## 3 Trains of Hearst Steers Have Arrived

As this is written Tuesday, the third train load of W. R. Hearst steers from his ranch in old Mexico have arrived, the last train having unloaded its burden Monday. R. L. Harris, local Santa Fe agent informed us Saturday that the last two loads had arrived in fine shape, and were doing nicely. It will be remembered that several were hurt in a wreck in old Mexico before crossing the border with the first train load, and one or two were dead. Since then, six others that were hurt and tromped by the other steers have died. These steers of course come in under bond, and a strict accounting must be made of all losses.

Mountains of feed have been accumulated over at the pens, and is still pouring in by farm wagons and trucks each day. They will not have a bit of trouble in getting all the feed of every description they need. Some two dozen hands are employed all the time to look after and feed this big herd, and by the first of April these steers will begin leaving for the California and other markets, and we are sure that with the experienced men in charge, these steers will top the market again next spring as last at both Los Angeles and San Francisco.

## That Big Benefit Football Game Today

The Rotary and Lions Clubs are sponsoring a big football game this afternoon on the Cub gridiron, just east of the Shelton residence, which promises to be one of the most interesting of the season. ## South Plains to Feed 100,000 Head Sheep

Lubbock, Texas, Dec. 7.—Bumper late feed crops on the South Plains are resulting in the largest sheep feeding program on record and considerably more cattle feeding than was expected six weeks ago. Number of sheep to be fed is estimated at 100,000 to 125,000 in a survey by the South Plains Farmer, and Hale county alone has 40,000 to 50,000 head of sheep for winter feeding.

Hockley county will have 25,000 sheep or more on feed this winter and daily car lot shipments of animals into Lynn, Dawson, Lamb, Bailey, Crosby, Cochran, Floyd and other counties indicate that feeding by oil mills and others will be heavy. Cattle on feed in Lubbock county total 4000 head with about 1,000 more expected to be placed in feed pens early this month. Bulk of the feeding is being done at oil mills through contracts with ranchmen.

## Levelland Cotton Gin is Destroyed

Levelland, Dec. 11.—Fire early Sunday morning destroyed the Farmers Cooperative gin here, entailing a loss estimated at \$30,000 and only partially covered by insurance.

The blaze was fanned by a strong west wind and the local fire department was unable to prevent spread to the adjoining cotton house where 15 bales of seed cotton was stored, ready for ginning.

Fenders on the de luxe care are now in color to harmonize with body colors. **Operation Better**  
The new carburetor and other engine improvements not only give better gasoline mileage and oil economy, but also improve pickup and smoothness of operation. Gasoline economy is said to be improved two to three miles to the gallon. The engine is fitted with aluminum cylinder heads, heat resisting high tungsten chrome alloy steel exhaust valve seat inserts and an entirely new cast alloy steel crankshaft.

Riding comfort has been improved with a more flexible transverse rear spring, improved shock absorbers and seat cushions with deeper, softer springs. Chassis features, include double X-type frame, silent synchronizing transmission, torque-tube drive, one-piece welded steel spoke wheels and 17 by 5.50 tires.

## T. B. Test Work For Terry County Cattle

Terry county's cow population will be freed of tuberculosis at no cost to the owners according to a decision of the Commissioner's Court in their regular session on December 2.

The Federal and State Government furnishes the veterinarians, transportation, vaccine, and pays two-thirds the value of all infected animals. The county will furnish ear tags for the tested cattle which will cost less than one cent per animal.

The owners who refuse to have testing done will have their cattle quarantined on the premises. All cattle coming into the county will be placed under quarantine until tested.

Practically all adjoining counties are having this Accrediting Free Area work done. It is possible that if Terry county did not have this done that the movement of our cattle would be restricted. On completion of this testing Terry county cattle are free for movement anywhere without additional testing.

**DISTEMPER**  
A great many horses have been reported to have Distemper within the last week. All infected and non-infected animals should be vaccinated with Influenza Mixed Bacterian Equine.

## AGRICULTURAL NOTES

**By R. C. Reed, County Agent**  
**Terracing**  
More than twenty-one times as much plant food is removed from fields and pastures of the United States by erosion than by crops, or about 126,000,000,000 pounds of plant food is removed annually by this method according to information from the National Conference Board. The annual financial loss to farmers probably amounts to \$200,000,000.

