FIRMS FROM EAST CLAMOR FOR WOOL IN ANGELO AREA

SAN ANGELO, Texas, May 27.—A long anticipated wave of wool buying surged over West Texas ranges last week, more than 500,000 pounds being sold daily for a new six-year peak of 33c a pound. Spot purchases now total around 6,000,000 pounds. Texas spring clip is estimated at 65,000,000 pounds, 40 per cent of which is shorn now. Recent rains have assured good grazing and a fine quality of washed wool. The price so far has never gone below 30c a pound.

The famous violinist and his Chevrolet Musical Moments programs, have the distinction of going on the air from more than 100 stations more times than any other program in the history of radio. Three hundred and seventy-eight stations broadcast these times a week, a total of 1134 fifteen-minute programs. That figures out at 263 hours, and if one week's programs were broadcast one after the other, day and night, it would require 11 days. 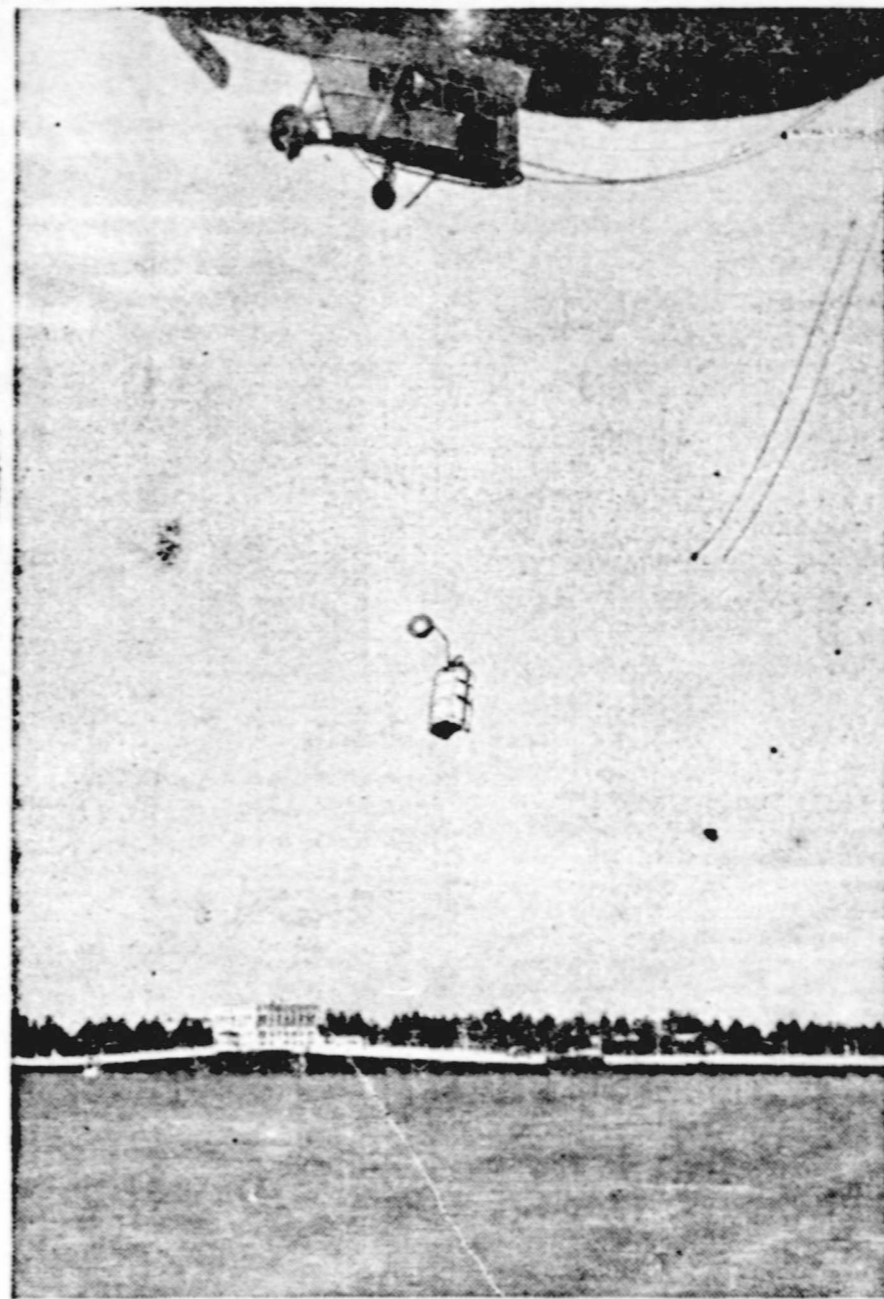
OUR 23 YEAR COLUMN

Aeronauts who witnessed the spectacular test were amazed that the refrigerator survived the terrific impact of the drop and came out without a single leak in its permanently sealed mechanism or a break in its cabinet, because, after all, they reasoned, household refrigerators are not supposed to be manhandled that way.

J. B. Walker, now in the service of the State Railway Commission, returned from Houston on Monday night, where he and others in the service had spent more than two weeks in the performance of their duties.

This is the first time J. B. had been in Houston in many years and he says it has grown into a magnificent city. He thinks it by far the largest city in Texas, but he has a great grievance to register. He says those Houston people are the most ignorant set as to the resources of this state of any people he has ever met. They do not know that there is anything west of Fort Worth. He says that if you undertake to tell them anything about the resources of West Texas, developed or undeveloped, they will give you a blank stare and begin to wonder what kind of a fool you are any way. He did not know that such dense ignorance and prejudice existed anywhere in the state; and it is just as dense among the higher-ups, he says, as it is among the lower strata of society.

Furthermore, he thinks the soil around Houston is about the poorest in the state, but he saw a lot of fine country and fine crops in other portions of South and Central Texas. —Tahoka News.
