# **Business Failures For Aug. Show Decine**


AUSTIN, Texas Seppt. 17 -The number of business failures occuring monthly in Texas centinues to be small, acording to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Failures in Texas during August totaled seventeen, the same as in July but only about half the number for August last year. Liabilities of \$209, 000 were 20 per cent lower than in July and 47 per cent below that of August last year. Total assets of the seventeen firms that failed in August were \$107,000 against \$83,000 for an equal number in July, an increase of 29 per cent.


