#### SAFETY OF ALUMINUM UTENSILS ESTABLISHED

Cooking food or boiling water in aluminum vessels is as safe as the use of any other kind of cooking utensil for the same purpose, H. F. DeWees, Southern manager for the Aluminum Cooking Utensil Company, said Monday, in discussing aluminum and its growing popularity in American households.

"There is not a medical man of recognized standing anywhere in the world who has ever expressed the opinion that there is danger in using aluminum ware," Mr DeWees said. "The fact that such institutions as Johns Hopkins Hospital at Baltimore, Walter Reid Hospital at Washington, Cook County Hospital at Chicago, Battle Creek Sanitarium at Battle Creek, Mich., the new \$18,000,000 Columbus Presbyterian Hospital at New York, St. Paul Hospital at Dallas, Baylor Hospital at Dallas and the Dallas Methodist Hospital all are using aluminum ware in preparing their foods is ample evidence that aluminum is the choice where careful thought has been given to the selection of utensils that will give service and at the same time are absolutely safe."

Cooking certain foods in aluminum vessels or even heating water may cause darkening of the interior of the vessel, he explained, but this is purely a chemical discoloration. It is the formation of an iron oxide resulting from the combination of certain elements with the aluminum or with metals contained in foods or in water. It is of no significance whatever so far as its effects on health is concerned. There is not a single case on record of poisoning from eating foods cooked in aluminum vessels, he said.

#### SILVER ANNIVERSARY BUICK VERY POPULAR

Flint, Mich., Nov. 19—The unprecedented reception accorded the Silver Anniversary Buick throughout the nation again is demonstrated in figures just announced by C. W. Churchill, general sales manager, which show that 28,460 of the new models were produced in the mile-and-a-half long Buick factory during October, or at the rate of 1,095 cars each working day.

**THE BANDIT EASILY SCARED**  
What sort of chap is the hold-up man, anyway? Is he the bold, daring bandit that newspaper headlines often imply?  
He is not—not if you will take the word of a recent writer in the World's Work, who describes how certain middle west bankers banded together to end bank holdups. In the course of their work, representatives of these bankers talked with convicts in penitentiaries; and one lifer, explaining that a sudden show of force will frustrate almost an holdup, explained, "It's the easiest thing in the world to scare a thief. They're all keyed up when they are out on a job. They think they've got the world licked. Then some fool thing happens that they didn't expect, and the biggest of them shake in their boots and lose their breath. They're not the cool, calm and collected guys you think they are. They are the worst kind of cowards down underneath. There's an important point to keep in mind when dealing with the present day crime wave. The holdup man is scared. He has a gun, and he will use it; in nine cases out of ten this bluffs everybody present into thinking that he is bold, resourceful and courageous with a firm grip on the situation. But, as the convict says, "let some fool thing happen that they didn't expect and the biggest of them shake in their boots."  
"Some fool thing that they didn't expect," can be a policeman unexpectedly appearing. It can be the ringing of a burglar alarm, set off by a courageous bank employee. It can be the point blank refusal of a clerk to open a safe, or the sudden scream for help of a supposedly cowed lady victim. This is worth remembering. The bandit's very cowardice makes him ready to shoot, and a man who is

### OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Declaring that cosmetics are essential to health and beauty but that nature's brand is the best on the market and that the vanity case should be kept on the dining table rather than the dressing table, home demonstration authorities of the A. & M. College Extension Service are emphasizing gardens as the magic gateway to beauty. "Garden cosmetics should be applied internally for the most part, they say. "Rouge your face with carrots, spinach and turnip greens. Let your mirror be a dish of delicious vegetable soup and note the effect in a bevelled edge mirror. Or sparkle in your eye by boiled onions or spinach for they contain phosphorous which concentrates in the beacon-like beam, one from each eye.

"Vegetables, both raw and cooked, fruits, fresh air and milk are the health givers that will aid woman in her eternal quest for beauty. The best face cream in cow's vanishing cream used daily. For a clear skin apply fruit juice and plenty of vegetables down the inside of the neck. Make your morning meal of oatmeal or other cereals, and take plenty of water, both internally and externally, drinking at least one quart daily. Drill yourself to clean your teeth after each meal or the dentist will drill them for you."

This is the advice 34,000 rural club women and girls are getting from their county home demonstration agents who are showing how it is done by conducting demonstrations in gardening and dairying and in the healthful use of vegetables and dairy products.

### TECH REMEMBERED IN PHILANTHROPIST'S WILL

Lubbock, Texas, Nov. 19.—Twenty thousand dollars has been left to be used as a student loan fund in Texas Technological College, according to the will of the late George T. Morrow, Lubbock pioneer, who died recently at the age of 73. His funeral was held in the Tech auditorium.

