Our prediction is that business conditions will be improved this fall, as compared with a year ago -in spite of the widely-publicized farm slump. Our reasoning is based on the following assumptions:

Last year, farmers didn't realize what 50 cents a hundred off the price of their grain would do to their net profits.

2. They presumed that 1955 would be as good a year for growing cotton as 1954 and 1953. 3. Anticipating more income

than was actually realized, many spent their money before it reached their hands. And when crops and prices came up short-and come continued high—the squeeze was on.

This year, on the other hand, most farmers have a much more cautious outlook. They are watching overheard—cutting the cost of production wherever practical.

They still don't know what the price of milo will be (we predict \$1.71—based on what others tell us), or how the weather will be, but they are proceeding cautiously poping for the best.

If we get a half-way decent break week. with the weather this year, and if that raise in grain sorghum prices each day since last Wednesday, comes through, there's going to be a big difference this fall.

Wait and see.

Almost every transaction requires not duplicates , but triplicates or quadruplicates in order to properly file away the statistics. The records continue to pile up, especially in cases where proof of expenditures will be required for tax purposes.



## **Parmer County Slighted Of Vital Information**

Parmer County has made such strides in recent years that folks downstate don't seem to be able to realize what has happened on our farms and towns lately.

Typical of the general ignorance some of our state bodies have concerning this area, is a bulletin just released by the Texas Board of Water Engineers. In it, the reader would expect to find some of the most vital statistics on file which give hint to the future of the area. These figures relate to the fluctuation of water levels on our irrigation wells.

Parmer County, with about 2200 irrigation wells in operation on 1200 farms, has only eight wells being checked by the Board! Add to this the fact that none of the eight lays north of Highway

Parmer County, which was one of 17 included in this study of the "Southern High Plains," occupied a page in the report, just as did the other 16 counties, but the observation wells listed on the map were conspicuous by their absence.



Statistics prepared by the High Plains Water District are much more complete, but the reporting of the state Board is so widely followed that without a doubt there will be many persons who will be uninformed as to Parmer County's development, after looking over the maps in the report. Castro County, which compares almost identically with Parmer County in so many respects, has 20 observation wells-which we think is few enough. But the eight allotted Parmer County is almost insignificant because of its sketchiness.

If our memory is correct, O. F. Dent of Littlefield is on the Board. This oversight which is being committed in the area he serves ought to be called to his attention. We hope that several Parmer County people will appeal to him in this respect.

The area of Parmer County north of Bovina and west of Friona is the only "weak water" part of the County. There is no observation well anywhere near this spot. It is in our weakest spot that we are most concerned with a decline in the table.
