


### FRIENDLY INSECTS THAT THE GARDEN NEEDS **Visit Texas Soon**

The impulse to kill anything seen in the garden that crawls or creeps should be modified, says House Beautiful, as much of this insignificant plant life is friendly in the extreme. The following minute garden visitors are welcome, as they feed on many larvae and adult pests. Lady bird beetles destroy lice and scale insects; hornets feed al-

most entirely on insects; frogs and toads go after slugs and insects; lizards live on small beetles; spiders like flies and small moths; wasp not only eat insects themselves but use them as food for their young; ground beetles dig through the earth for insects that go into the soil to pupate (rose bugs); bees carry pollen back and forth and are indispensable to
