#### SANTA FE CROP REPORT TEXAS AND LOUISIANA

Cotton in east, south and central Texas lately has been benefitted by good rains. Flea hoppers are out in many localities but little age has been done. In west Texas and in the Panhandle cotton is it excellent condition, although rain is needed. There has been no troe from pests in those sections. The state's cotton acreage is about normal. While it is too early to m dependable estimates, reliable dealers and growers express the belief that the yield will run from 3,500,000 to 4,000,000 bales.

The production of wheat, mainly in the western and northwestern counties and in the counties east of the Panhandle, likely will reach 30,000,000 bushels, of excellent quality. The bulk of the crop has been marketed.

Feed crops in all parts of the state are coming along rapidly. With rain soon in the sections where it is needed, enormous yields will be made, giving promise of a good year for livestock. Timely rains have kept pastures in fair condition.

Yields of melons, fruit and vegetables have been from fair to good. The market has been satisfactory most of the time.

In Southwest Louisiana the farm conditions are similar to those in east Texas. This is largely reclaimed timber country. New settlers are building it up rapidly.

#### Has Complete History of Spanish Mantilla

At last I have found the trail, Franels Miltoun exclaims, in exultant mood, in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Lately it turned up again among a mass of notes. #### College for Engineers

To supply trained engineers, especially for the automobile, motorcycle and bicycle industries, a technical col lege will be established at Wolverhampton, England. The total cost of construction will be about \$600,000, of which one-third is to be paid by the county of Stafford and the remaining two-thirds by the city of Wolverhamp

The buildings will be divided into five sections: (1) general and administrative, (2) biology, (3) commercial. (4) domestic, and (5) technical, conprising engineering production with workshops and drawing offices, material section, including chemistry, metallurgy, and general science subjects.

It is intended to make provision for evening as well as day students.

#### Bromine From Sea Water The strangest ship that ever sailed

the seas left Wilmington, Del., recently on one of the strangest voyages that ever a ship sailed. This ship, called the Ethyl, is in reality a great float-Ing chemical laboratory, equipped to extract the element bromine from sea

Bromine is a raw material useful in medicine, in photography and motion pictures, and in the manufacture of the ethyl fluid used in motor fuel. Through the last use of the world's supply the chemical has become greatly depleted, and the voyage of the Ethyl is the first step in an elaborate plan to find other sources of supply.

## Monster Steam Boiler

The largest steam boiler in the world is being put in in Pittsburgh, Pa., by a heating company. There are six miles of four-incli steel tubing in the heating and condensing apparatus, with a heating surface of about three fourths of an acre. The boller is rated at 3,000 horse-power by the ordinary system of rating, but is capable of operating continuously at three times this capacity and for short periods at four times this rate. When at full load it evaporates 200 tons of water an hour.

## Trains Negro Preachers

Each summer for seven years a negro preachers' institute has been held at Bettis academy, in the sand hill country of western South Carolina. Last year's attendance included 200 preachers and 180 teachers, and they spent four days in intensive sulects, under the leadership of Dr. ames H. Dillard, president of the leanes and Slater funds.

These alternate layers of eggs and stones are slowly built up until the pile reaches a height of eight

#### Hardly Draw Breath During Winter Sleep

The mild weather sometimes observed during winter occasionally wakes before their time animals which have been spending the winter buried in the ground or in trees. While these creatures are asleep, often for months, respiration seems to be totally suspended.

A hedgehog was recently immersed in a pail of cold water, and though the ducking was continued for thirty minutes the animal was taken out unhurt. So slight was its breathing that practically no water entered its

dloxide. In their normal state they have expired almost immediately; but in their winter sleep they have survived after four hours in the gas chambers.




