"A whole ham may be prepared in so many attracive ways that the family will declare it was good to the last bite," says Miss Inez S. Willson, home economist. Here are a few ways of proving this statement.

Savory Ham

- 1 cup cold cooked ham, chopped
- 3 hard-cooked eggs
- 2 cup cream teaspoon salt
- Pepper and paprika 1 teaspoon minced parsley

Add the ham to the cream which has been heated. Rub the yolks of the eggs through a sieve; chop the whites finely and add to the ham mixture. Season, hear thoroughly: serve on toast. Sprinkle with the finely minced parsley.

Baked Ham Hash

Add equal parts of finely chopped ham and diced cooked potatoes to enough thick cream sauce to moisten well. Put in a shallow baking dish which may be taken to the table Cover with buttered crumbs and sprinkle with minced parsley. Brown nicely in the oven.
