Drop in Food Prices Since AAA's Death

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25. - Pork, flour and sugar are leading retail prices down hill to the consumer.

come about since AAA had its wings clipped by the Supreme Court disclosed today that these three had dropped almost, if not entirely, the full amount of the processing taxes.

Flour was 7 cents cheaper on 12pound bags this week than the week before the AAA decision. Sugar was 5 cents cheaper for 10 pounds.

Pork was 3 to 6 cents a pound cheaper than the week before the AAA decision.

These prices, gathered from various retail and governmental sources, (billion.) show variations from section to section, however. It will be several weeks before any official study of the price changes due to AAA has been

completed for the entire country. Officials said there had not yet been time for the retail prices to readjust themselves since the removal of the processing tax.



In the farm implement industry, for example, employment in the first 10 months of 1935 was more than 21/2 times as great, and payrolls were more than 31/2 times as great as in the first 10 months of 1932. For industry as a whole, it is estimated that at least 40% of the increase in factory employment from 1932 to date is due to the improvement of rural purchasing power. In 1932 the farm cash income was \$4,328,000,000, as compared with an estimated farm cash income of \$6,800,000,000 for 1935.



A DJUSTMENT payments and increased income from cotton are en-abling farmers to retire and build up badly eroded and worn-out land. The new cotton contract provides that food and feed crops for home use, in addition to soil-building and erosion-control crops, may be grown on land stableld from cotton production.
