### NOTICE OF ELECTION

#### "ELECTION ORDER"

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas:

That an election be held on the 26th day of October 1926, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Brownfield, Texas, in the sum of \$60,000.00, payable serially within forty years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing street improvements, in the City of Brownfield, Texas, authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, with reference to cities and towns."

The said election shall be held at the Courthouse in the City of Brownfield, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election to-wit:

A. M. Brownfield, Presiding officer.  
Jack Head, J. C. Bond, Judges.  
Glenn Harris, A. W. Endersen, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns and only qualified voters, who are property tax payers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF TAX THEREFOR."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF TAX THEREFOR."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Brownfield, Texas, attested by the City Secretary of the said City shall serve proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of Brownfield, Texas, for at least thirty full days prior to the date of the said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, to-wit: Terry County Herald, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

### FORTY YEARS AGO—AND NOW

There is no teacher like a clear-minded editor who drives home fundamental facts in simple-worded editorials. Such an editor seems to be at the helm of "The Insurance Field," published at Louisville, Kentucky. He sees the point of public interest in a "want ad" published forty years ago, and comments as follows:

"Times have changed. In a 'Forty Years Ago' column in a Kentucky newspaper, we find this 'ad' lifted from its old files for the instruction of readers today: "WANTED—A woman to cook, wash and iron for a family of four; \$2 per week."

"Today in the same state, as elsewhere, a good ordinary cook alone costs such a family ten dollars a week. The laundry work is extra, and will cost on the average of five dollars a week—or \$15 for what in 1886 cost \$2. This is an increase of 750 per cent—seven and a half times the cost of household service in forty years.

"In 1886, the average price of fire insurance in the United States was \$1.02 per \$100 of fire risks alone. In 1924 the average price for fire and lightning insurance (now combined) was 89 cents. Out of this, in 1886, the expense paid in conducting the business was 35 cents; in 1924 it was 39 cents.

"The price of insurance has in forty years decreased 12 1-2 per cent as against an increase of 750 per cent in cooking and washing service. The cost of insurance service (thelabor involved) has increased exactly 11.4 per cent!"

### MA WON'T RESIGN UNTIL TIME UP

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 9.—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, of Texas, will hold her office until the expiration of the term for which she was elected, her official mouth piece Representative Reuben Loftin of Henrietta, announced today.

Loftin denied reports that the governor contemplated resigning in accordance with her election wager, after he visited her office.

The first woman governor was asked to carry out the wager in a resolution which passed the house but was killed in the senate of the special session which adjourned yesterday.

### CHEVROLET TAKES A CAREER ON THE SEA

Not satisfied with playing a leading role on land, the automobile motor has taken up a career at sea.

Away upon the sun deck of the steamship President Lincoln, which sailed recently from San Francisco for the Orient, is an iron cabin—the loftiest place on the ship. It is water proof, water tight and strongly built to protect its contents from sea and weather. Inside and out, the house is neat and ship-shape and the chief engineer is the only person aboard with a key to its lock.

This cabin is known as the auxiliary room houses an electric power plant operated by a Chevrolet motor for emergency use only.

In case of an accident should everything on shipboard fail or be below water this motor generates electricity for the wireless set and for lights around the lifeboats. It is one thing that passengers and crew may depend upon in case of disaster, or as long as there is a spar above water the auxiliary will function. It is entirely independent of the ship's regular machinery and will operate without interruption, supplying current for distress calls and strong light for launching the life boats.

While in these days the possibility of a disaster at sea is practically nil, the auxiliary room gives an added feeling of security. Chief Electrician T. Armstrong of the President Lincoln opens up the little cabin once a week to test the emergency rig.

This feature of modern steamship travel indicates the degree of perfection to which automobile power has been developed. It is nothing short of marvelous that those faltering pieces of mechanism which first propelled automobiles less than three decades ago, have been so perfected as to be selected now to serve as life savers in case all else fail.

