BEMOAN AMERICAN VICTORY



This Terraplane captured the famous South Africa Golden Jublilee Road Race when it beat 41 other cars, including many European and American popular makes, recently. It was driven by two of South Africa's famous road racers, C. L. Engelbrecht

(left), and F R. H. Hopley (right). The victory of an American car in the Nairobi-Rand race is commented upon somewhat wistfully, if not sadly, by South African newspapers. The following, taken from the Cape Argus of Capetown is indicative of the feeling stirred by the failure of British manufacturers to capture this event. The article, which is written under the head "46 Miles an Hour" follows:


"Nothing for years has dealt such a shattering blow to the romantic tradition of a 'darkest Africa' as the Nairobi-Rand motor car race which ended last night. True the winners of this race down half a continent occasionally killed a leopard at 60 miles an hour, and in other ways the essential elements of romance were preserved in the race; but it remains an astonishing thing that men are now able to drive from Kenya to South Africa in less than two and a half days. Any driver who has ventured on a long country trip knows that it is exceedingly difficult to average 40 miles an hour over a stretch of 200 miles or so. The daring young men who have performed so well in this race covered 2800 miles at an average of 46. Dongas, leopards, giraffes, thunderstorms and other incidentals obviously meant little to them. The Africa of the fanciful povelist, the Africa of cannibals and

gorillas, is not the Africa that these racers traversed so swiftly.

"This Nairobi-Rand road race is one of the "side-shows" of the Empire Exhibition. As such it may be pardoned a trifle of flamboyance. Nobody will maintain that it was necessary or that its organizers aimed to prove anything in particular; it was arranged like a Roman circus to please the crowd. Yet the race has done more than provide a topic of talk for diners out; it has emphasized the sure efficiency of the American product. For almost 20 years this country has been asking the British motor manufacturer to produce a car designed for South African conditions, a car with adequate clearance, a sturdy chassis and horsepower sufficient to conquer hills and maintain a high average speed. Some of the British factories have responded, and some of their cars (built as always with that craftsmanship which only Britain seems to achieve) have come near satisfying the demands of this exacting country. But one must recognize that American principles of motor car manufacture have enjoyed a triumph in this road race. Relatively, the road race to the Rand has been a far greater success than the much publicised air race, since a dozen of the 42 cars finished within six hours of the winner. In an international contest the British manufacturer has not achieved that success which would have proved a valuable advertisement in these days of intensive commercial competition. The Empire Exhibition road race has rather unhappily exalted non-Empire products."







#### **MURDERER GIVEN 8 YEARS** IN BAILEY

#### Citizens of Muleshoe and surrounding area last week witnessed the culmination of a murder trial in Muleshoe in Bailey county, not only in the fact that it was filled with interested and curous spectators; but also on the fact that the trial witnessed the last chapter of approximately \$10,000 expense it had cost citizen taxpayers of this county to bring this

man to justice.

The actual cost of that trial, including a \$250 reward already paid was \$800 to Bailey county and \$510 to the State of Texas, including another reward of \$250, which the State had agreed to pay upon conviction. One sheriff, in his efforts to locate the offender, spent approximately \$4,000; two other sheriffs spent several hundred dollars each, while Bailey county during the past 18 years has appropriated several thousand dollars in an effort to locate the man and bring him to justice. The total cost of the trial held here last week was \$1,360, besides all these other sums expended-all of which came out of the pockets of the property owning tax-payers of this county. Ten thousand dollars would have met a large amount of other legitimate county expenses; but it had to be spent in behalf of justice. Few people stop to realize it; but crime in many counties, furnish the biggest single item of expense to taxpayers. Verily, crime doesn't pay, any way one looks at it .- Muleshoe





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
