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### **Breaking Away From** The Score Card Habit

Despite the efforts of the expert judges of most of the large fairs to hold the exhibitors to score card exhibits, the exhibitors are fast breaking away from them, and in the past few years there has been such a rebellion that even the judges themselves have reluctantly agreed to some reforms in placing of exhibits. We can remember when Uncle Bill Howand begin carrying the Terry county exhibits to the State Fair some twenty years ago, that he selected the very best he could find, be it much or little, and he would always come home with a lot of ribbons. But as the years passed on, and year in and year out the same set of judges had charge, they became more arbitrary in their rulings, until to one could no longer place a creditable advertising exhibit in order to comply with these conditions. You had to have just so many apples, for instance, and they had to be exactly the same size, but no matter how notty or ill shapen, if they matched, you scored a point.

County exhibits are carried to these fairs mainly for advertising purpose, and you just can't get away from that. The Herald has maintained for years that it would be better for us to stand the expense without the expectation of a single dollar in prizes, providing that we be allowed to fix our booth as we wanted it. Last year Lubback county had the nerve to do this at the Dallas Fair, and they got Big Crowds Attend gotten there. 



The inability of physicians to properly diagnose tuberculosis in the past has placed many cases, at a latter date, in a hopeless stage of invalidism and poverty." This statement was made by Dr. J. B. McKnight, Superintendant of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorinm at Sanatorium, Texas, speaking of the Early Diagnosis Campain, which is being sponsored this month in Texas by the Texas Public

Dr. McKnight added, however, that the general practitioner should not carry the entire responsibility of late stage diagnosis because the patient is often times at fault in not seeking the service of a competent physician when ill. Many people, he said, lose the chance of reaping the reward of an early diagnosis, thence a later cure, because of neglect to recognize familiar evidence of tuberculosis and failure to recognize the importance of repeated yearly physical examination.

"The results of the Early Diagnosis Campain by the National Tuberculosis Association last year," said Dr. Me-Knight, "awakened many of our physicians as well as laymen to the fact that tuberculosis is the most curable of all cronic diseases if it is detected in an early stage. ON DAIRY PRODUCTS

From the harbor of Auckland, N. Z. a ship makes its way out to sea. It carries a cargo of butter, "destination to be given." It crosses the great Pacific, then comes a radio message which says "New York." A few days later the butter cargo is discharged on the docks which line the mouth of the

A few hours after the raido message is sent, that fact is known in the produce trade in New York. Then Wham! Down goes the price of butter 3,4, 5 cents a pound and for a week or ten days the market is nervous and fussy and cantankerous. After that the effect wears off,but it isn't very long before the whole process is repeated. The producer of course pays the bill.

Thus the April 1 Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman describe the effect of imported butter on the American marked. Shipments of butter to the United States amount to only a fracton of 1 percent of the butter consumed but they raise several kinds of trouble in the American butter market. One small shipment in January 1928, when traced out, was found to have caused a drop of 5 1-2 cents a pound in the New York market which lasted for a little more than a week.

Prices of butter in America are determined almost wholly on the produces of which New York has the largest and dominating one. The price on butter is the base upon which the prices of almost all dairy products can be seen on the key of the whole dairy industry.



#### THESE SPRING FOODS

ARE VERY TEMPTING

The poet sang, "In the spring the young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love." We might change the line and say, "In the spring the housewife's fancy sadly turns to thoughts of food," for the woman who doesn't find spring the hardest time of the year in which to plan meals is an exception.

To enable housewives to more easiy plan their springtime menus the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman has published in it's April 1 issue many pring receipes from among which he following have been selected:

Rhubarb and Rice Pudding-

Cook 1 cupful of rice in 1 quart of boiling, slightly salted water until the grains are tender but not mushy. Drain off the water, saving it for use in gravy. Beat three eggs until light, and add one cupful of sugar, beat again, and add one cupful of milk. Mix this with the rice.

Peal and cut into 1-2 inch slices 3 supfuls of rhubarb. Roll in sugar.

Into the bottom of the pan put a layer of the rice mixture, spread with a layer of-rhubarb, then more rice, another layer of rhubarb and put thin layer of fice on top. Bake in moderate oven until the rhubarb tender. Serve either hot or cold with cream.

Spring Pudding-

Into the top of a double boiler put cupful prune juice, 1-2 cupful hot water, 2 cupfuls rhubarb cut fine, 1 seant cupful sugar, 20 prunes with stones removed and 1-2 cupful tapioca Cook over hot water until the tapioca is done, stirring frequently. Cool and serve with cream. Easte: Salad-



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#### **Uncle Sam Owes Debt** to Former Employees

Washington.-Fifty thousand per sons in the United States can have an average of \$20 each from the government merely by asking for it. But they don't.

They are former employees of the United States who paid from 21/2 to 3½ per cent of their monthly salaries into a retirement fund and then evi dently forgot it. The retirement di vision of the pension bureau is trying now to locate them.

Nearly all these persons, the bu reau explained, remained in the government service but a short time and then went elsewhere. When they left they either forgot the money they had paid to the retirement fund or else left it with the government, thinking it would draw interest. But it does

Last year the comptroller general called on all government departments to make a list of former employees to who,n refunds were due. A list of 8,500 of the 50,000 has been compiled

Many of these were employees in navy yards, post offices, or the vet erans' bureau. Some of them have only a few cents due them. Others have \$500 or more.

#### Horse Thought Lame Wins Big Fortune

Berlin .- A shot that was not fired brought a fortune to Baron von Op penheim, one of the leading sportsmen of Germany.

The baron, who owns a great racing stable, had among his lot a horse called "Oleander," which in 1926, had won a few races. One day it fell and could not get up again. Veterinary surgeons and other experts tried in vain to cure the horse. Finally they declared it had broken its pelvis and that nothing could be done but shoot the animal.

The trainer refused to kill the horse. For days and weeks he delayed the excution till finally Oleander got on Its feet again. It raced during the 1927 season, won numerous races and brought his owner winnings totaling 105,000 marks (\$25,000).

Came the season of 1928. Oleander cantered from victory to victory, won even the Austrian Grand Prix and gained the greatest sum ever won by a German horse in one year, 255,000

marks (roughtly, \$60,000). Baron Oppenheim is said to have become somewhat skeptical about the knowledge of "experts."

#### Hundreds in Florida

Live on Fur Industry Arcadia, Fla.-Florida, wintertime haven of the wealthy, boasts an industry normally attributed to the Far North in a fur trade that brings revenue to hundreds of trappers in this section.

Florida furs-raccoon, opossum, beheat, skunk and fox-are to be found in many, many markets. Fur buyers with headquarters here estimate the annual income of the trappers win market skins and pelts for 50 cents to \$1 each at nearly \$15,000.

Alligator skins make up a large part of the trade in pelts. Good skins generally bring about \$3, with no greater price to the seller for a fifteen-foot skin than for one seven feet in length.

#### Every Thirty-Second Dane Owns an Auto

Copenhagen, Denmark. - Denmark may lag behind California and Kansas in the number of automobiles owned per family, but 80 per cent of all cars sold in this little country in 1928 were of American manufacture.

Sales of automobiles increased 178 per cent during the year, and now every thirty-second Dane owns a car, instead of every thirty-seventh, as in 1927. There are 107,971 motor vehicles in the country.

The medium-sized car is gaining favor.
