

IF YOU ARE IN SYMPATHY WITH THE TEACHING OF RED RUSSIA READ THIS

The Communists of Russia are pending millions to spread their Red Doctrine; are putting their literature and their teaching all over America, and it a glowing picture that they aint, and many Americans, dissatified with what they have are turning their cry a listening ear. However, ust what is taking place in that ountry is told by Lorimer Hamilton, who made a visit to that country for irst hand information.

"I found young peasant women ishonoring themselves for the sake of the extra food ration granted to mothers of babies born out of wedock. I found gangs of women breaking stones in the streets of Moscow, housewives deprived of all leisure by the ordeal of shopping at the bureaucratic government stores, and school girls being taught to regard the taking of human life in war as part of their training for the duties

of Communistic womanhood. Thru the days of the terror the women of Russia followed the Red flag as faithfully as the men. Now they are learning some bitter realities of life under that flag.

He continues with a discourse on the country, and explains that the women are doing all the work, with the men lounging about, then he

"But the marks of men and politics-of class strife, revolution and Communism-became strikingly evident as soon as my train approached even the tiniest villiage.

"Whatever else they may be, these marks of rural Communism are cerainly not pleasing to the eye.

Ragged peasants lounge idle on the street corners. There is very little activity. Horses are scarce and I did not see an automobile in any village. The small log cabin-once so gay with bright-colored fretworkhave not been painted for ten years. Everything looks mournfully dead.

"Every village railway station is crowded with peasant men-goin nowhere—just watching the trains. The trains themselves are crowded with peasant women-girls and women of every age from 8 to 80.

"None of them travel for pleasure. From the youngest to the oldest, they all go burdened down with cans of milk, tubs of home-made butter or baskets of eggs. This country produce they take to the cities, where they exchange it for clothing, sugar, tea and tobacco. While their men stay at nome, the farm women of Russia now arry on 20 per cent of the peeasant

"As soon as my train reached the ity outskirts, the reael atmosphere of Communistic government began to appear. Produce of every description lay heaped in disorderly array beside the railroad tracks. Boxes of manufactured goods which had over In Our Worship." women of Russia now carry on. 90 sheds were dumped indiscriminately upon the ground, neglected, unguarded, uncovered against the

of expensive machinery stood there rusting. Vast quantities of cut lumber lay hopelessly jumbled with bales of rugs, piles of untanned hides, stores of grain, potatoes, fresh fruit and every other sort of merchandise, perishable or nonperishable. These heaps of unsort-freight were all over the railroad yards in the most complete state of confusion. "Such is the approach to any

large Soviet city. Confusion becomes more and more acute as you draw nearer to the city depots the chaos is almost indescrib- and Treasurer. able. In front of the ticket windows, people stand packed in coiled lines how short the distant you wish to travel, it is always necessary to go to the station at least an hour and a half before train time in order to reach the ticket window and get your ticket early enough to catch the

Lost time is a sacrifice which the "red" regime imposses most heavily Whatever your water requirements may of all upon the women of Russia.

In Moscow and Leningrad I was everlastingly amazed at the patience displayed by the thousands of women I saw spending hour after hour on their feet before the doors of the government shops.

In order to obtain fresh meat, I learned, it is always necessary now o'clock in the morning and stand in line in front of the butcher shops for five or six hours. The shops never opens before 9 or 10 o'clock a. m.

He goes ahead to explain just what light Russia look at her women, telling of the fact that one official declared, "that if there is blood to be spilled it is not to be mansuline blood alone, but that the female as well as the male. 


