

The recent formation in Friona of a club for owners of "hot rods" and custom cars has special appeal to the young people of the area, and that is not surprising. As we have before observed, Friona seems to have more than its share of men and women interested in power, speed, and special styles in automobiles.

Although the organization is too young to be appraised for its intrinsic value, the time is perfect to point out that here, in a club which can have affiliation with the National Hot Rod Association, is the perfect opportunity for our young people to have a wholesome outlet for

The NHRA, as it is most often called, is a strict supervisory body which attaches regulation to power and speed, which might otherwise well be put to use in an unsafe manner on the public streets and

Participation in NHRA contests does not put a lid on a man or woman's desire to "burn rubber" or split the wind at over 100 miles per hour on the straight-away. Quite the opposite. Competition among participants often stimulates greater and greater performances as they vie their mechanical ingenuity and their ability as drivers to outdo another.

Instead, NHRA rules provide limitations within which these exhibitions must be performed, and safety and courtesy are the by-words of every rule.

The Star is and always will be against the brazen, reckless, devil-maycare operation of vehicles on public streets and highways, where every second presents a new opportunity for someone to get killed or maimed for life. And often, those who are seriously injured or killed have nothing to do with the accident.







In the case where one merchant gives stamps while his competition does not, he has a marketing advantage that may enable him to raise his gross enough to cover the expense of passing out the gummed

However, as everybody jumps onto the band wagon, no one businessman has an advantage, and consequently, giving stamps simply adds to the cost of doing business and must be passed on to the consumer if the merchant is to retain his original margin of

In the case of the saturated market, the only fellows who make money are the sellers of the stamps themselves.

Giving stamps costs a businessman from two to three and onehalf percent, of his gross, with the three percent figure probably being typical. Unlike advertising, stamps are generally regarded as a refund or premium paid on each purchase.

Advertising will pull sales because people want shopping "news" just as they do news of local and world events. Stamps pull sales because people think they are getting something free.

Naturally, money spent by merchants on stamps sometimes causes these businessmen to reduce advertising expenditures because they falsely assume that stamps ARE advertising.

This being true, it might seem logical for the reader to figure that The Star, for instance, would like to see a law passed outlawing trading stamps. There have been a number of attempts to do this very thing in Texas, and probably this will happen again the next time the legislature is in session.

However, we do not favor legislation which would be in restraint of trade, and this is exactly how such a law would have to be classified. Whether stamps are good or bad is something that the consumer—not the congressman -ought to decide, we think.

Similarly, Texas should be re-tained as a "free trade" state, and not a "fair trade" one. Amazingly enough, few people know the difference. In "fair trade" states, of which there are now many, a businessman is required by law to sell his wares at a price decided upon to be fair to himself, his customer, and the manufacturer.

The net effect of this is to protect the businessmen-not the consumer—we might point out.

While it is true that many businesses have been forced into bankruptcy because they had to keep up with their competition's "loss

Freight Rates Cut For Drouth Counties

Reduced freight rates have now been arranged for drouth disaster counties, and eligible applicants are entitled to such benefits under revised routines in handling freight rate certificates, according to Walter T. McKay, state FHA director.

These orders provide that the class of persons entitled to reduced rates are those designated as being in distress and in need of relief by the USDA or by such state agents as designated by the Department. The secretary of agriculture has authorized governors of all drought stricken states to designate persons entitled to reduced freight rates. Effective November 15, Governor Shivers redelegated to all county judges in designated drought counties in Texas the authority to execute

certificates. "Heretofore, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisors were authorized to execute certificates and only stockmen who were eligible for emergency feed could obtain the certificates. This revised authorization will extend the benefits of reduced freight rates to all stockmen in designated counties,"


