### **Chamber of Commerce** C-U-R-R-E-N-T-S

By the Secretary

After several months of effort trying to get some one to establish a Commercial Hatchery in Brownfield, this office is now able to announce that a citizen of the town has investigated the matter and decided to enter the business. Beginning January 1st a 12,000 egg incubator will be ready for custom hatching and it will not be longer necessary for our people to send their eggs out of the county for hatching or purchase baby chicks from other hatcheries.

Petitions are in circulatioin at each of the banks, gins and the Post Office requesting the Agricultural Extension Department of the International Harvester Companny to hold a two day short course in Brownfield. If we succeed in securing the course it will probably be either in December or January. All persons who are interested in it are requested to sign and please do it this week, as it is desired to send the request in to the company the early part of next week. People of the town as well as the country should sign as all are interested and this includes women as well as men.

This office is advised by the United States Labor Bureau at Fort Worth, that cotton pickers are coming into Abilene and Sweetwater at the rate of about 400 hundred each day and it is suggested that our farmers go to Sweetwater in order to secure them before the other counties do so. The Labor Bureau also advises that it will endeavor to route pickers directly to this county. Just as soon as the petitions for the short course are disposed of, a petition to the commissioners court calling for the employment of a demonstration agent will be circulated. Several hundred names will be needed and it will call for intensive work county who have resided in counties we had out of old tickle box. But as who have agents are very anxious to see the proposition successfully completed. Numbers of people are planting as we would like to see. It can be planted as late as December 15th.

### **Attention Farmers**

Last year the South Plains farmers made an enormous cotton crop. but prices were so low that after paying for the picking and ginning, they had very little money left.

In order to partly relieve this situation, the ginners of Brownfield met with a committee of representative farmers, and agreed to reduce the price of ginning until cotton market improved, and as the market continued low the remainder of the season, the price of ginning agreed on was maintained the remainder of the season, with the ginners operating at ton, and from a small to heavy loss on the worst of the crop.

The Herald is pleased to announce that the Brownfield Laundry is prearing to make some much needed improvements that will put them in position to do as good work and as quickly as can be done in the larger steam laundries. The owners, Messrs. Wall & Shelton said this week that they were installing a boiler and a drying house.

With the addition of a steam boiler, they will be permitted to do real steam laundering, as well as the possibility of putting in the drying room. The later is something that has handicapped their operations, especially in cloudy or rainy weather, as they have been depending on the sun to do their drying, and if there be no sun, they simply had to wait until they did.

Now, with the new arrangements, as soon as the clothes are thoroughly cleaned, they are put into this steam dry room,, the steam is turned onand lo! the clothes are soon driedrain or shine.



President Mirabeau B. Lamar was the first to take direct action looking to the establishment of the public school. In his message to the Texas congress of 1838 he urged setting aside land for this purpose.

The following are legal holidays by statute in Texas: New Year's Day, January 1; Washington's Birthday, February 22; National Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, 1st Monday in each September; Election Day on 1st Tues. after the 1st Mon. in Nov of election years; Thanksgiving Day (movable); Christmas, December 25; Texas Independence Day, March 2 San Jucinto Day, April 21; Jefferson Davis' Birthday, June 3; Texas Pioneer's Day, August 12.

#### U. OF T. GETS VALUABLE NEWSPAPER FILES

Austin, Texas .- Files of the "Syboda," Bohemian newspaper published at La Grange, Texas, and covering the last 50 years, has been presented to the University of Texas library by Judge Augustine Haidusek, of La Grange, editor of the paper. The files are complete and cover the entire period since the establishment of the paper. The files are believed to be the most important source for the Bohemian hiistory in Texas by Mrs. Mattie A. Hatcher, keeper of the University archives.

Judge Haidusek came to America from Bohemia when a young man. He and his father and other members of the family were the first Bohemians to settle west of the Colorado river. The Judge was also the first Bohemian to be admitted to practice law in the United States and also the first Bohemian mayor elected in this country, having been elected mayor of La Grange in 1875 He was also elected a member of the 17th Legislature.

