Such is definitely not possible for financial reasons in the immediate future. When the printing will be returned to Friona is dependent upon how well the paper does under its new management. We hope that is well—but of course, we just can't foretell.

At the time we purchased The Star, machinery had deteriorated to such an extent that the body type for the paper was being set out of town. This is a condition which we inherited, and unhappily, have no control over.

Under such circumstances, we will say that Bert Neelley certainly did a creditable job.

If for no more than one reason, Friona folks ought to be thrilled to see the Grahams and Osborns take over. The night we closed the deal—Wednesday two weeks ago—it rained, for the first time in... well, how long HAS it been?

And as this column is being prepared Tuesday morning, it's raining again. Since we haven't heard anybody else claiming credit for this rain, we believe we'll take it for ourselves.

Dollar Day values the equal of any other city within hundreds of miles will be offered by Friona merchants Monday, May 7, in the fourth such event attempted by local retail businessmen.

Joe Ferrell of Ware's Department Store, who is chairman of the retail merchants' committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, heads the dollar day movement.

This week he indicated that the promotion is picking up steam, and beginning to attract extra

trade. As the pattern of having a dollar day the first Monday of each month in Friona sets in the minds of area consumers, the response will increase, he believes.

## Construction Slated On New Post Office

Construction of Friona's new post office building is scheduled to begin this week, announces Leo McLellan, postmaster. A building permit was let this week to Mrs. Laura Cooley of Fort Worth, who is to put up the building.

The new building, which is 33x64

feet, will be erected on the corner of Euclid Avenue and Seventh Street, west of Friona State Bank. It will be of brick and tile construction and will face north.

McLellan indicated that Mrs. Cooley intends to complete the building and have it ready for occupancy within 60 days. She has contracted for on or before July 1.

Equipment for the new post office is already on hand, being stored in a vacant office building at the rear of the bank. When Friona's post office makes its move into new quarters, facilities will be increased to 676 local boxes—and there will be room for more when the need arises.

There is a long waiting list at the post office now for boxes.

Other new items on hand, in addition to the boxes are a desk, typewriter stand, sack racks, and sorting tables.

## Cemetery Well And Pump Bid Accepted

Bid for installation of a new well and pump at the Friona cemetery was accepted Monday night by the city commission, with a local firm, Parmer County Pump Company, presenting the low figure, according to Roy Wilson, city clerk.

Bids submitted for the job were: Big T Pump Company of Hereford, \$5,454.30; Clowe and Cowan of Amarillo and Hereford, \$5,750; Parmer County Pump Company of Friona, \$5,160; and Massey Bros. Drilling Company of Friona, \$5,585.

The city acquired the cemetery last year, and installation of a large capacity well is the first of several planned improvements.

Because of a conflict of meeting dates, no other decision was made. Members of the group wished to attend the Lions Club Ladies' night on that evening.

Regular meeting time is the coming Monday evening, but city dads have decided to meet every Monday night until much of the business is taken care of. Wilson says many important items are scheduled for discussion in the near future.

## Paving Installation Completed Saturday

Friona marked another milestone in its march toward becoming the High-Plains best-improved small city when the West Texas Construction Company employees finished 67 blocks of paving Saturday.

Completion of the huge and expensive job of paving so many city streets ended another phase of improvements embarked upon in March of last year when voters approved a \$175,000 bond election.

Earmarked in this election was \$45,000 for paving—but that tells only a part of the story. Property

owners of the city are shouldering the big part of the expense of the improvement, \$160,000.

The water and sewer improvements, costing \$70,000 and \$35,000 respectively, were completed in January. H. B. Jordan of Amarillo was contractor for that job.

City officials are poised for another part of the improvements provided for in the election: a city hall, jail, and expansion of the fire department facilities.

Tagged for this construction is \$25,000 of the election bonds. The city commissioners are expected to give a green light to this work in the next few days.

## Chiefs Schedule Doubleheader

Coach M. L. Mean's Friona Chiefs are hoping to post a win over the Vega high school baseball team in a double-header diamond duel here tomorrow (Friday) afternoon. Time of the game is 3 o'clock.

The conference has been split this year with the six competing teams divided into the North Half and the South Half, in competition. The winner of the North group will play the winner of the South teams, to decide on the top team of the entire six.

Friona, Vega and Adrian compose the north group and Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie make up

the south half.

Standing of the Chiefs in play will be determined by the game tomorrow afternoon. The team is now tied with Adrian in conference play.

The Chiefs have been fitted with new uniforms which were furnished by the Friona merchants through the Chamber of Commerce. Fifteen uniforms have been purchased at a cost of \$15.35 each. Officials and students expressed appreciation this week for the badly needed uniforms.

## Construction Moving Along On Hospital

Construction on a new building for the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona—which was first estimated to cost \$150,000, but now may run around \$175,000 to complete—is moving ahead on schedule.

Elmo Jones of Littlefield, contractor, believes that completion may be effected by September. Walls are finished, and partitions on the inside are giving shape and form to the new building.

Much new equipment will go into the building when the transfer is made this fall, reports Jimmy Baxter, hospital manager. The investment in new equipment probably will run around \$28,000, he says.

Recent appeals in county newspapers have brought out several new donors who have volunteered to furnish hospital rooms, he said. Only one room remain to be furnished by volunteer contributors.