### STEEL FRAME BUILDINGS SOON TO BE WELDED

The clattering din of steel rivets on building girders may soon give way to the flame of the electric arc and the steel skeleton of the future skyscraper may be in a single, welded unit.

Welded iron pipes, welded tanks and welded vessels are all in use, and the welded steel building is the next step forward.

Decreased cost, greater strength and lighter material are all factors in the welded building that will, it is said, bring about the adoption of the new method of erection. Steel parts will be cut to pattern, much as a tailor cuts the parts of a coat, but without the necessity of the precise accuracy needed when lines of rivet holes are matched.

The weld is made by the electric arc, which melts the ends of the steel to be joined. The steel wire melts in the terrific heat of the arc and is fused with the molten edges of the beam or girder.

The cost of drilling thousands of rivet holes will be saved; the strength of the arc weld is equal to that of the parts welded, and the weld joint is impervious to water, oil or gas, while the expense is said to be only one-fourth of that of riveting.

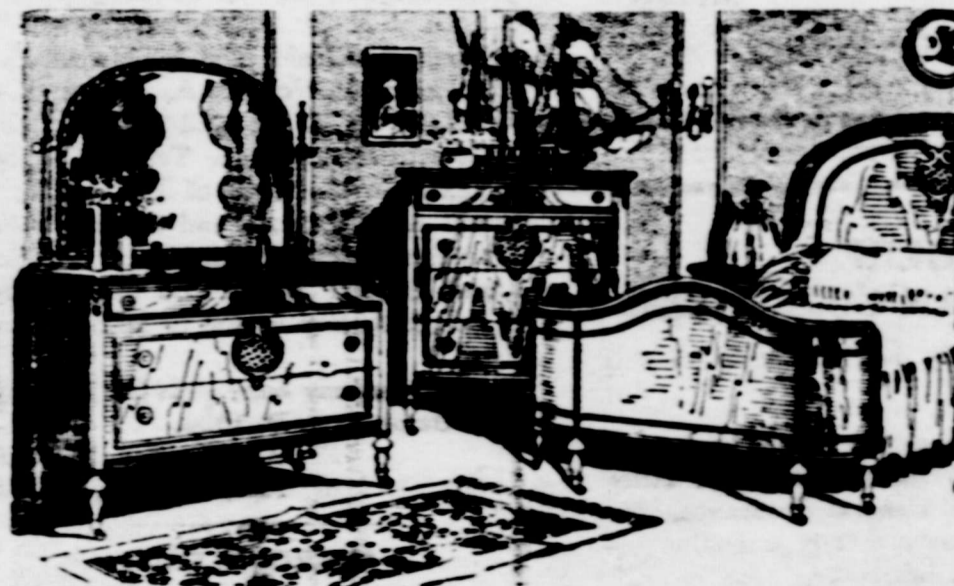

### THE COST OF PAVING

The Devlin Engineering Company's estimate on cost of street paving in the business section on a basis of 68 feet wide, 2 1-2 inch brick on 4 inch concrete base is \$10.16 per front foot, plus 50 cents per front foot for curb. The estimated cost for secondary street, where the paving will be only forty feet wide is \$6.19 per front foot plus fifty cents per front foot for curb.

On this basis, the cost in the main business district for paving will be \$2666.50 per lot, and on the secondary streets a cost of \$167.25 per 25 foot lot.

The City Council believes this estimate to be reliable, as the estimate on the water works system as well as the estimate on the sewer system was greater than the contract price called for.

### TEXAS U. IN NEED OF A MUSEUM

AUSTIN, Texas, October 5.—It is a long way from West Texas to the University of Munich in southern Germany. Sellards, associate director of the Bureau of Economic Geology of the University of Texas. Of even greater significance is the fact that a collection of these fossils is not to be found in the state of Texas. The existence of a fine collection of fossils depicting the natural history of Texas housed in a foreign museum affords, according to Dr. Sellards, the most convincing argument for a State Museum for Texas?

