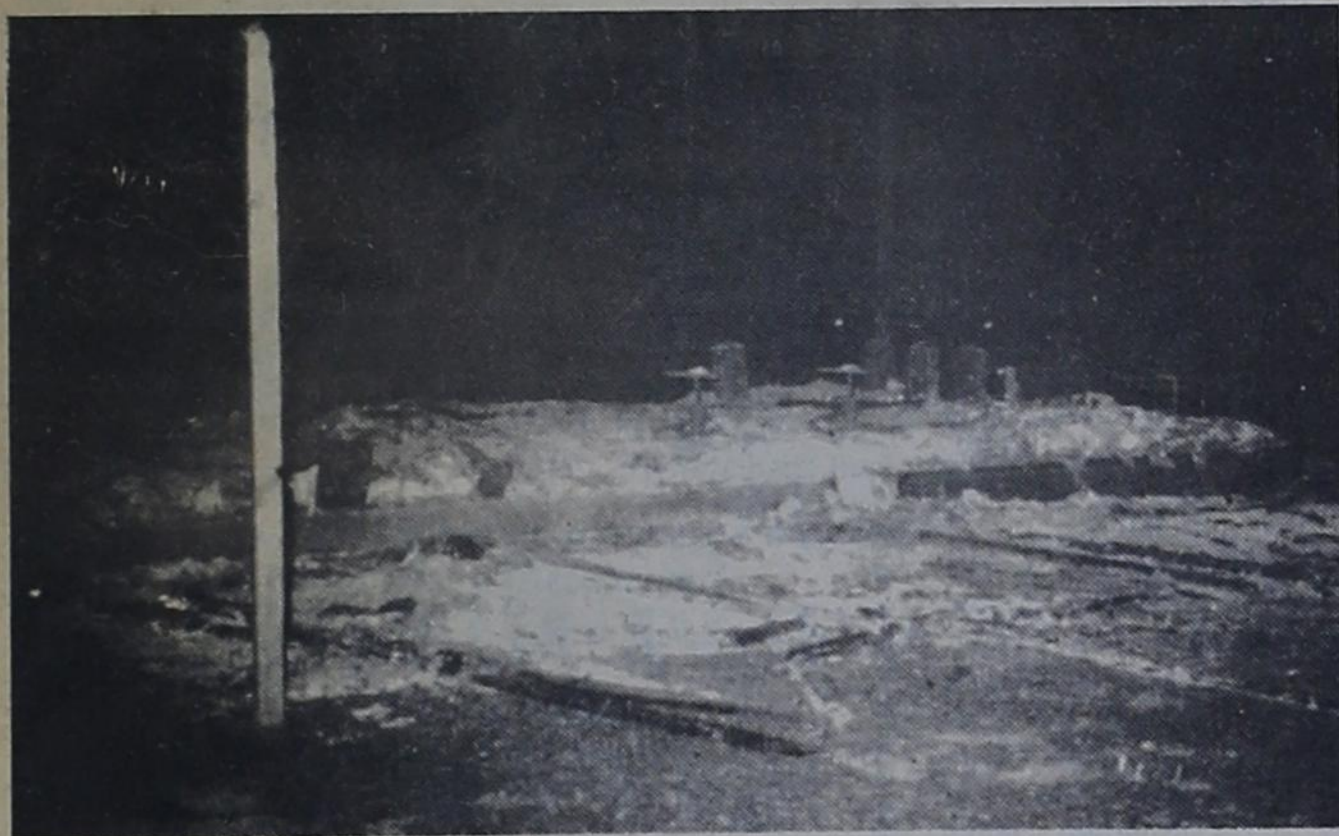

RIF Program Begins In Baird School

BAIRD- All Baird kindergarten and grade school students will participate in the Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) program, sponsored by the Mothers-Fathers-Teachers organization.

The objective of the RIF program is to motivate young readers to become better readers. Each student will be presented with three free books of their choice from a wide selection to be offered. Students will be allowed to select one book during each of the months of October, January

and April.

To kick off the RIF program on October 10, all students will come to school dressed in their favorite storybook character costume. A parade will be held in the morning with all students participating. In the afternoon, each student will release a balloon with their name on it, in an attempt to receive some correspondence from whoever finds the balloon.

Funds for the RIF program are shared equally by the MFT and the Federal Government.

Baird Raises Contribution For EMS, Still \$200.00 Short

COUNTY- The year old Citizens Emergency Medical Service will no longer exist if the \$450.00 slashed from its monthly budget is not restored by October 15.

The service, which is subsidized by Clyde, Baird and Callahan County, has been a matter of controversy since Clyde City Council voted to reduce its contribution from \$1,100.00 to \$650.00.

