Heretofore the county fair has been handled by or through the chamber of commerce, but there seems to be a desire to organize a permanent fair association and the matter of transferring the responsibility to a number of public spirited citizens will be taken up by the directors of the chamber of commerce at their meeting this week. In the meantime a lot or preliminary work has been done and the dates decided upon, but in the event that a fair association is crganized, the dates could be changed. We pulled off our first district convention last week and everything was handled according to schedul and was a success from every viewpoint and brought much praise from the visitors, the crowd however was not as large as expected, due to bad roads in many portions of the district.

The State Fair of Texas will hold its 43rd session on October 12-27 and it is our intention to have a county exhibit, the score card has been changed and it is now possible to show a greater variety and upon this account we should make a good showing. We must major, however, on three principal crops.

### **Terry County 4-H Club** Move Now Thriving

BROWNFIELD, June 1 .- (Spl) .-When R. B. Davis, county agent of Gaines county was appointed as part time agent of Terry county he immediately began organizing boys and girls 4-H elubs.

Despite the fact that Terry county had never had an agricultural agent and that many of the people had never in a county where an agent was employed, Mr. Davis met with wonderful sucess and within a month and half had succeeded in organizing 14 clubs with a membership of 275 boys and girls, and had shipped in a car of 71 pure bred pigs from the Lillard Stock farm. This was perhaps the largest pig club in Texas or anywhere that had pure bred pigs to start with.

This large shipment of pigs was made posible by the First National Bank and Brownfield State Bank of Brownfield, and the First National Bank of Meadow. These banks took notes made by the boys, all of which were paid last fall at maturity.

Wilton E. Williams was employed by the schools of the county as club leader for the summer with the coperation of Davis, interest was kept at a high pitch throughout the year. Among the things that the clubs accomplished was to send 35 boys to the district club training course at Lubbock. A county club rally was held in Brownfield in July with an attendance of more than 200 boys and girls. Judging teams in grain, livestock, dairy cattle, and poultry were trained and when the carnival that was to have been held by the clubs was blown down by a storm the business men of Brownfield contributed the money to send the teams to the short course. Each club sent one or more delegates to the short course and paid their transportation, making 37 club boys and girls from Terry county who attended the short course at A. & M. college this past summer.

At the county fair at Brownfield 12 of the 13 clubs had attractive agricultural booths complying with the regulations of the score card. There were 65 pure bred club pigs on exhibit, and 12 exhibits of chickens and

Thirteen club pigs were carried to the Lubbock fair winning first and second and third, in the junior pig class of both Duroc and Poland China and first and third in the open class on junior sow pig of Durocs.

At the end of the year the record books of the pig club members showed a profit of \$1,951.17. All record books turned in showed a net profit of \$3,019.24.






