



Herod, from time to time by the provisions (44c) of ordinance or by-laws adopted by the said City of Brownfield, and shall pay for not less than one month's license in advance before en-

gaging in said business. Each fractional part of a month shall be counted as a full month, and in case any such transient person or dealer as herein provided shall fail to continue said business for a full month after the issuance of such license, then no part of such license tax so paid shall be refunded to him. The provisions of this Ordinance

shall apply to all transient persons or dealers who shall engage in the sale of goods, wares and merchandise, other than to regularly engaged retail merchants within said city, who are so engaged in such retail trade and sale of such articles from regular store buildings within said City, which are occupied by them as a place for conducting such regular retail business.

By the term 'transient person or 'transient dealer' is meant a person or dealer, who travels from place to place and is engaged in the sale of articles enumerated in the provisions of this ordinance other than to retail

Hereafter, this is not to be permitted. A member may "extend" his remarks, but if there has been no actual applause none is to be indicated in the published text.

The ruling is a sensible one and will protect from a fraudulent practice uninformed readers of the Congressional Record.-Lubbock Avalanche.

Malarial Cases Are On the Increase

Austin, Texas .- According to in formation reaching the Texas State Department of Health, the number of malaria cases is increasing; a sharp turn upward was noted for May. This is directly related to a parallel increase in the number of mosquitoes. The Malaria Unit reports that not for years have they noticed such large numbers of mosquitoes.

Probably one item that favors this ncrease is the mild winter and rainfall which leads to many temporary collections of water. Of course the breeding of mosquitoes is not limited to temporary water, but they are the ones that are often the cause of the increase of the mosquito population. They must have water to propogate.

Attention paid to the following and similar points will largely reduce the opportunities for mosquito breeding. Remove all trash from the back yard, including old cans, pails, bottles, and automobile tires or bodies. Clean up the premises.

Put new washers in leaky hy-

drants. Get some top minnows and U place them in lily pools and cisterns. Look over the roof gutters and drainspouts and remove trash and straighten up any sagged portions. Change the water in flower vases frequently. If there are low spots in the yard where water stands for days after a rain, either fill or drain these places. In any event before complaint is made about mosquitoes to the health department, be sure that your own premises have been thoroughly inspected and found free from mosquito breeding places.
