## POWER FAILURE CAUSED BY BURNED TRANSFORMERS

The storms that came last week tested the patience and the mettle of both the citizens and the city employees. On Monday, three transformers burned at the water treatment plant. The failure interrupted power to the east part of town. A loose connection on one of the City lines delayed restoration of service until the city crew could locate and repair it. Service to the water plant was restored in the early evening.

A delivery truck from Abilene pulled a power line down on Wednesday.

On Thursday the thunderstorm that brought that nice rain also caused another power interruption. This time affecting the whole town. A main circuit breaker in the West Texas Utilities sub-station north of the cemetery tripped because of an overload condition on the Baird lines. WTU crews were dispatched and power restored, but a large transformer in the city sub-station at the park failed. The city crew, working under the adverse conditions of a steady rain interrupted by heavy

showers with a lot of lightning, isolated the troubled area just before dark and restored power to all residences.

On Friday the trouble was located, once again at the water treatment plant. Two transformers had failed, disabling the pumps that deliver water to the storage tanks.

New transformers were purchased and installed, but not before all the water in the tanks was gone. Some persons in the higher parts of town were without water for a few hours.

Mayor Buddy Brame stated that if keeping up with the trouble created by mother nature wasn't enough, when another truck pulled a line down on Saturday he thought it was. He also said that the thought the people who were affected by all the events of the week were very patient, but that he wasn't sure that more problems of a similar nature wouldn't crop up. He also had praise for the efforts of the city employees who worked on the problems.

## Sheriff Believes Unidentified Body From Big Country

The search for the identity of a body found 12 miles southeast of Abilene is still going on.

Sheriff Bill Skinner was in Abilene Thursday talking to families believed to be involved with the victim, but Skinner was not impressed with what he found.

Sheriff Skinner has received many leads in the past few days. He also checked other leads in southwestern Callahan County Thursday.

A strong lead Sheriff Skinner is following has led him to believe the man is from the Big Country area.

An autopsy which was performed Wednesday at Dallas County Crime Lab should supply Skinner the dead man's age.

The body was found about 12:30 p.m. by a road crew beside a dirt road about a mile off State Highway 36.

Preliminary autopsy results showed the dead man stood either 5'7" or 5'8" and weighed around 145 pounds.

Sheriff Skinner left for Dallas Tuesday morning with x-rays and bone structure to compare with the dead man.

The Sheriff's Department is still awaiting the final autopsy report.

What can we say to entice some of you to help us with meal delivery this

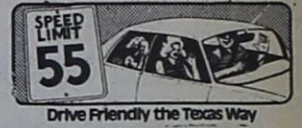
