calculated to keep the mind in a becomingly irksome frame.-Philadelphia Inquirer.



DERA LAID ROAD FUND APPORTIONED TO STATES

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine today announced the apportionment of, 73,125,125,000 to the States for use in the construction of federal aid roads. This apportionment was authorized by the Post Office Appropriation Act of February 12, 1925, and is for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. 1926

The new funds will be spent entirey on the Federal aid highway sysem under the same plan of cooperation with the States that has been in successful operation for ten years. The roads included in the system are the most important in the country and reach directly or indirectly every city of over 5000 population. The ureau reports that approximately miles of Federal-aid road were brought to completion during 1925 md the indications are that the coming year will be equally successful. 