Saturday and Sunday, yea, any time during the first part of this week has been bully hog killing weather, and we imagine few farm homes in Terry county are without their spare ribs and back bones. Lots of ice and the biggest frosts of the year Monday and Tuesday mornings.

Some of our editorial paragraphs of the big dailies are having lots to say about Hoover on his peace and good will mission on board one of Uncle Sam's dreadnaughts. Maybe Mr. Hoover aims to impress them with the fact that we aim to have peace at any price and is showing them one of the 35 million reminders that we mean business.

But poor figures that won't work both ways.

The Herald recently got a letter from a good lady of the county in which she took one of our pastors to task for the manner of his sermon which she had heard, and in which the pastor in question seemed to have kindly got on the toes of her preacher. Now the Herald has never been a clearing house for religious discussions, and never will under the present management, no matter what the grievance is. **ARE CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS WORTH THE COST**

Of the 8000 names in Who's Who in America, 69 per cent are from schools where religious training is given, and 57 per cent from schools that do not give religious training. The ratio runs: Preachers and missionaries, 14 to 1; lawyers, 7-1; statesmen, 6-1; politicians, 3.6-1; literary men, 20-1; yet twice as many attend non-Christian schools; therefore, the boy educated in a Christian school has eight chances for success to one over the boy educated in the secular school.

"State schools have furnished 66 2-3 per cent of all college graduates in America, but only 20 per cent of the successful men. Christian schools have furnished 33 1-3 per cent of the graduates, and 80 per cent of the leading men. This proves that a complete education is best.

The state school sees the youth as a prospective tiller of the soil, a me-

chanic, a financier, a professional man, in a word a citizen of the world.

The Christian school sees him as a candidate for citizenship in two worlds, and undertakes to prepare him for both.

The atmosphere of one school is distinctively material, the other perceptibly spiritual. One is saturated with the sordid things of time, the other reflects the beams of eternity.

The principles taught by the Master are right. Therefore, just to the extent the youth of our land becomes acquainted with them, just to that extent are his chances of success enhanced. No wonder his chances of success are 8-1 as compared with one who has not had such opportunity, because he has learned from the Master of men.

Christian parents want to place their children in Christian schools for the environment afforded and the religious impressions made.—Bulletin, Oklahoma Christian College.

**CONTROLLING THE PEACH  
—BORER—**

Paradichlorobenzene treatment is recommended as a control measure against the peach borer, which is one of the most serious insect pests that infest peach orchards. Each year this insect causes, directly or indirectly, the death of many peach trees in both home and commercial orchards

throughout the Southern States. Peach trees of all ages are attacked. Young trees are sometimes completely girdled, and the older ones severely injured, by the larvae feeding on the cambium or growing tissues of the trunk just below the surface of the soil. The larger roots are also sometimes subject to borer attacks. Crystals of paradichlorobenzene of about the fineness of granulated sug-

ar are spread in a ring around the base of the trunk of trees 4 years of age or older. This ring should be about 1 1/2 inches from the tree. It is then covered with several shovelfuls of soil in the form of a mound, and the surface is carefully packed with a shovel. A gas is given off by the crystals which kills the insects. It is inadvisable to use this method with very young trees, however. About

four weeks after the treatment the mounds of soil should be torn down to permit the confined gas to escape, in the case of 4 and 5 year old trees. Six-year old trees may be left six weeks. The best results with paradichlorobenzene are obtained in the fall after the peach borer moths have finished laying their eggs, and most of these have hatched. At that time the borers are small and more easily killed by the gas. Trees that are only 1, 2, or 3 years old should be wormed.

