#### The County Fair: Worth Saving?

Unless somebody gives it a quick injection of dedicated energy, the Parmer County Fair and Dairy Show, practically a Friona institution, won't be with us again this fall.

This sad report comes from the few stragglers still left in the field who are attempting to manage the fair's wobbly condition.

Interest in the fair has never been lower. At least, that's the report from the field.

The fair buildings are wrecked.

It takes money to run a fair—and where's it coming from this year, with so many other "live wire" causes ready to gobble it up?

We're not sure that we have a solution to these perplexing problems facing the loyal few who want to see the Fair continued. But we are sure of one thing:

If Parmer County, which ranks ninth in the entire state of Texas (there being 253 other counties) in agriculture, and if

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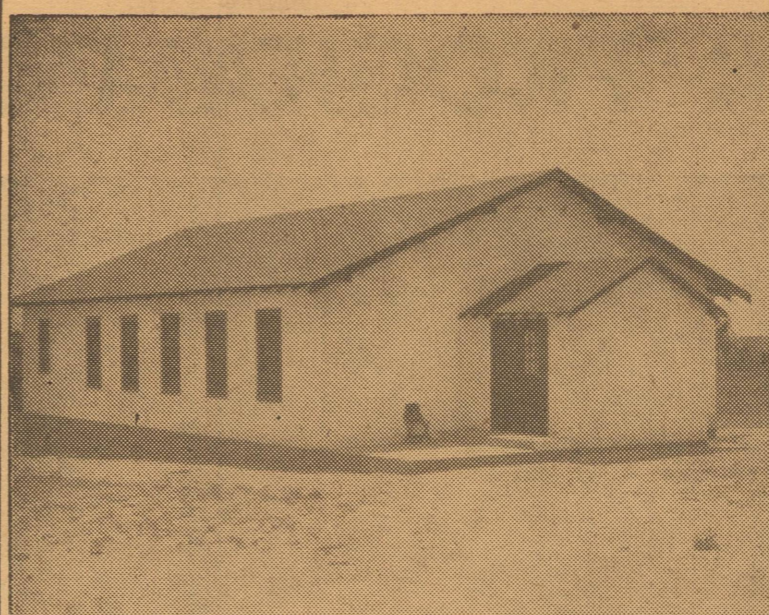
all our bragging about Parmer County being such a great farming country, is true, then how will we ever explain to outsiders that we let our fair die a slow, hard death just as farming was reaching its peak development?

There's something wrong in this picture, and the general public is going to have to decide what it is.

If there's nothing to be gained from a county fair, then we say don't have one. Don't, for goodness sakes, have a half-hearted one. It's worse than nothing.

If it is true that the County Fair would generate interest in young farmers and young homemakers to display their talents, and if it would help "tell the world" about the incredible productivity of Parmer County's farms, then the Fair ought to be the best county exhibition on The Plains.

### Missionary Work Is Not Always In Foreign Field

When the word "mission" is mentioned to most church people, the notion immediately is conveyed of a far-away place. But missions don't always have to be in other countries.

In fact, the Friona Baptists are proving that they don't even have to be in other towns. There is one right here in this community.

It is the Friona Baptist Mission for Spanish speaking people, and since its establishment over a year ago, has proved to be a very worthwhile undertaking, according to Rev. C. M. Fields, pastor of the mother church.

The 65x35 foot building formerly

serving as the auditorium of the Baptist Church was moved two blocks south and two blocks west last year when the idea was first originated.

Seating 250 persons, the building also has seven classrooms for Sunday School and other work. Marian Martinez, a local employee of the Santa Fe, is serving as temporary pastor, and the church is seeking a full-time minister in the future.

Although the mission has been a successful venture from an evangelistic standpoint, it still is directly dependent upon the parent church for guidance and financial

support. In addition to providing the building, the Friona Baptists are paying the pastor's salary, the utilities, and supplies, and are helping in other ways such as organization of Sunday School and church work. The cost of maintaining the mission is about \$250 per month.

The mission is now averaging about 35 each week in Sunday School, and, because of interest in the work of the church, a full-time program is underway with regular morning and evening services.

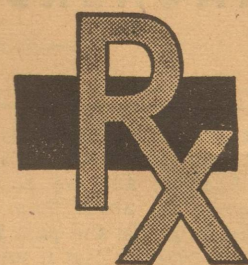
"Interest in the mission is increasing," says Rev. Fields, and as an indication, he pointed out that three were received into the church by baptism Sunday evening.

Spanish speaking residents from a wide area have been attracted to the mission, especially those from south of Friona, where many are employed on farms.

The idea of this mission was originated locally, says Rev. Fields, and the work is being carried on under the direction of a missions committee composed of

Ernest C. Hock, J. B. "Pete" Buske, and Hubert Singleterry.

The mission is announcing a revival which will be held August 13 through August 19, with Eliseo Rios of Levelland to be evangelist.

**1,320,000 Acre Feet Water In Cochran**

The portion of Cochran County within the boundary of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District contained about 1,320,000 acre-feet of ground water available for pumping in 1956. This same portion of the county contained about 1,500,000 acre-feet of ground water available for pumping in 1938; and about 180,000 acre-feet, or about 13 percent of the water storage, was removed by pumping during the 18-year period. Most of the irrigation wells were drilled after World War II, there-

fore, most of the pumpage took place after the war. About 117,000 acres of Cochran County are within the boundary of the district. However, several thousand acres of land outside of the boundary of the Water District are irrigated by more than a hundred irrigation wells. The figures above do not include the ground water in storage or the water that was pumped in the irrigated area outside the Water District. The accompanying maps were prepared from data compiled from a study of about 400 logs of water wells and about 150 measurements of water levels in wells.

The map in plate 1 shows the approximate thickness of the water-bearing strata in the Ogallala formation in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir. The map in plate 2 shows the approximate decline of the water table from the spring of 1938 to January 1956. The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the

volume of material unwatered since 1938 from the total volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent. The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent.
