Most people of Friona have continued to say kind things about our attempts to edit The Friona Star, but a few are beginning to get on our nerves.

Take, for instance, that set of critical folks who have been deriding our attempts at practical art. The city hall sketch in last week's Star, some have said, hardly does the new building justice. If that's what the city is fixing to spend \$35,000 on, some of our hecklers have said, they'll have none of it.

New Owners At Hub Store

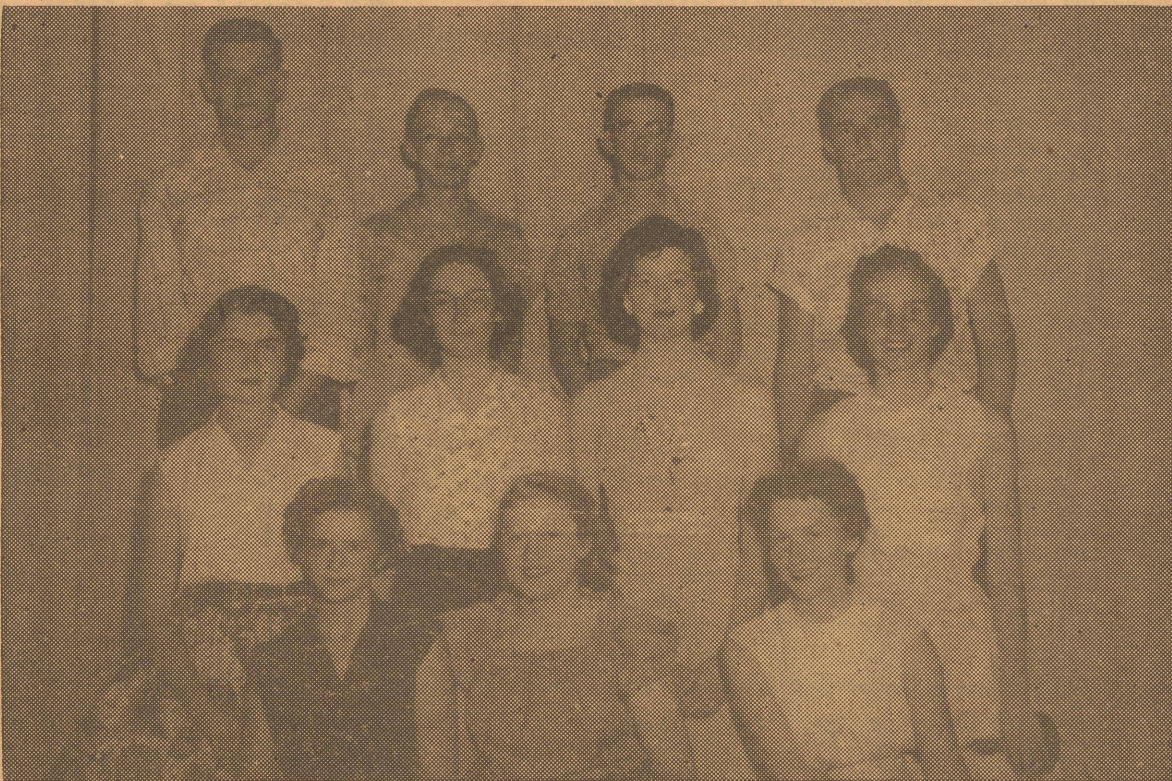

Green Light Flashed On New City Hall

Friona's city commissioners Saturday gave the green light to a long-contemplated program for expansion of the existing fire department and addition of a city hall.

In a special meeting, the commissioners chose the contract route, rather than the option of hiring a building superintendent to oversee the work for the city.

Plans and specifications are now being prepared by Weldon Dickson, who Tuesday estimated that he would have them completed by this weekend. This paper work will then be available for the inspection by contractors who may desire to bid on the new improvements to the city.

Estimated cost of the new facilities, which include a three-cell jail, is \$35,000. Commissioners have

wrangled with the problem of building a \$35,000 project with only \$25,000 (which was voted in a bond election last year), but now have decided that the difference can be made up by surplus of funds from other city departments.

From time to time, the jail, one of the main offices, the vault, and even the additional garage on the fire department have been considered possible optional items as the city bids attempted to cut costs. But now, the decision has been made to build all that was originally planned.

After advertisements for bids are posted, and a contractor is engaged by the city, work can begin immediately on the project, and it should be ready for the city's use by late summer.