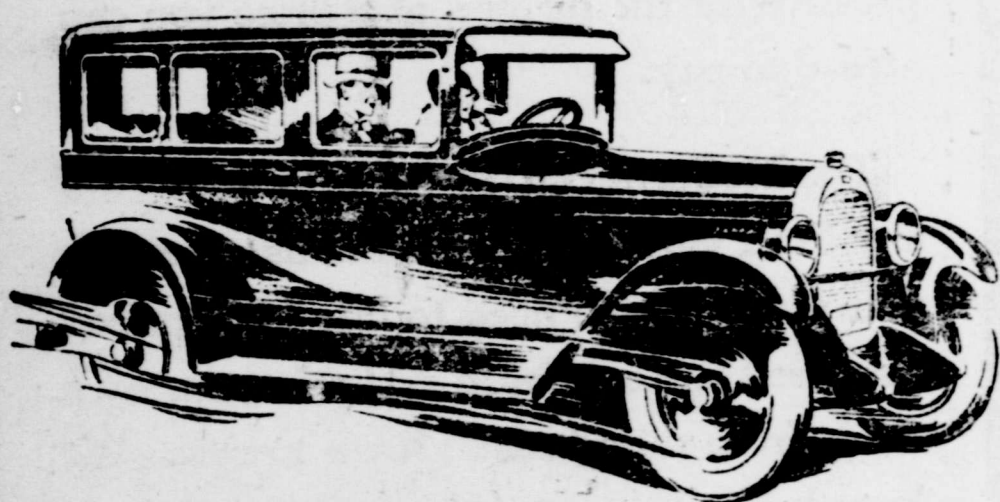

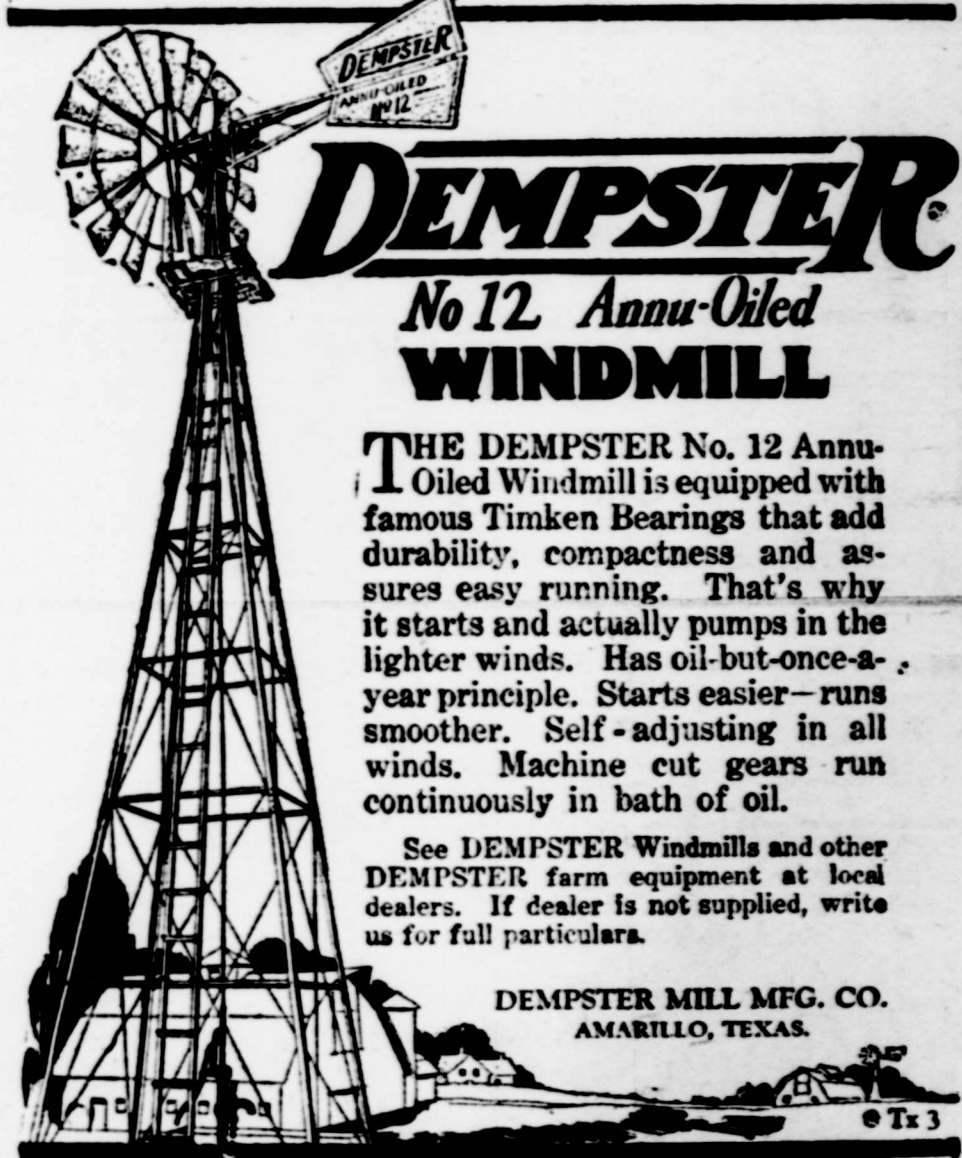

If all of us here in Dickens county who love the out-of-doors, who get delight out of a good day in the field, woods or marshes will observe rigidly the laws enacted to protect our own fun we've have years and years of real sport.—Spur Times.