Mr. Bently, Extension Agriculture Engineer of Texas A & M College, says, "Nearly all cultivated lands of Texas is subject to erosion. The conservation of the soil of the rolling farm lands of Texas is one of our most important problems. There are many ways by which erosion may damage land as: wind and water erosion."

Terracing would be of most importance to Terry county from the standpoint of moisture conservation and prevention of wind erosion. Rainfall is sufficient nearly every year to insure a crop for this county if properly conserved. Often rain falls so quickly that the water runs off without wetting the ground as it should. Terraces properly constructed checks this run off until the moisture has a chance to penetrate the soil. Terracing is as important in places where the rainfall is limited a where the rainfall is too great.

Many cases have been noted where terraced fields produced fair yields adjoining terraced fields that failed completely.

The level terrace possibly fits our type of farming best because of our deep porous soil. The terrace is level, has no grade and is closed at both ends. The rain that falls between the terraces is held until it is absorbed by the soil.

The acreage retired under the new Cotton and Corn program offers fine possibilities for conserving and restoring land that is fast depreciating through special arrangement. Soon after January 1, terracing demonstrations will be arranged in those communities that are interested.

**Working of 1934-35 Cotton Plan**  
John Doe, a farmer, living five miles southeast of Brownfield on a 320 acre farm wishes to figure with the government on retiring some cotton acreage. Farmer Doe would get in touch with the committee in his precinct. The committee would ask, "How many acres have you had in cotton the last five years and how many bales have you made?" The answer would be figured out by the farmer and committee as:

Year	Bales Produced	Acres
1928	13 1/2	90
1929	25	125
1930	34	155
1931	70	175
1932	26 1/2	110
Total	169	655
Average	33 4-5	131

Thirty-three and 4-5 bales multiplied by 500 pounds equals 169,000 total pounds of lint. 169,000 pounds divided by 131 acres equals 129 pounds, the average lint production per acre for five years.

Mr. Committeeman says to Farmer Doe, "The government will allow you to retire from 35 to 45 per cent of this 131 acres and will pay you 3 1/2 per pound on the 129 pounds average five year lint production. Which figures out as: 131 A. multiplied by 40% equals 52.5 A. for retirement. 129 pounds (or lint production) multiplied by 3 1/2 per pound equals \$4.51 per acre. 52.5 A. multiplied by \$4.51 per A. equals \$236.77, total cash rental.

The government further agrees to pay John Doe approximately \$5.00 per bale bonus for 46% of his average production from the years 1928-1932 which will be paid at Christmas time. One-half of the above \$236.77 will be paid between March 1 and April 30, 1934 and the other half between August 1, 1934 and September 30, 1934.

