COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

FEEDING FOR CREAM

At this time of year when the pas tures are dead and no green feed is to be had the old cow is inclined to do as the hen-stop producing. And it is right when cream, butter, and eggs are highest and taste best. Feed is the biggest factor in keeping up the production. Plenty of alfalfa hay or a green wheat field s what we need for winter production out since we don't have it why not arn to some other ration. The two ig things in feeding is giving feed that will give production and the other is the cost of the feed. Both are very important.

The cheapest dairy ration for this ountry is probably that used by the Texas Tech which consists of one part cotton seed meal, one part wheat bran and two parts ground milo, kaffin r higera heads or ear corn with -huck, this is probably the best and nost economical ration that can be ration is two and one-half parts ground corn cob meal or milo heads and one part cotton seed meal. Both of these rations are to be fed with all roughness that the cow will eat.

Never feed unground corn or heads o cows for milk production. Never eed a ration of cotton seed and bran. It is not balanced and is entirely too xpensive.

Texas Compress Co. Now Mashing Bales

The writer was a visitor at the Texas Compress and Warehouse Com pany plant in the northern part of the city Monday afternoon and was immediately taken in charge by that most accomodating of fellows, Mr. I. H. Eidson, local superintendent of the plant, and shown about the place wherein they have perhaps thirty cr forty thousand invested in their huge plant.

We found that the machinery had already been installed and the plan actually working, but they were short on some needed material that Mr. Eidson expected on every train now coming in. Their huge boilers and presses as well as other machinery are brand new-no old junk ship. ped in from some other place. The Santa Fe has allowed them to build a switch track along side the sheds in order to make it convenient for loading purposes.

The first hundred bales of cotton was pressed the first of the week.and hundreds of others are awaiting the press when we called. This means a great saving to the shippers, a difference of about 50 cents per bale of compressed and gin pressed cotton intended for shipment to ports. In fact the railroads will not, we understand take cotton for shipment further than the first compress.

There is another big item in having the cotton compressed in Brownfield. for some 18 hands are employed here for about five or six months of the year at good wages, and these people in return turn part of this money to the city in one form or another, and verybody in the city benefits indirectly from this big pay roll.

R. B. Davis, county agent, attended the meeting of the catalog com-Show at Plainview, Monday. A bigger and better spring dairy show is which will be entered butter, different kinds of cheese, ice cream and all other products of dairying. Special classes for 4-H Club boys and students of vocational agriculture will be made in jerseys. Judging contests for club boys and voc. agri. students will be held in connection with the show. The Terry county boys will have to begin to study up on the dairy cattle and be ready for the contest.

Farmers art learning that corn alone is not an economical feed for fattening hogs. Corn with tankage or corn with commercial protein supplement have given excellent results. J. W. Childers of Seminole, recently sold a bunch of well finished hogs that made an average gain of one and three fourths pounds per day on corn and tankage fed in a self feeder. This is a good gain when the fact is the hogs were a mixed lot. C. W. Wescott reports a gain of more than two pounds per day on the same feed. A hog can no more thrive on corp and water than a man can on bread and water.

Jess Smith purchased a car of feeder pigs a few days back and will fatten them out. Feeding of hogs and cattle under normal conditions pay.

Howell & Lovelace have a nice bunch of calves in the feed lot at the Tankersley dairy. These calves will be watched with a great deal of interest as it is one means of marketing cheap feed.



WOULD STABILIZATION HELP THE GAMBLERS

Mr. S. Odenheimer, president of the Lane Cotton Mills Company and also president of the Permanent International Trade Exposition, New Orleans, in a recent interview said:

"In my opinion, stability in the price of cotton would be of tremendous benefit, not only to the cotton farmers, but to the cotton mills and also to the consumers of cotton goods. Large and frequent fluctuations are a very great menace to the rational demoralization in prices of cotton goods is extremely bad for the mills and their customers, and all this reacts unfavorably upon the cotton farmers who are injured from every standpoint by such fluctuations.

"I am convinced that the cotton mills have a further vital interest in the stability of cotton prices because I believe that any improvement in that direction will increase the prosperity of the cotton farmers and thus will increase their purchasing powcrs."

Mr. Odeheimer said a great deal in a few words, but he spoiled it all by concluding with the following:

"Of course you understand that at this time I am in no position to pass upon the merits of any particular plan for approaching and dealing with this extremely intricate problem."

Mr. Odenheimer like many other big business men who recognize the evils attending a fluctuating cotton market is apparently afraid to look for the source of the trouble and remove it. Farm and Ranch again suggests





The theory, supported for the first time by definite evidence, was advanced by the University of California scientist upon his return from a 14months' stay in Honolulu. His investigations and experiments were conducted in a laboratory at Kalihi hospital, a receiving station for lepers destined for incarceration at Molokai leper colony.

