HOGS: Yes we are going to un dertake to secure orders for at least two cars of gilts for Terry County and our farmers are requested to place their orders with the secretary within the next few weeks. It is a well known fact that there is only one hog for each three families in Texas and that Terry county does not come up to this average. A hog to each member of the family is considered average consumption and as we have an estimated population of 12,000 it is easy to see where we would be able to absorb several thousand head and why we are sending out \$100,000 each year for meat and lard and none of this money ever. returns to us.

Several fellows have said that they would be more interested in finding a market for our large crop of corn and grain sorghum than any other matter, but if we had two brood sows. four cows and a hundred chickens to each farm we would have a better market at home and save the shipping charges at least one way.

Sometime during September or the early part of October an effort is going to be made to organize a Poultry & Dairy Association and specialists in this line of work are going to be present and assist in making the right start. 



BROWNFIELD PEOPLE ARE .CUESTS OF LOVINGTON

On Wednesday of this week the Brownifeld Chamber of Commerce with their band were the guests of Lovington from 10 a. m. till 2 9. m. They were making a "good-will" trip through this section of New Mexico. having been three days on their iourney?

They left Brownfield about eighty strong Monday morning and, went by way of Tatum to Roswell and then ton Artesia and Carlsbad the first day. Tuesday was spent in taking in the sights at Carlsbad and in a visit to the Cayern. To say that they were most wonderfully impressed with the visit to this wonderful attraction would be putting it rather mildly. They left Carlsbad Wednesday morning and arrived in Lovington about ten o'clock. They were met by tion. representatives of the Lovington Chamber of Commerce and were first taken to the irrigation plant of H. T. Lancaster west of town where they were given an opportunity of seeing a pumping plant in operation. What

they saw here was a revelation to many of them. They had heard of the Shallow Water Belt of the Lovington country, but few of them realized its immensity. Here they saw the pure clear water pumped from the well and flowing out upon the ground at the rate of 400 gallons a minute. They also saw the effects of the water upon the growing crops of Mr. Lancaster. Here they saw corn as fine as any that grows on Missouri river bottom lands. None of the visitors estimated the yield at less than 75 bushel to the acre. They were also astonished to learn of the extent of this Shallow Water Belt, extending as it does 25 miles to the north of us and an equal distance to the south: extending to the Texas state line, 20 miles to the east of us and from ten to fifteen miles to the west, covering an area of more than 1,500 square miles, or about one million acres, with just that. Lovington in nearly the geographical center of this great country.

Upon their return to town they found the ladies of Lovington assembled upon the court house lawn where a lunch was being spread for the hungry visitors. After a few selections by the Brownfield band, the visitors were invited to assemble around the well laden tables where they were served with sandwiches. pie and coffee. They, as well as the local people, did full justice to the good things to eat. After lunch a band concert was given, and it was fully appreciated by our people. The Brownfield band has some excellent musicians among its members and their playing shows that they have hadtraining from a master musician-and indeed, any one who has ever seen their bandmaster, J. S. Powell (Pappa In action will understand that this is true. An address of welcome was given by Luke Roberts, president of the Lovington Chamber of Commerce which was responded to by Mr. Thomas and by Mr. Shelton, Secretary of the Brownfield Chamber of Commerce. The speakers all spoke for a more closely united action and feeling between the two towns. It was generally agreed that the greatest need that exists at the present time is a direct highway connecting Brownfeld and Lovington so that tourists may pass directly through the two places to the Carlsbad Cavern Mr. Shelton predicted that when this road is built it will be one of the most traveled highways in the United States. The visitors departed with a much warmer feeling for the Lovington people. They said that while they, had seen many wonderful things at Carlsbad, they would remember Lovington longer and think of it and its hospitable people oftener than any other place at which they stopped while on this trip .- Lovington Leader.





STRAIGHT TALKS WITH AUNT EMMY

ON HOUSEHOLD BUDGETS

"Aunt Emmy." asked Helen. "won't you explain what is meant by a house hold budget? You said something the other day about budgets, but I'don't seem clear in my mind about it." "A budget is simply a plan." said Aunt Emmy. "You plan what you are going to do with your income. You divide your income systematically so that you can meet your needs. You lay aside a part of your income for rent, other parts for food, clothing, heat, light, telephone, recreation, sav ings and so on."

How are you going to know how much you should spend for each thing -on rent for instance, Aunty?" asked Helen

"Experts have studied the question carefully and have worked out budrets to suit every income. Of course. you can alter these typical budgets slightly to suit your particular needs. For example, the average budget that covers incomes of from \$2.000 to \$10.-000 a year divides your income into six parts. Ten per cent for savings. twenty per cent for rent, twenty per cent for food, twenty per cent for what is called betterment and includes education, amusement, entertainment, books, music, sports; fifteen per cent for clothes and fifteen per cent for operating expenses.

"No matter how you change the other items you must not change the savings allowance-except to increase it. A great majority of men who reach sixty are dependent on relatives or charity. If they had saved only ten cents out of every dollar, they would not have been in that plight. There is nothing like money in the savings bank to help you through the emergencies that come in everybody's life.
