ARMISTICE CELEBRATED WITH BIG PARADE

Armistice Day was opened here by the firing of anvils before good day light by the former service men and others who got up that early. After a round of anvil shooting, the boy: got their skillets, bread, eggs and bacon and repaired to the Legion Hall where a rouring camp fire had been prepared, and once again they lived over those days in the training camps and near the lines of foreign battlefields.

About eleven o'clock a parade line was formed on east Hardin, and at a signal of about the time the Armistice was signed in 1918, the fire sireen was turned on. This was a signal for the six gins which were all fired up, and for about five minutes we "stay at homes" thought of that night in 1918 when we fairly turned ourselves loose and were just boys again in celebrating peace.

But on came the parade with many and various sizes of our national banner, from the big one belonging to the American Legion to the little fellows carried by the tiny school children. Every business house also had its flar out front. First came W. A. Bynum, former U. S. sailor, acting as marshall of the day on a spanking pony, closely followed by the Chamber of Commerce Band playing one of those famous military marches of which our nation and especially Sousa are famous. Close behind the band was some thirty or forty ex-service men, some in uniform, but all with a quick proud step that could not be stopped by the Kaiser's crack veterens. Following them was our Boy Scouts, who are our peace time protectors, and them men of the future that our nation will depend most up-Then came a band of men representing the local Woodmen lodge, whose merits are too widely known to need any introduction from us.

Then came some six hundred school children, headed by the Seniors, then the juniors, sophmores, freshmen and the grades. Many of these had decorated floats that would have done credit to much larger towns and schools. Even the tiny tots of the kindergarten and first grade had a b'z double float well decorated. But one youngster on a single float representing Uncle Sam, probably attracted the most attention.

POULTRY RATIONS MUST

A hen cannot lay one-half an egg. The closest she can approach this is these facts may be self-evident to the average farmer there is a moral in the foregoing statement-material

"Make use of the feeds that are grown on the farm," advises D. C. Henderson, poultry extension specialists at State College, South Dakata. "Corn and other grains raised should make up the greater part of the ration. However a ration that consists entirely of corn contains at excess of the material from which the yolk is made and not enough for the proten, or the material for the development of the white.

"If the hen is given a ration lov in proten, such as the straight grain rations, the proten in the grain must be stored up from day to day, and production is limited by lack of proten in the feeds. Milk is one of the best sources of proten. On farms where the amount milk is not limited. satisfactory egg production may be obtained through feeding shellee corn in hoppers and skim milk in the place of water.

"If milk is not available, tankage or meat scraps may be used. In this case limit the amount of corn in the morning by feeding the amount that the flock will clean up in fifteer minutes. Give the birds all the corr they will eat in the evening. Keep the tankage or meat scraps in the feeders before the flock all the time.

Henderson advises that proten lacking in the grain feeds may be supplied in the form of tankage or meat scraps fed in combination with ground feeds. A ration which he ad vises as practical on farms that are equipped to grind feed is composed of 65 pound of yellow corn, 20 lb: cracked wheat or wheat middlings 10 pounds of tankage or meat scraps four pounds of bone meal and one pound of salt .- Farm and Ranch.