In other action taken Saturday, commissioners voted to purchase a sprinkler system from Ames Irrigation Supply of Brownfield. This system, which is costing Friona \$625, will be used to irrigate the cemetery and city park. There are 840 feet of pipe in the system, and 19 nozzles.

Also purchased was a sprayer for use in fly and insect control by the city. This sprayer, purchased from Dodson Chemical in Amarillo at a cost of about \$1200, will be used by the city in its alleys. The unit mounts on a trailer or in the bed of a pickup.

Bindweed Control Program Mapped

"The amount of bindweed in Parmer County isn't alarming, but the weed is scattered throughout the county and it spreads rapidly under irrigation," Bruce Parr, chairman of the Parmer County Farm Bureau weed committee, said of the weed, that leaves the land almost useless when it gets a hold, at a meeting of the committee Tuesday night at Lawlis and Ely Gin in Bovina.

In an effort to control bindweed, the committee divided the four precincts in the county into small parts on a map. A farmer and an FFA boy or a 4-H boy will work as an identification team and locate all the bindweed

in the small part of the precinct they are to work. The location of all bindweed will be shown on maps in County Agent Joe Jones' office in Farwell and in the Farm Bureau office in Friona.

When the maps are complete, all affected farmers will be notified and an explanation will be made to them as to how to obtain soil sterilants that will aid in the control of the weed.

ON COUNTY RIGHTS-OF-WAY

Where there is bindweed on a farmer's land and on the county right-of-way adjoining the land, the farmer should fill out an application form for soil sterilants at

the county agent's office. An order will be given to the farmer that will enable him to get the sterilant at his regular trading place free of charge. All the farmer has to do is apply the sterilant.

ON FARM

Farmers who have the weed on their farms should apply for prior approval for ASC assistance in the purchase of soil sterilants at the county ASC office in Farwell.

ASC assistance is nine cents per pound for sodium chlorate and a comparable amount for other sterilants. The total price of sodium chlorate per pound is 12.25 cents. The farmer is required to pay only three and a half cents per pound.

ON STATE ROADS

Where bindweed is on a state highway or farm-to-market road that adjoins a farmer's land, the farmer should notify Agent Jones or the Farm Bureau office. The information will be turned over to the district highway superintendent who will cooperate with the farmer in the control of the weed.

Jones says the highway department will control bindweed where it is only in the right-of-way and where it is on a farm and the right-of-way. He said, however, that the department didn't want to use control measures unless the farmer whose land adjoined the right-of-way was willing to cooperate.

Believes Way Clear For \$10,000 Grant

A trip to the Dallas office of the Bureau of Internal Revenue by Jimmy Baxter, manager of Parmer County Community Hospital, last week may have cleared the way for the \$10,000 Ford Foundation grant which has been held up for several months.

The hospital sought a ruling from the Bureau establishing its tax-exempt status, and this ruling was secured. A photostatic copy of the form was taken in Dallas and airmailed to Foundation headquarters in New York, reports Baxter, and he is optimistic over the possibilities for the grant coming through now.

Also, the special tax ruling now qualifies the local hospital for supplies which may be purchased through the Texas Surplus Agency, a state-run body used to distribute surplus government goods.

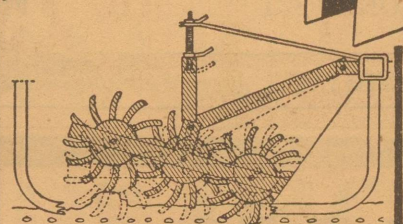

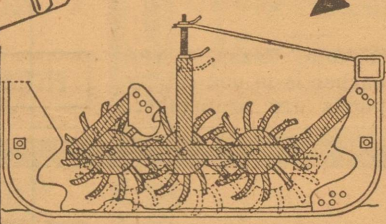

President Kaltwasser received a telegram Wednesday morning, sent by J. Walter Hammonds to all Texas county Farm Bureau presidents, regarding cotton exports from CCC stocks at world competitive prices. This feature was not included in the farm bill that had just passed the house. He urged presidents and members to wire Congressmen Poage and Rogers, urging their support of an amendment introduced by Senator Eastland making this export provision

effective immediately upon passage of the bill. Kaltwasser sent the telegram as suggested and we do not, as this time, know whether the amendment was adopted.

There was strong opposition to the amendment by sections of the cotton trade and the administration. The action requested is considered the most important factor facing cotton producers so far as markets are concerned, since foreign markets provide outlets for a large share of American production when prices are competitive with other producing countries.

Bruce Parr, weed committee chairman, reports that state seed inspectors have met with members of the committee within the past week, cooperating in the drive against noxious seed in certified

seed sacks.