**GOVERNOR TO SIGN BILL  
TO AID SCHOOLS**

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 10.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson will not reconvene the Thirty-Ninth Legislature for a second call session, she advised friends late Friday. She will sign the \$3,500,000 appropriation to the available school fund in order that the per capita apportionment will be increased from \$11.50 to \$14, and the schools will have long terms and the teachers will receive commensurate salaries, she told her friends.

Gov. Ferguson and her husband, former Gov. James E. Ferguson expressed regret to a number of their supporters that the called session did not pass the gasoline tax to insure additional revenue for the schools and the Highway Department, but said that for the school children of Texas, Mrs. Ferguson would sign the appropriation bill.

### STUDIES CAUSES WEATHER DAMAGE TO COTTON

Weather damage to raw cotton after picking has long been a source of much waste, entailing annual losses estimated at upward of \$25,000,000, says the Department of Agriculture in a new bulletin. By "weather damage" is meant damage that results from excessive moisture in bales of cotton. Department studies have shown that there are two distinct stages in the process of deterioration of cotton as a result of this condition—mildew or discoloration, and decay of the fiber.

Mildew, according to the bulletin, lowers the grade and consequently the value, but does not seriously weaken the fiber.

The fiber, however, is seriously weakened by the process of decay, and if it is not stopped the fiber eventually will be destroyed entirely.

Excess moisture may have been permitted to get in the cotton in a number of ways before it is ginned and packed. It may have been picked before fully mature or while wet with rain. It may have been rained upon after being picked. The cotton may have become damp while piled on the ground in the field, or it may have been stored temporarily in cotton houses or sheds with leaky roofs. When wet cotton is taken to the gin, the resulting bale is excessively wet and damage to the fiber results.

More frequently, moisture gets into the bale after it is packed, either from rain or snow directly on the or wet floors or walls, leaky roofs of cotton, absorption from the ground warehouses or freight cars, or exposure on freight or compress platforms.

Six tests were made by the department in five representative localities in the Cotton Belt. In each of these experiments but one, seven bales of cotton were used, one bale being stored in a warehouse, and the remaining six bales exposed to the weather under various conditions. The loss in the exposed bales varied from a few pounds to more than 50 per cent of a bale. Thirty-five bales were exposed during the experiments, and from an original total weight of 17,622 pounds there was a loss of 3,530 pounds. The six stored bales lost an average of less than 1 per cent.

To protect cotton from weather damage, the bulletin says, it is of the greatest possible importance that the bales be kept from contact with the ground or any other source of moisture. Cotton should be matured thoroughly and dried out before it is ginned. If it is ginned while wet, the staple probably will be "gin cut" and in other ways damaged, and the resulting bale will have an excess of moisture. When it is impossible to place the cotton in a warehouse immediately, the bales should be placed on poles and turned often. Copies of the department's publication, entitled Department Bulletin No. 1438-D, "Weather Damage to Cotton," may be obtained by writing the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

### BROWNFIELD IN LINE FOR THIS EXTENSION

DALLAS, Oct. 2.—Further complications in the West Texas rail situation appeared possible when C. N. Whitehead, president of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad, testifying in the Interstate Commerce Commission hearing on the proposal to consolidate his road with the Kansas City Southern and the Cotton Belt, divulged that his lines plans an extension of its Texas Central lines west of Rotan.

Whitehead was being questioned by Chairman Clarence E. Gilmore of the Texas Rail Road Commission, but was excused from revealing the exact nature of his plans.

L. F. Loree, chairman of the board of the Katy and the Kansas City Southern, on a visit to Dallas last spring, admitted an interest in the West Texas Rail Road situation. The Santa Fe, Fort Worth and Denver and other lines are disputing over the right to build in this section.

### TO TRY IMPORTANT CASES NEXT WEEK

The case of the State of Texas vs. Lloyd Dawson has been set for trial in the district court next Monday and the State of Texas vs. Eddie Stell, Wednesday.

