Two years ago we did not interfere with candidates' posters for the reason that many thousands of them were already on the rights-of-way before we were aware of the extent of the problem, but we wish this year to consider such signs of the same nature as merchants' or business men's advertising and prohibit their erection on the rights-of-way.

We consider that with such notice given in advance it will not be detrimental o anyone and will be fair to all, and the Commission does not believe that any discrimination should be made between candidates for public office and merchants or others advertising.



#### **Chamber of Commerce**

By Secretary-

A charity organization is badly needed in Brownfield and an effort should be put forth to the end that some method may be devised to care for cases that are not eligible to support at the hands of the county. Lamesa has a Mutual Organization that seems to cover the situation in thorough manner and the plan will be put up to the directors of the chamber of commerce at the next monthly meeting which occurs this week. The chamber of commerce has undertaken to handle emergency cases but its funds are not sufficient to enable it to operate in all cases that are presented and at the same time have money with which to carry on work for the development of this Last year we handled six emergen-

cy cases, that is furnished food and gasoline sufficient to get them to the next town on the way to their supposed destination, and so far this year we have had nine families and the cost in each case was much greater than any one cared for in 1929. A halt must be called and the only solution is an organized agency to take over the work. It could be done under the direction of the chamber of commerce, but the fund should be entirely separate.

At the last meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce it was decided that some sort of control should be exercised over the circullation of petitions which called for donations of money or merchandise and that all such should be referred to the chamber of commerce for attention by an appointed committee. The action taken was not meant to enable our citizens to refuse to subscribe to worthy causes but was for the purpose of determining whether requests were based upon a real need and one to which our business and professional men would be glad to contribute. The committee will also advertising where it does not originate from our local newspaper and members of the chamber of commerce are invited to use the service. support a letter will be issued from this office to that effect. This is as a member of the organization and strict adherance to it will cause you to save a considerable amout of moncy during the course of the year. Just this week a request was made to the committee for approval of a petition for money and while it was possesed of some merit, the opinion prevailed that it was for the best interests of the whole citizenship, that it should not be approved, as by so doing, a situation would be developed that would cause the outlay of several thousand dolars on projects that should be taken care of by other agencies. Rejection of the request, will probably save members of the organization considerably more money than is paid into it by them.