## Dressler-Beery Co-Starring in Tugboat Annie

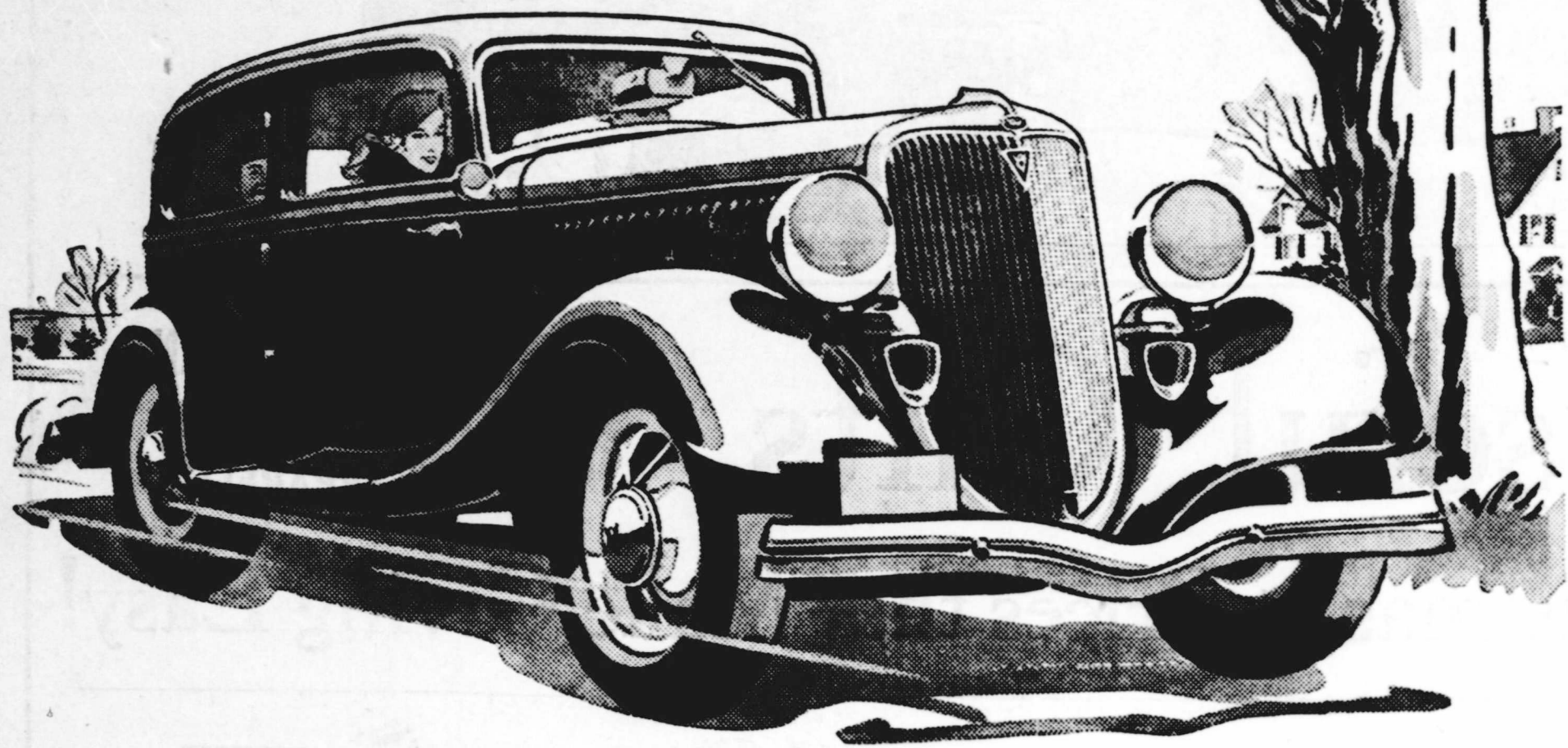

It would save a lot of grief in the future, if people who are selling hogs on the market, would acquaint themselves with the law and keep a record of all hog sales that are made by them that is those that are butchered. There is a tax of 1/2 cent per pound live weight during November; 1 cent during December; 1 1/2 during January and 2 cents afterward. The tax is to be paid by the producer and heavy penalties are provided for its evasion. Blanks for the purpose of making reports may be had from R. C. Reed, County Agent. This looks like a producers tax, but after all it is absorbed by the consumer.

Mr. Horn, one of our farmers, was in the office a few weeks ago and placed us on the track of a proposition that was new to the writer, but one in which we and many others have a live interest. The proposition being, that the government, through Congress, has passed a law, which provides for the erection of headstones over the graves of its departed soldiers, including those who served on the southern side of the civil war. Being of the opinion that a number of soldiers of the different wars, are interred in our cemeteries and are entitled to headstones, we took the matter up with the parties recommended as being able to inform us on the matter: and now have letters out to proper authorities and hope to be able within the next few weeks to assist in securing headstones for everyone that is eligible to them.

Due to the able efforts of Senator A. P. Duggan, Judge Jay Barret and members of the commissioners court, our county is actively engaged in completing the system of lateral roads that was being worked on when the relief commission ordered County Administrator, Malcolm Thomason, to cut our force from 694 to 145, and this action played 'hobb' with our program and almost stopped the work, aside from letting a lot of people out of a job that needed it. However, due to the efforts of Mr. Duggan, the county officials and Mr. L. C. Wines of the county committee, we have around 600 people and a number of teams at work and everything is rolling smoothly at this time. The new county committee is very active and both they and Mr. Thomason are pretty busy keeping everything lined up and undertaking to give work to all who are entitled to it.

Up to this date no cotton option checks have been received and it is understood that all of them are to be mailed out of Washington at about the same date. Sure would like to

There is something like \$10,000 monthly going out of Terry county, never to return and one day last week nearly \$1,400 in money orders were issued by the Post Office at Brownfield.
