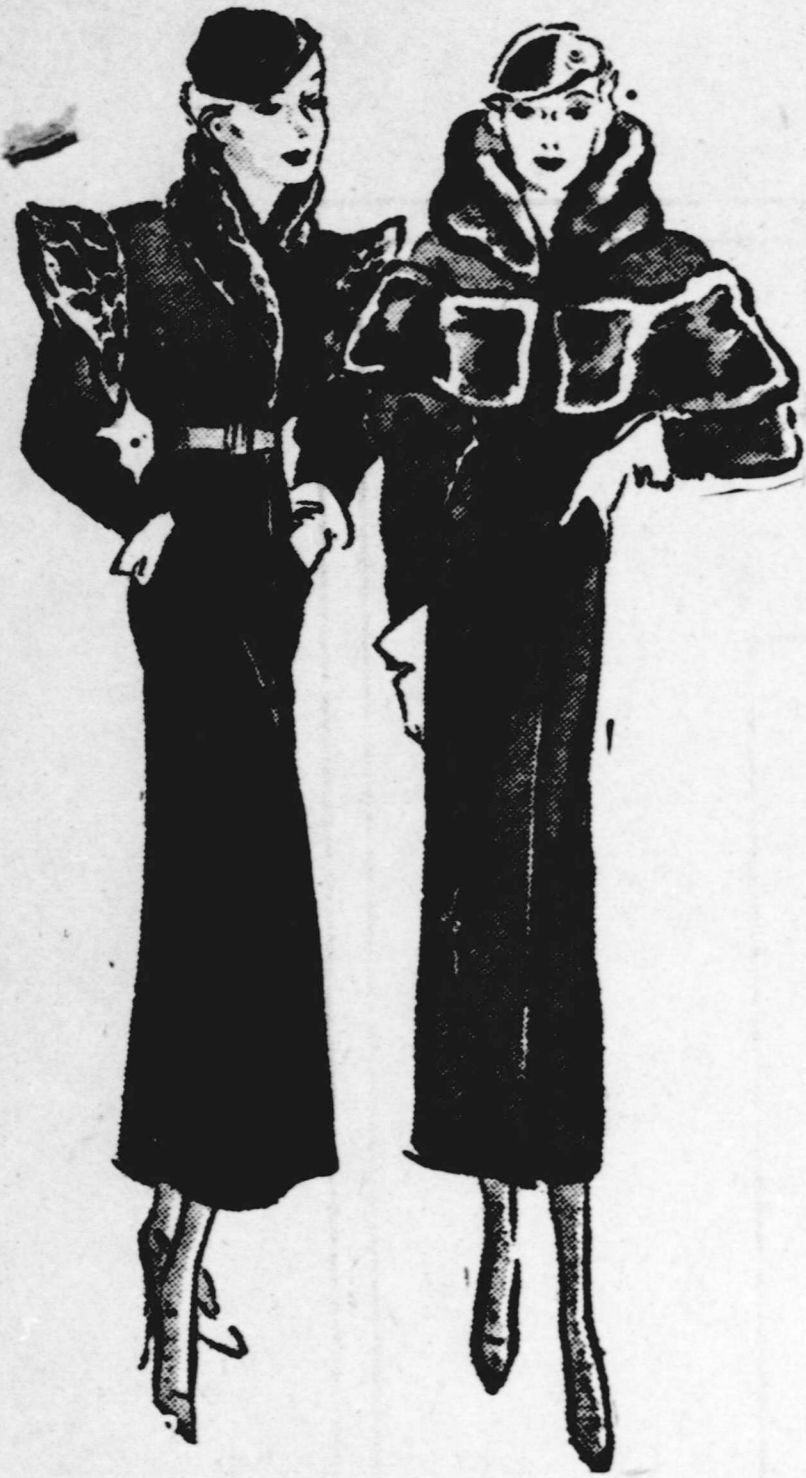

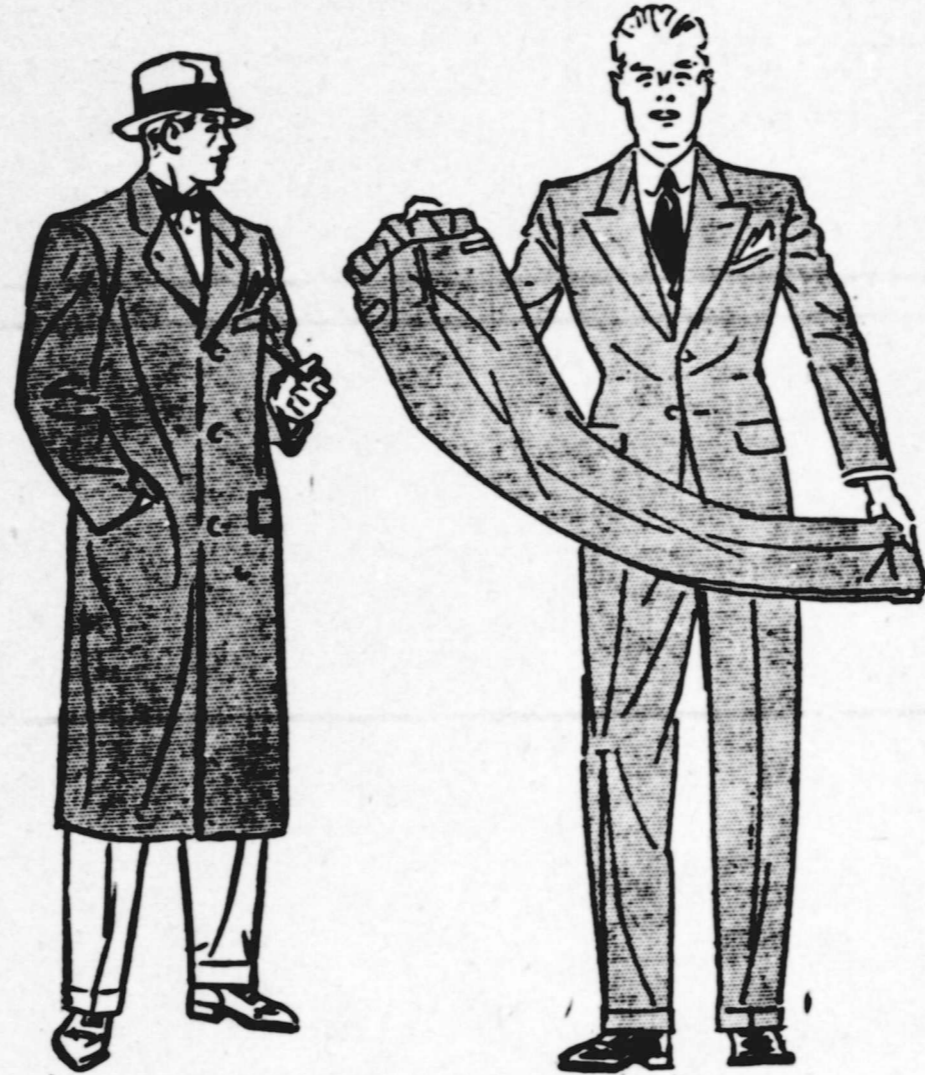

The members of the Home Economics Club are still pressing on toward their goal. They have determined to make this the most successful club in High School. A very beneficial program was rendered Monday,

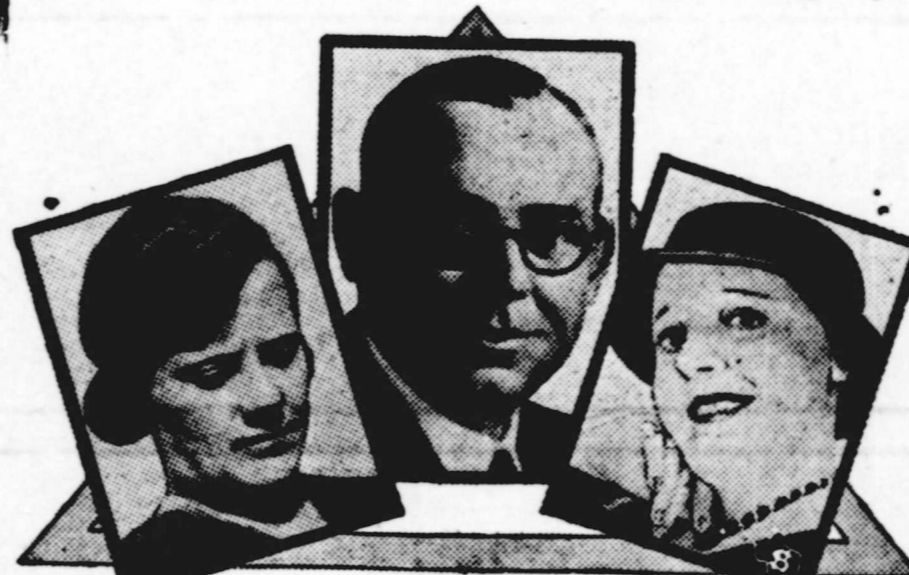

Texas Dairying Growing But Still Behind

The dairying industry in Texas has made amazing growth in the past few years, along with other States of the South. But it is still far behind the production of the older "dairy" States like Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Total United States production of butter last year was 1,694,132,000 pounds, of which Texas produced 34,948,000 pounds or approximately 2 percent. Only one other Southern State was ahead of Texas, however—Oklahoma with 35,156,000 pounds.

That Texas has far to go to attain high ranking in butter-making is proved by the figures of the great dairy states. Minnesota, for instance, produced 281,659,000 pounds.

TEXAN AUDITOR OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS Austin, Texas, Nov.—J. Weldon Jones, a Texan, has been appointed auditor of the Philippine Islands by President Roosevelt.

LIFE INSURANCE COMPLIMENTS THE PRESIDENT

At its recent annual convention, the National Association of Life Underwriters adopted a strong resolution in favor of sound currency, and complimented President Roosevelt on the resistance he has shown toward attempts to foist untried monetary experiments on the government.

That resolution is a very important document. The Life Underwriters who were present represented local associations in every state. Through their efforts more than 65,000,000 persons have purchased insurance totaling over \$100,000,000,000, protecting 20,000,000 families.

Cheapening the dollar through the issuance of printing press money, would endanger every policyholder—precisely as it would endanger every investor in government or other bonds.