### AN OLD NEWSPAPER EXHIBITED AT LEVELLAND

W. F. Moore has in his possession a copy of the Constitutional Democrat, a paper which was published at Trenton, Tennessee, before the Civil War by A. S. Currey. The issue bears the date of August 18, 1860, and contains the platform of the Democratic party in that memorable campaign, which was to end in strife. It also contains an account of great fire damage in Texas, which was supposed to have been caused by Northern sympathizers, and other matter which shows clearly the tenseness of the situation between the North and the South at that particular time.

The paper contains many small ads, and the rate as given was \$1.00 per square, a square consisting of ten lines of primer type, or nearly four times the rate of the average county newspaper of today.

The electoral vote of Texas at that time was given as four.

Mr. Moore found the paper in an old desk belonging to his grandfather and which was later given to him. He has had the paper in his possession for twenty-four years.—Leveland Herald.

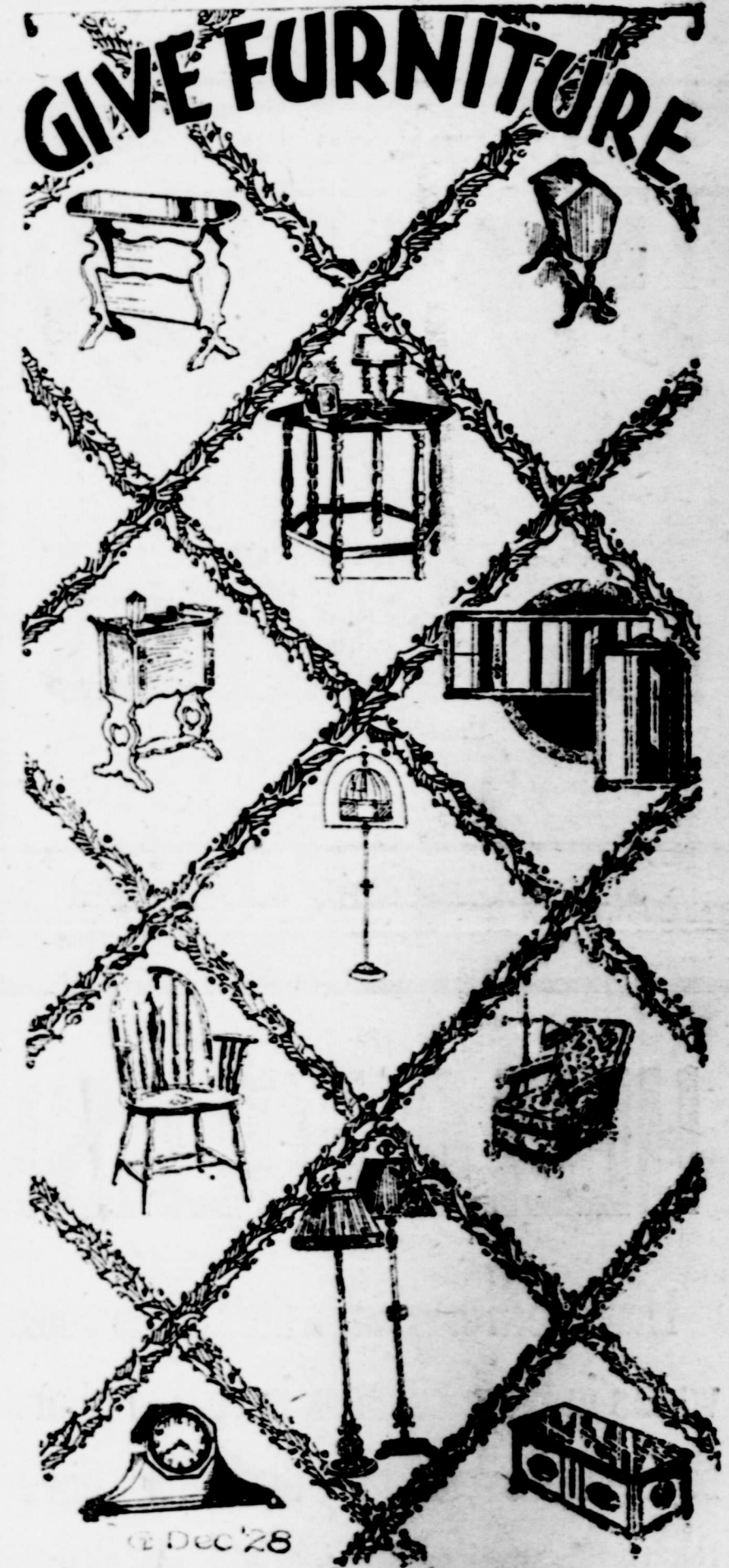
