> Under contracts awarded today, 164.7 highway miles will be improved, including 17 miles of concrete paving; 86 miles of grading and drainage structures, 46 miles of surface treatment and base work and 15 miles of jetting and ponding.

schools, and is at this time Count, Superintendent of Public instruction of Hockley county.



A little girl once wrote the followng letter to a large American daily newspaper:


