

musical program for the master." "We cordially invite people of other households of faith to worship with us."





Two years ago the youth was struck by a truck on a slippery street in Wichita Falls, his home. The bone in his left leg was splintered. Months of treatment followed, but the leg didn't heal and he seemed doomed to be a cripple.