Doctor Walker, who said his findings are only tentative, explained that authorities long have suspected that the actinomyces bacteria might be involved in leprosy, but that no laboratory evidence hitherto had been obtained to support the suspicion. This particular bacteria, classified as a plant fungus, is said to be a soil-growing organism, like that causing lockjaw. It appears reasonable to suppose then, according to Doctor Walker, that leprosy is an infection from the soil.

The theory is materially strengthened, according to the scientist's findings, by the known fact that leprosy is most prevalent in countries where the natives run barefoot. Investigation in these places, with the soil origin of infection in mind, the adoption of shoes and the careful disinfection of wounds, provided seemingly positive evidence of the truth of the new theory.

The stumbling block in the way of obtaining experimental proof that actinomyces is the actual cause of leprosy, Doctor Walker said, lies in the fact that animals other than man are immune to the disease. In other words, it is impossible to try these bacteria any other way than on a human, and that is considered too dangerous. Howover, in his experiments in Hawail Doctor Walker found them always present in leprous tissue.

Hope of substantiation of the theory that leprosy is not contagious and that governments need not condemn the unfortunate victims to "living death" in a lepers' colony, Doctor Walker declared, lies in the East Belgian Congo, the ivory coast of Africa and other known districts where the percentages of leprosy are high and , where necessary experiments and orservation may be made.

Springer, Kalama. Gov. Roland Hartley was a speaker at the banquet.

RED CROSS NURSES AID IN HURRICANE DISASTER

In addition to their year around work in the Public Health field, the Public Health nurses of the American Red Cross have answered a number of calls to combat epidemics, and in disaster work during the year just ending, the Red Cross states.

Their greatest task was in the redef following the West Indies hurricane when 20 nurses were despatched to Florida and 32 to Porto Rico, to assume charge of the nealth work there. Epidemic conditions were especially grave in both places, and inoculation of several hundred thousand persons had to be arranged in order to prevent spread of contagious. Nursing the injured, the sick, aged and young and caring for the newborn were heavy tasks in both areas.

The Red Cross aurses also were called upon for work in epidemics in communities, including the serious septic sore throat epidemic in New England and a typhoid epidemic in New York state.

More than 580 Pec Cross Chapters throughout the nation operate nursing services which they support altogether or in part.

In Jerusalem, the little city of great things, religious observances play a part in daily life unknown in other capitals. Since it is the center of three great faiths and all their subdivisions, can it be wondered at if each faith and branch thereof jealously guards rights and rites acquired throughout centuries, often through famine, seige and untold hardship?

In a modern city, one meets people daily for years without knowing their religious beliefs. This is impossible in Jerusalem. Be he occidental or oriental, every man's religion is known to all and also the fidelity with which he carries out the obligations imposed by his faith.

The religious festivals bring their own pageantry to the city. There are Moslems with their adherents from northern Africa, India, Afghanistan, Bokhara, Arabia, and the Sudan; Christians of all denominations; Latins, including many of the religious orders and the Uniate churches which acknowledge the supremacy of the pope; the eastern churches, which comprise the Orthodox, the Armenian, and Syriac, Copts, and Abyssinians; the Anglican church ; the Jews, divided into Ashkenazim, Sephardim, Karaites, Yemenites, Georgians, and Bokharans, - National Geographic Magazine,

Cartoon in Japan Not Inspired by Politics


In Japan, apparently, the cartoon did not have the democratic beginnings of its occidental counterpart. Here in America the cartoon was originally used in magazines and newspapers as a political weapon, but the Japanese cartoon was more than eight hundred years old before the first issue of the Yokohama Mainichi Shimbun, first of the Japanese dailies, appeared in 1871.

The first Nipponese cartoonist was a lordly person, a Buddhist monk, Kakuyu, abbot of Toba, who was born, in 1053 A. D. He employed most of his eighty-seven years laughing at the tollies and vanities of the decadent Kyoto court and at pretentious lowbrows everywhere. His influence over that branch of Japanese art was as great as that of Shakespeare on the English drama. In fact, for centuries the only Japanese name for the carioon was "Toba-e"--"Toba Pictures." No cartoons appeared in Japanese newspapers until a few years


FAMOUS BAND LEADER COMING TO TEXAS TECH

With more than 53,000 hard driven miles on its speedometer, a famous car which made automobile history has at last come to rest in the museum of transportation maintained by the Studebaker Corporation in its administration building at South Bend, Indiana.


