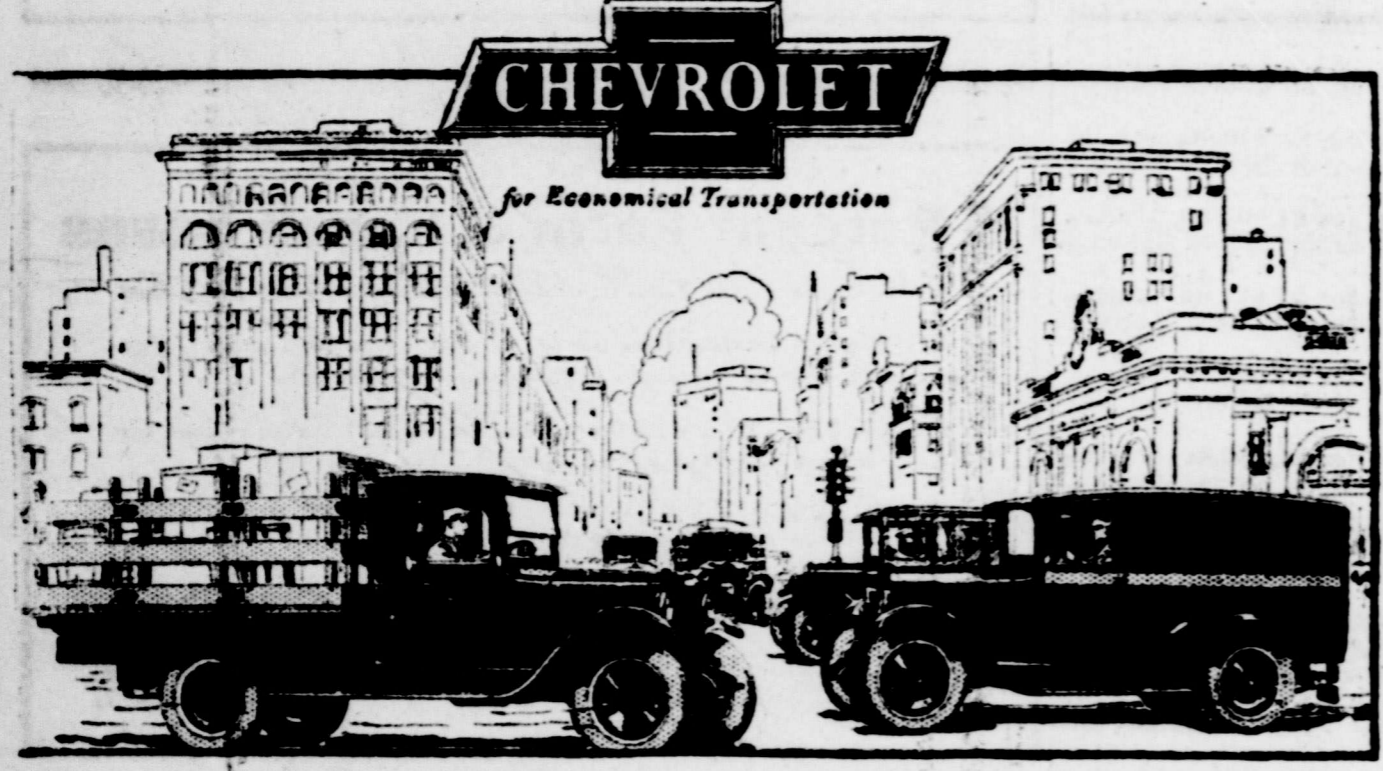

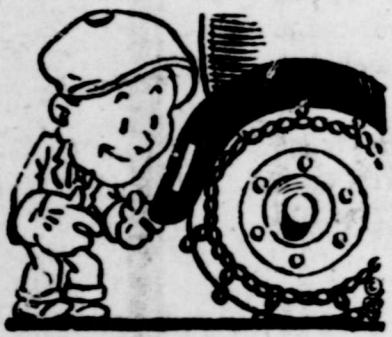

THE PEOPLE MAKE THE INSURANCE RATES

Insurance companies writing fire and lightning insurance have for the past six years suffered an underwriting loss each year varying from 1.23 per cent to as high as 6.89 per cent. Income from invested funds which insurance companies maintain as reserves to protect policyholder had to pay the deficit on the business they wrote.

The fact is self evident that there must either be fewer fires or higher rates.

Now comes the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters, and for 1926 shows that automobile public liability insurance was for that year written at a net loss of \$1,330,000 on total premiums of \$108,800,000. The loss resulted in spite of the fact that the companies reduced the cost of writing business from 27.4 per cent in 1923 to 25.6 in 1926, but loss ratios increased from 45.6 per cent in 1923 to 53.5 per cent in 1926.

The public has a real interest in the situation of the insurance companies. These companies cannot pull money out of the thin air to meet losses—it must come from the rates charged. As the individual is responsible for the majority of fires and accidents, he virtually establishes his own insurance rates, because rates are based on the law of average.

It will be remembered that insurance is a self-imposed form of taxation and like all other taxation the rate is in the hands of the people.

WORKING AGAINST GRAVITY

That old boy in Dante's "Inferno" who has an everlasting job of rolling a stone up a hill, only to see it roll down again, and having to start all over—that fellow ought to know something about the force of gravity by this time, if he's still at the same job and hasn't gone out on a strike.

The peculiar thing about gravity is that it helps you to roll the stone down hill but when it comes to pushing it up hill, gravity not only refuses to help, but, worse than that, it hinders. It pulls against you. Gravity, in fact, seems to be bound to keep things down. The only thing it can't touch is the high cost of living—and it may get that yet, if someone doesn't watch out.

In business there is a sort of gravity which tries to keep things from moving. It is harder to progress than to slide back, just as it is harder to walk than to stand still or sit in a Morris chair. That is, it's harder, unless your ambition, your aspiration is stronger than the inertia which retains you. The only thing that makes progress and work and success easy is the possession of a passion for accomplishment. If you have an end in view, then your desire, your ambition, your pride will not let you sleep until you have accomplished that end.

The only way to overcome gravity is to oppose it with a force stronger than itself. Likewise, the only way to overcome the downward pull of

sloth, the gravity of the human aversion to work and difficulties, is to oppose it with a stronger desire to attain the height of success.—The Office Cat.