When EMS was created, it was agreed that Clyde pay \$1,100.00 a month, county pay \$650.00 and Baird pay \$250.00.

When Clyde City Council learned that Baird used the ambulance service just as much as the citizens of Clyde, and paid \$850.00 less, they dropped their contribution to \$650.00.

At the latest Baird City Council meeting, their contribution to the EMS was raised from \$250.00 to \$500.00 monthly.

Now all the EMS needs is \$200.00 more from one of the three and it will be back up to the same amount as when EMS was created.

Judge Kniffen didn't know what the County would do. The EMS problem wasn't on their agenda for the next meeting.

When Clyde mayor, A.N. Johnson was asked about the ambulance service he said that as far as he knew it wasn't on their agenda for their next meeting which is Thursday, October 11.

Bears Lose to Mavericks 10-7 In Last Minutes Friday

BAIRD- Friday night, September 28, Baird played their final non-district game. The Bears were defeated by the Eastland Mavericks in a close 7-10 game.

Eastland's winning points came with 35 seconds left in the game. Ken Swift kicked a 27 yard field goal to wrap up the game.

Baird scored first as quarterback Darryl Harris threw for a 67 yard touchdown to Larry Segura. This came at the end of the first quarter. The extra point was good.

Eastland didn't score until the third quarter. Brian Lund drove across the goal line for a touchdown. Their extra point was good and the score was tied 7-7.

Coach Edmiston was especially proud of the defense. He felt like it was their

best, defensively. They had three excellent goal line stands. On one they held Eastland off when they only had a quarter of an inch to go for a touchdown.

The offense was not so sharp as usual. There were some mental mistakes during the game.

Baird had 4 first downs, 17 yards rushing and 88 yards passing. They had 8 penalties for 37 yards. Baird completed 4 out of 12 passes.

Eastland had 15 first downs, 175 yards rushing and 101 passing. They completed 4 out of 10 passes and had 5 penalties for 45 yards.

Baird is open date this week, but next week everyone come out for the district opener against Hawley. It will be played here at 7:30 p.m.

Atrelle Dill Dies Wednesday

BAIRD- Atrelle Dill, 59, of Baird, a well-known commercial artist who won seven Freedom Foundation medals, died at 10:25 a.m. Wednesday after a 2½ month illness. Services were at 4 p.m. Thursday in Ross Annex Cemetery, directed by Parker Funeral Home.

The Rev. Jim Lynes of Abilene officiated.

Born September 7, 1920, in Baird, she had lived here all her life and was a freelance artist. She was well-known in the field of educational art and had received the Freedom Foundation Medal seven times since 1962 for her artistic work in visual aid educational ma-

terials. Her work, in conjunction with the literary work of Mrs. Roberta Ross of Ft. Worth, is on display at Valley Forge as well as being used extensively in public schools across the nation.

She devoted much of her time to illustrating children's books. She has illustrated a bilingual teaching aid kit which is used by Texas teachers. She was Baird Artist of the Month in June 1975.

She married Alvis Dill May 31, 1941, in Abilene. She was a Catholic.

Survivors include her husband; her mother Clara Estes of Baird; and a brother, Paul Cook of Dallas.

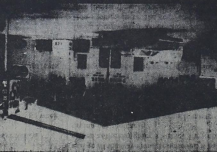

CLYDE- A memorial fund has been established to benefit the wife and daughter of a Clyde man killed early Tuesday in a motorcycle accident on east U.S. 80.