# Friona To Play Host To County-Wide Cotton Men's Meet

Cotton farmers and other citizens of Parmer County interested in the future of cotton will meet in the Friona School auditorium Thursday night, May 10, at 8:30, to hear John T. Gregg, West Texas representative for the National Cotton Council, discuss ways and means necessary to the end of acreage cuts and market lags in the field of cotton.

Jack Patterson of Rhea, commodities chairman of Parmer County Farm Bureau, directed planning for the meeting, designed to gain participation of producers in the solution of the cotton problem. He and Wright Williams, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, met with Gregg about three weeks ago to discuss such a meeting.

A. L. Hartzog, Bovina, president of Parmer County Cotton Improvement Association, and W. L. Edelman, Friona, president of Parmer County Farmer's Union, have been urged to invite their members to the meeting. Chamber of Commerce and Lions Clubs of Farwell, Bovina and Friona are also actively promoting and advertising the

meeting. Gilbert Kaltwasser, Farm Bureau president, joined Patterson in emphasizing that this is not an organizational meeting, but a cotton farmers' meeting. They said they believed this would be a non-partisan and non-organizational meeting that every cotton producer in the area will feel at home in. Questions may be directed to Gregg on any phase of cotton production, marketing or grading, at the close of the illustrated speech. Cotton Promotion Week, May 14 to May 19 will be emphasized following the meeting and merchants of Parmer County towns will be provided with "Pick Cotton" streamers designed to promote purchases of cotton materials and clothing.



# Student Inquiries Get Personal Replies On Youth Problems

Freshmen in Friona High School have teamed with their English teacher, Vera Ann Jones, to work for good citizenship, by first learning some of the pitfalls that might be encountered by the younger generation. Their approach was a positive one, and the results so far have been enough for class enthusiasm.

Students were discussing juvenile delinquency, and became so engrossed in their subject, that members of two freshmen English classes decided to do some letter writing. Although it was not a compulsory assignment, each student selected a person whom he thought would be helpful on the subject, and wrote the person a letter.

In the correspondence, young people asked the recipient of the letters what his opinion on juvenile delinquency would be,

and what preventive measures he or she would suggest.

So far, five answers have been received, and evaluation of replies indicates that the majority of the national figures who were questioned, feel that instead of more recreation, young people need more responsibilities.

Eldon Sparkman did not receive a direct answer from Homer Garrison Jr., director of Texas Department of Public Safety, but he did get some pointers from Bill Kavanaugh, administrative assistant of the department.

The writer told young Sparkman, "We believe there must be some changes in the law concerning the punishment of juveniles so as to make it stricter and at the same time make some changes in the law concerning the duties of parents with respect to their children so as to make them stricter also.

"In addition to changes in laws, steps must be taken to see that juveniles are kept busy with wholesome entertainment and also with jobs so they will not engage in activities which come from idleness."

Kavanaugh enclosed a clipping from an Austin newspaper, with results of a study of delinquency made by students of two of the high schools there.

Bearing a New York address was the letter received by Carol Oldham from the noted minister, Norman Vincent Peale. Dr. Peale sent his best wishes to the class for their concern and endeavors. Two paragraphs summed up Dr. Peale's views.

"Adults can argue about the causes of juvenile delinquency and there will never be any unity of agreement. Their tendencies are always to blame someone else, perhaps for something that they themselves are responsible for. The big problem is what are the adults going to do about it."

"I think we have heard too much lately about the juvenile delinquents and not enough about the host of people who are high-minded and thoroughly responsible citizens. Progress will be made much more rapidly when the youngsters themselves take seriously their part in building character in the lives of other young people."

H. Park Tucker, protestant chaplain of the United States Penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., answered Peggy Widner by referring to "universal delinquency," not "juvenile delinquency."

He said, "Teen-agers today can do much toward the solving of these problems. You need Bible Forum, where you can gather to study the Word of God and have Christian fellowship one with another."

"You should take an active part in your church activities, for in doing this, the church will be more inclined to have programs primarily for young people. Youth today must set the example. The older generation has failed in its duty. If you go about seeking to do things in life according to God's plan, you will have no trouble finding the path leading to victory."

Charlotte Bails chose the writer of Mrs. Poke Bonnett as the person she would query, and Mrs. Poke quoted from a recent column which had appeared under her byline, reading, "Having a delinquent develop on you is sort of like overweight—it doesn't come on suddenly. The time to work on it is when it's only a little delinquent or a couple of pounds extra."

"Probably, Charlotte," she continued, "most of my ideas on what causes juvenile delinquency and how to prevent it are in that column except for one thing. Parents who take their jobs seriously, with wise adult love, encouragement for their offspring, who share

their work, their fun, their religion with children aren't likely to have any major delinquents develop. You must remember that all of us, parents and children alike, are somewhat ornery."

"The one thing I mentioned above as lacking in the column is responsibility and work. It would be well if your school, your clubs, your community and your family could give each of you young people something interesting and truly important to do. Then after they had done so much for you and been so sweet, if you insisted on being delinquent, I'd jump right down your throat and jerk you wrongside out."

But her contention is that if parents follow the Lord's Book of Instructions as best they can, those youngsters will turn out all right nine times out of eight.

Last and most brief of the letters was the straight-to-the point advice of Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of the late president, Franklin D. Roosevelt. In her reply to Freida Downs, she simply stated, "In reply to your letter, I think it is a good idea for teen-agers to develop good habits and interests that keep them busy along constructive lines."
