

First, the state government should be reorganized on basis of federal government, with only three state officials elected, the governor, the lieutenant gover-nor and the speaker of the house. Then the governor should appoint all heads of departments with the senate confirming, and all employees senate confirming, and all employees of every department should be under a rigid cival service rule.

Second, the legislature should be elected for life, or during good behavior, paid a commensurate salary, and forever disbarred from holding employment, or receiving a thing of value, from any other source than the state thru his own or relatives' house, 35 members, and they should be in session at all times, both repealing and passing needed laws. I am aware that that would meet

with instant and violent opposition of the politician who uses his office thru the spoils system to despoil a people.

Then I would eliminate useless boards, commissions and bureaus, and over-lapping governing bodies. I would endorse the county unit plan of government, and let one office administer all affairs of any department-one aassessor and collector for all taxes, municipal, county and state; one constabulary department, administering all enforcement laws, and so on. Then city police would not be policing the same area the sheriff's department policies, etc.