The Syboda was started by Judge Haidusek in December 1885, to counteract the tendencies of the Slovan, a Bohemian weekly published and edited by Joseph Cada of La Grange, which incensed the Bohemians of **Texas against Judge Haidusek and** caused many indignation meetings of the people for the purpose of denouncing the Judge's efforts to make English the language of the school rooms in Bohemian localities.

In the beginning, the Syboda was owned by a stock company consisting of 50 members and edited by a man from New York. In 1887 the paper had only about 400 subscribers and an indebtedness of \$2,400. Judge Haidusek then took over the management of the paper and within two years he had greatly increased the number of subscriptions and had paid off the debt.

#### THE CATTLEMAN IS COMING INTO HIS OWN

Everything now indicates that the cattleman is again to come back after some of the hardest times ever experienced by any industry. For six years the cattle business has been a losing proposition. Year after year, those engaged in it have been holding on, hoping almost against hope for better times, and now their reward is in sight. From all the packing centers come the same story of a great shortage of beef cattle, with prices going higher and higher. Last week grass-fed steers in Kansas City sold for 14 cents, while a car of corn-fed stuff brought 16 cents. From Sioux City comes the report of a sale of fat calves at that place for 18 cents. These prices are much higher than have been known since the big drop in 920.



The city well was frilled to the second water sand or about 180 feet.

Connections are now being made ind water will be turned into the tandpipe during the latter part of he week, after which the town will be afforded full fire protection, as well as a water supply for domestic and commercial use.

The sewer system is also nearing completion and it is probable that ooth systems will be in operation by the early part of next week .- Levelland Herald.

#### CHINESE ELM RECOMMENDED AS SHADE TREES

For shade or as a windbreak, the hinese elm has proven its value in nost sections of the United States. . This tree was introduced about 20 years ago and it has been growing in popularity ever since. It is recommended for many climates. This elm s especially valuable in regious where he rainfall is light and where there are wide extremes of heat and coldin places where few trees thrive, in other words. Trials show that the chinese elm grows even more rapidly in the relatively dry area of the middle west than in the moister regions of the Atlantic coast .-- Exchange.

# Purchases Promote Prosperity

WHILE the Santa Fe is itself a large employer of labor-its payroll in 1926 totalled \$107,000,000, and its employes number more than 75,000-indirectly as a buyer of materials and supplies it helps to furnish employment to many more. Such purchases last year exceeded \$64,000,000. In addition it bought over \$12,000,000 of new cars and locomotives.

Its largest class of material was fuel, which totalled \$24,360,000. This consisted of about 2,267,000 tons of coal, and 507,800,000 gallons of fuel oil. The use of coal or oil on any division is determined primarily by which

The second largest class of purchases was iron and steel products, for which the expenditure was approximately \$19,750,000. This included an expenditure of \$9,500,000 for 152,700 tons of rail, frogs, switches, and fastenings. \$1,500,000 went for wheels, axles, and tires, and \$306,000 for flues and tubes for locomotives. Bridges, turntables, structural steel, forgings, and fabricated, unfabricated, and pressed steel took nearly \$3,000,000. Steel and iron are basic necessities in railroading.

Purchases of forest products totalled \$6,412,000, which included over 3,000,000 cross ties, and large quantities of lumber and timbers. The Santa Fe creosotes its ties and much of its timbers, otherwise greater quantities would be needed each year.

Folders, report blanks, notices, tickets, tariffs, and various items in the stationery line required \$1,225,000, electrical materials \$660,000, lubricating oil and grease, illuminating oils, waste, etc., \$1,180,000, and air brake material \$617,600.

These purchases were necessary to maintain the railroad properly and to give satisfactory service to the public. They were covered by 130,000 invoices and were made from 3,347 individuals and firms. Note the wide spread of this buying.

Thus the Santa Fe and all railroads are an important factor in maintaining the prosperity of our country through the employment arising from these large purchases of supplies, as well as the millions directly disbursed among their own employes for services.

When the railroads are doing well, they buy materials and supplies on a larger scale than when net revenues fall off. Money thus spent mainly pays for the labor of many persons, helping merchants, farmers, everybody -your own community included. You therefore are vitally interested.
