Mr. O. T. Murphey, local superintendent of the Texas Compress & Warehouse Company plant in this city, invited us out to the big plant last Saturday morning, and we are truly glad that we went. We knew that the company had greatly enlarged the shed area in the summer, menbrothers shared alike in the grocery ition of which was made in these business here and the ranch interests columns. We were aware that they were now using a high density press Pat is a good man, a good citizen, which prepared the bales here to cross the water if that happened to be their destination, without re-compress at Houston or Galveston, but we had an idea that the press they worked over. Well, we had plenty surprises in store.

State Fire Marshal Mauk, Urges **People Of Texas To Be Careful With Fire During Christmas Holiday**

Raymond S. Mauk, State Fire Marshal, has sounded a warning of the danger of fires during the Christmas Holidays. His statement released today reads as follows:

"BE CAREFUL, don't let fire mar your Christmas joy. Fire Prevention, like Charity, begins at home.

"Business men and merchants are so engrossed with the idea of Christmas rush and business that they are not careful of the danger of fire and they should be reminded that it pays to prevent fires. Also, the average home is fillwith the Christmas Spirit and unless ev. precaution is taken, carelessness is likely to creep in and turn some house of merriment into a house of mourning.

"DO YOU KNOW

"That everygreen trees decorated with highly inflamable material often ignite?

"That cotton or lighted candles should never be placed on the Christmas tree?

"That the cotton beard of a Santa Claus frequently catches fire with serious results?

"That the old vuletide custom of placing a lighted candle in the window near curtains has cast many a cloud of

"That small children should never be permitted to handle fireworks?

"That wrappings from Christmas packages should not be allowed to accumulate?

"That Christmas bonfires constitute a serious danger to both life and property?

"That it is dangerous to start grass fires at any time? 'That toy electric trains, motors and other appliances should no be attached to light sockets until all fuses and connections are in perfect order?

"That pennies or wire should never be used in replacing blownout electric fuses?

"That the Christmas holidays which should be a period of unmixed cheer, may become one of sadness because of the thoughtlessness of someone about fire hazards?

"That about one fire out of every ten during the Christmas season results in a fatality?"

Game Warden Says Hawks Killing Birds

T. E. Sammons of Midland, game warden for this district, was a business visitor here Tuesday. He is one of the oldest employes of the State Game and Fish Department, having served therein since 1921.

Mr. Sammons states that as long as the closed season is scheduled he is going to do his best to see that the law is enfored but he advances the assertion we will never again ask for a closed season since it is not going to increase the game birds. The reason for this is the increasing number of hawks and prairie runners to be noted in this area. He says a hawk will devour on an average of three quail per day the year round while a prairie runner eats the eggs and young quail at almost an equal rate.

When we have an open season, hunters kill hawks and prairie runners and keep them from becoming the menace to game birds that they are

Since he began his duties as game warden in this district last Februrary Mr. Sammons estimates he has killed an average of 100 hawks per month and he permits few prairie runners to




