A trip was made along the line and agreements secured all interested parties and the papers were mailed to the commission in time to be placed before them in their present session. In the meantime Odessa, and one or two other towns have sent delegates and these are going to insist that something be done. The route had a tentative designation, back in March and we have been waiting for an inspection by the State Engineer since that time. We understand that the reason for delay is that he has more work than one man can look after and will have to have two or more assistants allowed by the next Legislature. A letter from him since the petition was mailed to the commission has been received and he says that if we can wait that he will be able to make the inspection within the next thirty days. But it is all up to the commission as anything juits us so that we get action of some sort.
