Not In Such Bad A Paved Highway To Shape After All Lubbock This Year

One of the things that will make it more convenient for travel in all kinds of weather, will be the fact that perhaps before the year 1933 has gone down in history, it will be possible for the people of Brownfield and Terry county to reach Lubbock on a paved highway, and from there have access by pavement either north or south. And taking it the other way around, if the road from here to Seagraves is aved, and it will likely be this year or early in 1934, it will be possible to leave here via Seagraves, Seminole and Andrews, and in two or three hours reach the Bankhead highway at Odessa that will give us another paved highway east or west as far as person can travel by car.

The writer and Claude Hudgens were invited Sunday to take a trip to Lubbock with Mr. K. B. Mc-Williams, of this city, and we gladly accepted. On this trip we got to test the fine caliche road on 137 from Lubbock to the Hockley county line. This road some 18 miles in length is now almost complete. In fact, it was being traveled Sunday from one end to the other, although the barriers are put up during the week days when the construction crews are working. However, it is open at all times now from Wolffarth to Lubbock and will be on this end in the next few weeks, or just as soon as a liv le more finish work is done on the sides of the bar pit.



We are printing all three of the Terry county bank statements in the Herald this week. While the law requires that these statements be printed at times specified by the banking commissioner at Austin, and the Comptroller of currency at Washington, all good bankers are glad to give their statements to the public when called upon to do so, especially if they are in as fine shape as the Terry county banks.

You will note that while we only have approximately half of what we had on deposit during the boom years, the loans have also been reduced by more than half, and we have to remember that one dollar now will purchase approximately as much again as it would in 1929. Indeed, about the only thing that seems to bother people now is how they are going to pay taxes that have not or cannot come down as other things have done. Examiners tell us that our banks are in excellent shape, and have been all through the depression. We have men in them that did not get wild eyed during prosperity and so jeopardize their funds by careless business that they were hard hit when the slump came. Fact is, they were, to use a political expression, "building their fences" against such a time.



Red Goose was so weak from loss of blood, he had to stay in bed several days.


The Ojibwa tribe was very proud of the son of their Chief and gave him two eagle feathers with notches on the ends.







OTHERS LOSE-YOU GAIN



Ravens and crows, especially ravens, have done considerable damage to game birds in West Texas and the state fish and game department is seeking to eradicate the pests, according to O. D. Cardwell of Post, deputy game warden for this district.

"We have a raven trap in Dickens county," Mr. Cardwell said, "and in two weeks recently we caught over 700 ravens."

The trap, he said, is located close to a hog killing yard and the birds congregate there. As a result, it is easier to catch them. Ravens kill young ducks and quail and other birds and do damage to crops, the warden pointed out.

Another menace to wild fowl is the hawk. "Over in the Stamford country," Mr. Cardwell said, "hunters tell me they locate quail by hawks. I was out driving with a man one afternoon and he saw a hawk circling in the air over a certain spot. 'Bet you there are some quail there' he told

me. I asked him how he knew and he said he could tell by the hawk. Sure enough, we found quail. Nine times

> out of ten that is a good sign." Mr. Cardwell said he killed all the

hawks he could find while on his field trips. He also kills road runners. These eat the eggs and young birds. A hawk will swoop down and carry off a young quail easily, he said .-