The charge against each of these young men is rape and special venire of 75 men has been ordered in each case. Defendants reside at Wilson. They belong to prominent families there and much interest in that locality is being manifested in the cases.—Lynn County News.

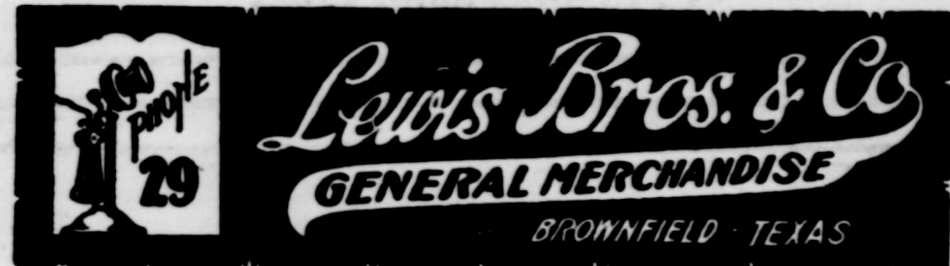

#### WOMAN CARRIED WATER CHICAGO TO OMAHA

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has recently released a film called "Turn on the Water" Rural engineering specialists in the Bureau of Public Roads found a woman living on a Maryland farm whose home was surveyed walked a distance of 440 miles a year carrying water from the farm pump to her house. The mileage about equals the distance from Chicago to Omaha; and, remember, she was carrying a pail or two of water all the time! Yet there are still ten farms unequipped to one equipped to eliminate this kind of horse drudgery, says the Department of Agriculture. The Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers reports the recent organization of a farm Water System Department in the national association to aid the farmer through the agricultural college extension workers in getting this problem of farm health solved. Gas engines, hydraulic rams, windmills, pumps, water softeners and automatic water systems all figure in the plans of giving the farmer a cheap system to meet his needs.

#### ANOTHER BRAINSTORM

Terry county, away out in West Texas, is to harvest thirty thousand bales of cotton this season, according to estimates from Brownfield. It doesn't sound reasonable, but probably is true. The broad acres of West Texas are productive acres, now that hardy farmers have settled there and begun cultivation where cultivation was unknown a few years ago. Thirty thousand bales of cotton will bring a lot of good American dollars into Terry county.—Exchange.

Officers of the association are: President, C. K. Durham, Waco; vice president, J. Ed. Brown, McGregor; secretary, E. A. Flowers, Waco. The executive board is composed of Waco bankers, as follows: W. W. Woodson, C. F. Dumas, J. K. Ror., W. G. Lacy and J. M. Nash.

It is proposed that the Cotton Control Association shall continue in existence until dissolved by the executive board.

Four delegates were selected to represent the association at the Southern Cotton Conference, to be held in Memphis, Tenn., next Wednesday.

#### PRIZE FIGHTING A DISGRACE TO AMERICA

The American people can derive little comfort or credit from the fact that while \$2,000,000 was paid to see a professional prize fight, calls for funds to alleviate the suffering of thousands in the unprecedented calamity that befell Florida, went practically unheeded. Four days after the catastrophe less money had been subscribed for relief than was paid to see an exhibition characterized by brutality, betting and blood.

The incident has not gone by unnoticed; nor has it made prize fighting more popular. Indeed, it has made such affairs disgusting.

The Clarwater (Florida) Herald believes that this last affair will be the "handwriting on the wall for the ring 'sport' as now conducted."

"The fight game," says the Herald, "has been in bad odor for a long time. There is something repugnant at the spectacle of hundreds of thousands of dollars tossed into the laps of two unlettered bruisers. And the fact that the 'fight' was a fight, a brutal, savage, gory, elemental struggle of brute force against brute force is likely to arouse the pulpits, certain sections of the press and perhaps a great many citizens to demand that an end shall be put to this sort of thing."

"It is difficult to see what respect the Tunney-Dempsey affray was upon any higher level than the detested bull fight."—Exchange.