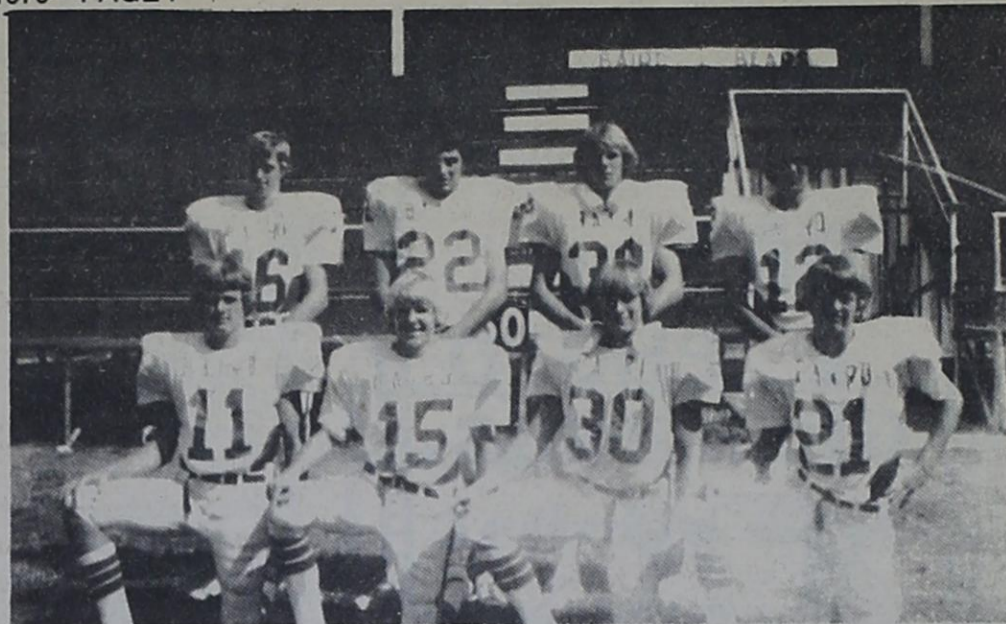

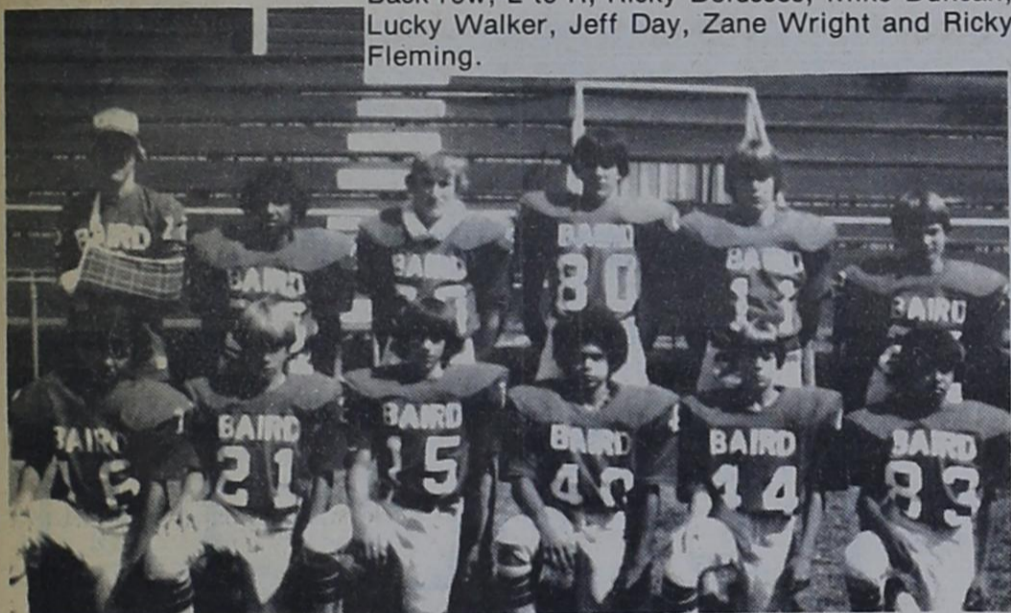

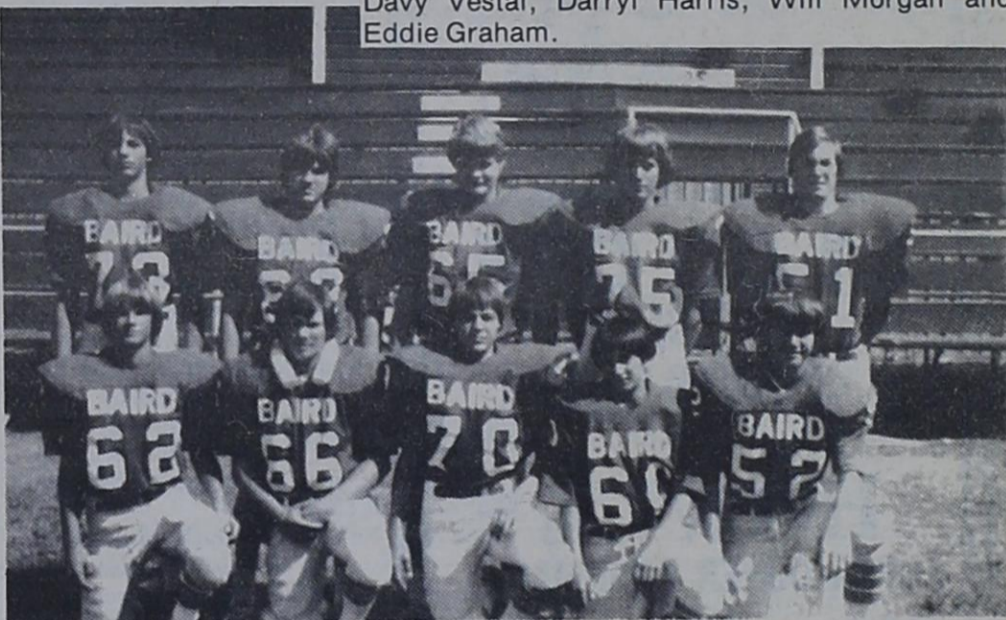

Cable Rates to Increase Nov. 1

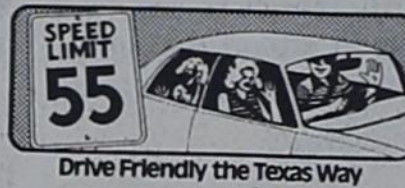
Mrs. Cozart was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Bobby Curtis. The body was taken to Parker Funeral Home in Baird.

Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

I'm sorry. I have been terribly remiss. I should be expressing congratulations to the citizens of Baird for what you have accomplished. On August 12, 1978, you expressed your preference at the polls and elected to turn down a reasonable offer from West Texas Utilities Company for the sale of Baird's electrical system and as a result you are now paying about 78% more for electricity than you would be paying on WTU's rates. So, I think congratulations are in order. You made your bed, now lie in it.

Those of you who know me will recognize that that paragraph is facetious. I think I must have inherited some intestinal fortitude from my mother, who came to eastern New Mexico in 1904, as an 18 year old, 85 pound girl and settled up a claim, living in a dugout. She wouldn't give up, so, neither will I.

Before that referendum in 1978, the Citizens of Baird were given a lot of misleading information and as many of you have expressed to me, you were "lied" to. I happen to know that WTU took all the 1977 electrical billings of the City and converted that usage to their rates and the results was a staggering overcharge in excess of \$100,000.00. That information was sent down to Baird but somewhere it got lost so you didn't know about that.

According to the auditors report of the year ending June 30, 1979, 80% of the operating expenses of enterprise funds was for the electrical department. Of course, that included diesel and gas for the generators. 61% of the expenses for

repairs and maintenance was the electrical department. Salaries and employee benefits accounted for 52%. So, with those figures sticking out like a sore thumb, you can see why I contend that the present plans to tie into WTU and buy reasonable rate will not work. The expense will be so much that you will be paying the seven or eight cents per KWH instead of the four and a half or five cents it would be with WTU.

In my education in civics and government, I was taught that in our democracy, elected officials were supposed to respond to the wishes of the people. Such is not the case in Baird with its "pro-City" dominated City Council. They want to pursue their plans no matter what it costs you, the consumer. To wit: a petition was turned in to the City August 28th and to date, nothing has been done about it. Due to some changes in wording, another petition is being circulated now so, I would urge you people of Baird who do not like what is going on, get out and sign that new petition even if you are threatened with phone calls that you will be ridden out of town on a rail.

I think what would be a good idea would be for you people who do not like what is going on, go down to the next City Council meeting. Not on the agenda, but just your presence could do some good. They are supposed to be representing you.

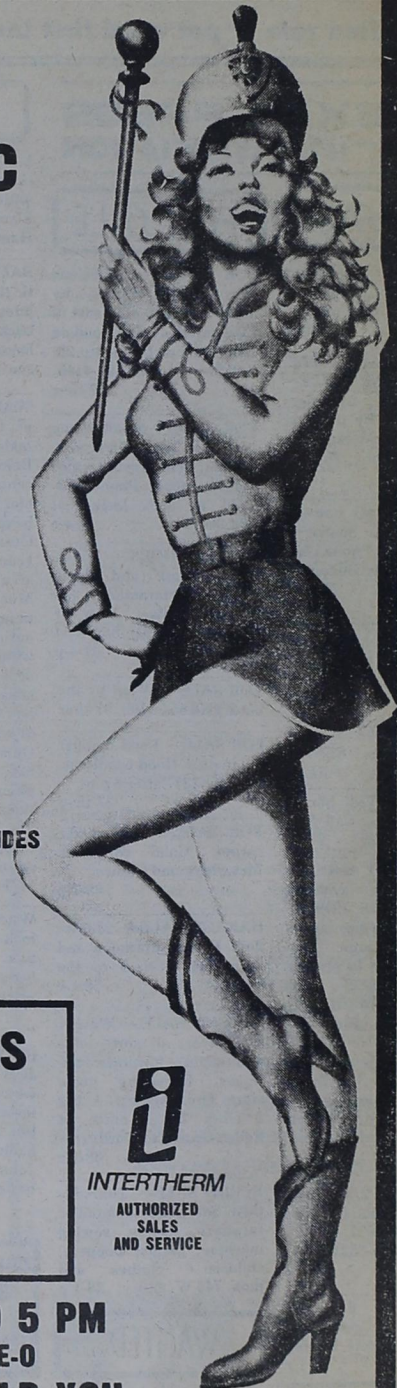
