Summary of the Year's Work of M. E. Church

Before entering into the new Conference year the pastor would like for the membership and friends of the church to know some of the most important work accomplished by the faithful officers and members from November 15, 1929, to November 15, 1930. In our meeting last Easter the church was revived and there were 45 conversions as an outgrowth of this meeting and the regular pastoral work and preaching in the regular services. We have received 84 members into the church. The greatest single increase was made during the services held by Bro. C. A. Bickley, but there has been a steady growth in attendance and membership during the year.

The Educational work of the church has been carried on by the Sunday school, three Leagues and Y. P. M. S. A full quota of teachers has at last been found to lead the classes and fill the offices of these groups by some taking two offices. We put on a most successful Daily Vacation Bible School in the summer and five received teacher training credits in Lubbock, last Spring.

The Missionary work of the church has been ably headed by the two Missionary Societies. The Sunday school has observed a monthly Missionary Day with training in Missions and offering for the same.

The physical equipment of the church has been added to by gas installation, papering and roofing the parsonage etc., fellowship has been kept up by means of picnics, parties and group meetings and the spiritual life enlivened by prayer meeting and a worshipful atmosphere in regular services.

The main financial items were: Pastors salary \$2,250, Rev. C. A. Bickley, \$315; Revival, \$220; Incidentals, \$367; Benevolences including orphanage, Missions, Church Boards for the denomination, and N. W. Texas, Old preachers, \$420; Sunday school, \$330; Raised on churches and parsonages, \$1,289; Two W. M. S., \$847. Grand Total \$5,875.

A fitting climax to the year's work was the Annual Conference where revival fire was kindled and a spirit of sacrifice shown by the ministry and laymen in offerings given to the preachers in the drought areas and to the retiring preachers.

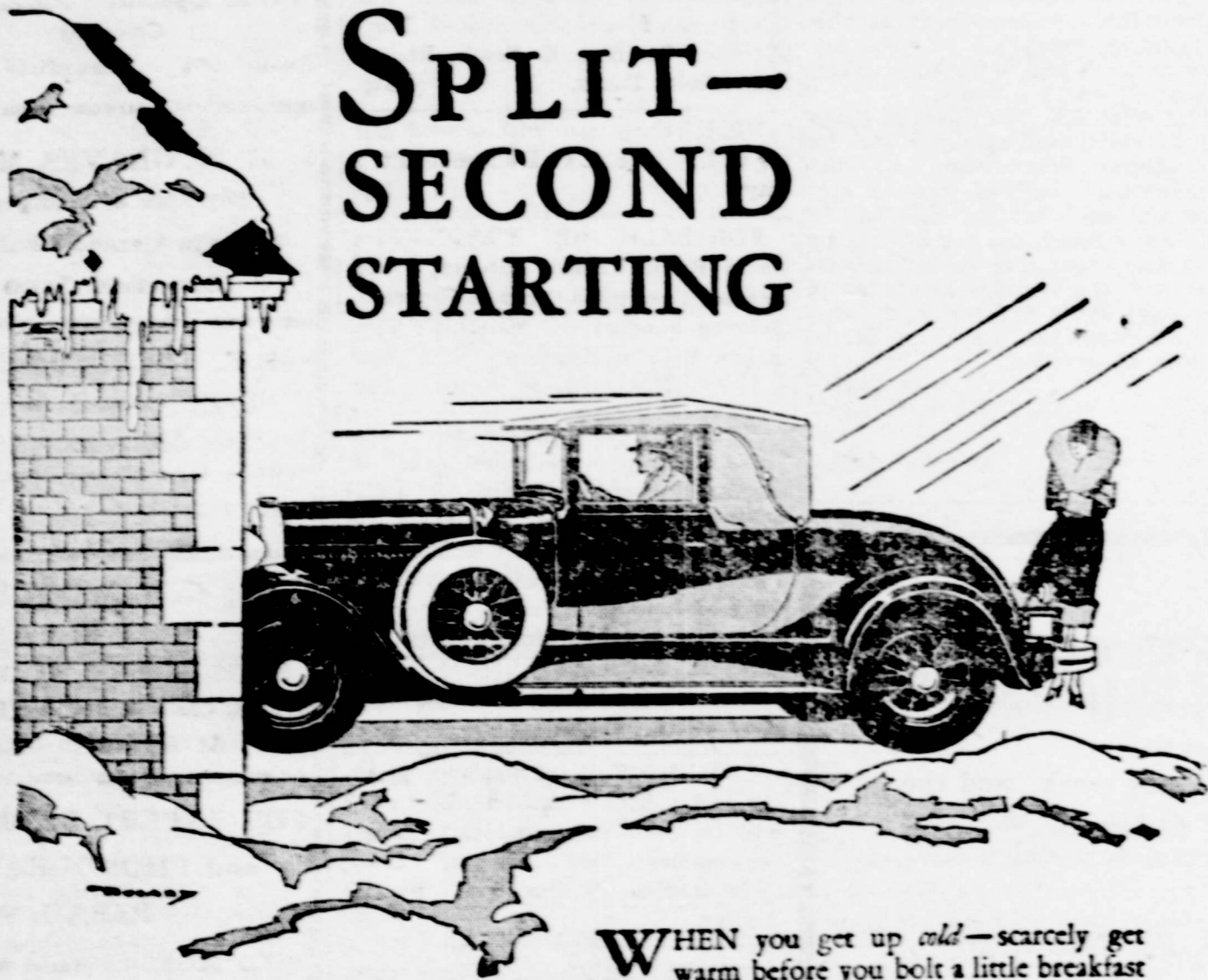

## Highway Association Formed at Seminole

On Wednesday of this week Seminole had as her guests one of the liveliest and most enthusiastic groups of South Plains citizens that has gathered themselves together in a long time. The purpose of the meeting was to organize in a combination of efforts to get State recognition on the north and south highway from Odessa through Andrews, Seminole, Seagraves, Brownfield into Lubbock.

The meeting was held in the court house at Seminole, was called to order at 10 a. m. by Judge R. W. Pittman, who on behalf of Seminole, extended greetings to all the visitors present. He next introduced the Secretary of Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, A. B. Davis, who, by the way, is one of the liveliest and most able organizers and boosters West Texas possesses. Mr. Davis, in a very able way, told of the purpose of this meeting and suggested that a permanent organization should be made, his suggestions were accepted and an organization to be known as Highway Association No. 137 was formed.

C. M. Armstrong, of Seagraves was elected president; O. M. Herring, of Seagraves, secretary and an executive committee consisting of representatives from each of the interested counties was selected as follows: J. H. Hankins, Lubbock; Marcus Gist, Ector; R. M. Means, Andrews; J. E. Shelton and E. H. Jones, Terry; and W. H. Steele and R. W. Whitman, Gaines.

At noon the meeting was adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m., at which time the secretary presented an outline of what was expected of the executive committee in the way of data needed to present the State Highway Commission in an interview this association expects to have at an early date.

Many talks were made by the visitors which gave their experiences in past efforts in getting highways for their various counties and communities, and in each individual speaker the paramount idea was that with organized effort and the cooperation of all interested counties the project will be a realized accomplishment in the near future.

In connection with this highway being designated by the State, it was brought out that the State Commission had recently changed the number of this highway from Lubbock south to Brownfield, and from Crane, in Crane county, north through Ector county to the Andrews
