Don't forget that next Wednesday, April 24th, is the date of the District Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Tahoka, and that we should be in attendance with a large delegation.

Also remember that the Get-Together Banquet of the local Chamber of Commerce and Terry County Farmera is slated for the same night and that it will be held in the Hankins Bldg. just east of the Rialto Theatre at 8 P. M. under the direction of the 4-H Clubs of the county. Citizens are urged to purchase a ticket to the banquet and will be visited by the secretary of the chamber of commerce or some member of the committee.

Upon account of the fact that the streets have been marked and houses numbered together with the sidewalks that are now constructed, it has been found that we are entitled to free city mail delivery by one carrier and that we will be allowed an additional carrier as soon as a few hundred more sidewalks are constructed, which from indications will not be long as dealers report numbers of people having material figured for the purpose.

It has been definitely decided that our County Fair will be held on Friday and Saturday, September 28 and 29. The Panhandle & South Plains Fair will open on September 30th and as we desire to place an exhibit with them, it will be necessary for us to place ours two days earlier than they. Spending Millions of Work on the catalog and premium list will be commenced within the next few days and it is expected to have it off the press and in circulation early in May in order that our people may plan the planting of any special stuff. The premium list will be larger this year, that is the different divisions will be enlarged and prizes will be offered in all of them including flowers. Officials of the fair are in correspondence with several amusement companies and good clean wholesome fun will be provided as well as a fireworks display each night and the displays will be enlarged over the one of last year.


Terry County Singing Convention Here Sun.

Postmaster Claude Jones informed us this week that a Postal Inspector was here last week to give him the firsts over since he became our postmaster. So far as Mr. Jones knows. the inspector found everything to his notion, as no complaints were registered. In fact, in some things new postmaster was commended.

The inspector informed Mr. Jones that Brownfield was now ready for city delivery, and all they would have to do was to make application for same, that he was ready without further ado to sign up and recommend same, for our mail business has now reached the point that we are entitled to free delivery and he was ready to start at least one man on a route in the city. Mr. Jones informed us that the business for the post office for the first three months of this year was about \$1,500.00 over that of the corresponding period last year, which shows that Brownfield is growing fast.

The Postal Authorities used to require so much side walks before giving delivery, but Mr. Jones said that they were remitting a lot of that in the dryer regions of the west, and in view of the fact that we were numbering our houses and putting up street signs, entitled us to city delivery.

BROADCAST BY RADIO

The possibility of broadcasting electric power by means of radio wayes in sufficient quantity to be of commercial value was forecast by Dr. Phillips Thomas, research engineer of the Westinghouse Electric Company, in an address before the St. Louis electrical Board of Trade.

Dr. Thomas, who invented the first microphone to broadcast very faint sounds such as heart beats, has devoted considerable time to research in the field of power broadcasting by

By means of a small oscillator, similar to the large ones which give put the electrical waves used in radio broadcasting, which was set up on a table at one end of the long dining room, Dr. Thomas demonstrated that the waves of electrical energy given out by such a machine would light small incandescent lamps brought within the wave field.

A bulb was mounted on a small copper rod, and when the latter was placed in the right position in the wave field, the bulb burned brightly.

The waves used in power broadcasting, however, are very short, differing in this respect from the wave used in radio broadcasting. The length of the wave generated by the small machine used by Dr. Thomas was two meters, and to be of practical value, the waves would have to be about four inches in length, he said.

"The length of a wave depends on the frequency of the oscillations," explained Dr. Thomas, "and the obstacle which now confronts us is the mechanical difficulty of constructing a vacuum tube which will oscillate with the high frequency necessary to produce four-inch waves.

"The entire work is still in the experimental stage. The shortest wave which I have been able to produce yet is about 32 inches, which will generate about 100 kilowatts of power. That would be a mere handful, and of no commercial value."

Should the broadcasting of power become a reality it would not be broadcast indiscriminately, Dr. Thomas said, but would be directed toward the home of a consumer in the form of a beam, and the apparatus which would be necessary to receive it would be in the nature of a mirror the length of the electrical wave.




