
In other words, we kinder make a martyr out of he whom we would destroy. And no matter how detestible the fellow may be to us, he has his circle of friends. Let us not forget that.







PUTTING A LITTLE TOWN ON THE MAP

Sometimes a little town gets into the head lines by accident. Sometimes a disasterous storm makes it the center of interest for a few days. An unexpected oil well brings publicity and much undesirable population, and occasionally an atrocious crime will cause people to thumb their road maps in an effort to find its location. But when a little town gets on the map because of the development of some industry which brings money to the pockets of producers and adds generally to the prosperity and happiness of the community, that town has a good chance of getting frequent date lines in the metropolitan press. Indeed, such a town is worthy of mention in as widely circulated a journal as Farm and Ranch. Chico is a little town in the northwest corner of Wise county, Texas. Its name is printed on the map in small, like letters, but it is in the headlines in 36 point blackface. The man Esponsible for this prominence, according to the Wichita Daily Times, is J. R. Hester, station agent of the Rock Island railroad. Whether Mr. Hester had in mind the increasing of tonnage for his railroad or the welfare and happiness of his neighbors and nearby farmers when he began encouraging the production of cantaloupes and other fruits and vegetables in and around Chico, does not matter. In fact, he has benefitted both. For several years, Mr. Hester studied conditions of soil and made a survey of markets before he was ready to launch his campaign for changing the farm program. He expermented with cantaloupes and learned that he could produce them of prexcelled quality. He tried planting them on different dates in order to bring them to maturity at a time when they would be in demand, and so Wise county, and particularly that section around Chico, went into the business on an ever-increasing scale. Montague and Parker counties adjoining also follow the example and according to late reports the crop this year will exceed all others in both quantity and quality. Mr. Hester was not satisfied with knowing how to produce and when, but in his market studies he was able to find a way to induce buyers to come to his town, and thus far no trouble has been encountered in finding a ready sale for the products of 2,000 acres in Wise county and 1,500 acres in Parker and adjoining counties. 



nole country. Cotton, of course, renains her most important crop.

Her industrial development under the most ideal living conditions has to be seen to believe. Her mountain streams furnish ample power for even greater development than has already been made. As many as four and five big dams on one river alone, with their tremendous water heads and their reservoirs forming great lakes, make guessing at Georgia's future development along industrial lines almost beyond human capabilities. Doubt if one could put it too high.

Even Chamber of Commerce figures, which are, of course, available, do not paint the picture one gets when he sees these developments and contemplates them for himself. These things all go to make Georgia attractive, but even they do

not reflect the biggest impression I brought back with me. Georgia's story cannot be told by picture postards.

Nor is it the historical backgrounds of the state, which go back two hundred years and more. Georgia has preserved landmarks that recall the parts she played in the Revolutionary war, the War Between the States, and before that the Colonial wars with the Indians and the Spaniards. All of which made one feel priveleged to tread her soil-the sacred spots where our great nation's County, if there be a newspaper pubfuture was determined.

There are real thrills for one who enjoys the historical development of our country, when he stands on a fort built by General Oglethorpe years before New Engand was settled and as he contemplates the ammunition chambers still lined with bricks made of England's clay and brought over in the sailing vessels of the time. On the top of the fort, the rusty barrel of an old colonial cannon, left there by Oglethorpe's men; the church nearby on the spot where John Wesley first preached; and the still-in-service more than two hundred-year-old Midway church with its ancient graveyard nearby; remind one of the determination and sincerity of purpose of our country's first white settlers.

This is again brought home as one stands before the monument of the site of the "Battle of the Bloody Marsh," where in one day long ago it was decided that the southern half of our great country was to be English and not Spanish. Henry Grady's Pen
