

# **ORDINANCE NO 1154**

ISSUANCE OF A PERMIT AND with the provision hereof, and no por-THE PAYMENT OF A LICENSE tion of such license fee so paid shall FEE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE FURNISHING OF REPORTS BY ALL PERSONS, FIRMS AND COR-PORATIONS HEREINAFTER EN- this ordinance shall be punished by a GAGED IN THE OCCUPATION OF BUYING AND SELLING USED MOTOR VEHICLES AND EXEMPT- tion, and the pursuit of such occupa-ING CERTAIN BUSINESSES, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BROWNFIELD:

1. That from and after the passage of this Ordinance, any person, firm or corporation, before engaging in the occupation of buying for the purpose of re-sale, and of selling used automobiles, trucks or other motor vehicles within the corporate limits of the City of Brownfield, such person firm or corporation shall first apply to and obtain from the City Secretary a permit or license to engage in such occupation for a period of one year. Such permit shall be in writing, numbered, contain the name of the applicant, the location of place of business, and cover a period of one year from date, signed by the City Secretary under the City seal, a duplicate of which shall be filed in the office of the City Secretary.

2. The Annual license fee for such occupation shall be \$500.00 payable in advance, at the time the license is issued and before such occupation is pursued or carried on.

3. Such person firm or corporation from and after the beginning of such occupation shall thereafter file a monthly report with the city secretary of all used motor vehicles so purchased for re-sale, and such report shall contain a full description of such motor vehicles, including the name of the manufacturer, model, engine and license number and the name and address of the person from whom it was purchased.

4. This ordinance shall not apply to nor effect any person firm or corporation, who are authorized by manufactuerers to represent them as sellers of new cars, in the City of Brownfield as a dealer or agent selling new automobiles, and who, in connection with such automobile agency or dealership business, trades 49tfc shall it apply to such person, firm or corporation who have been regularly and in good faith engaged in the business of buying and selling second hand motor vehicles within the Corporate limits of the City of Brownfield continuously preceeding the passage of this ordinance. 



# Sen. Connally Urges Senate to Aid Farmers

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 6 .- In a successful effort to aid farmers who have Federal Land Bank loans, Senator Tom Connally on the floor of the Senate Tuesday pleaded for the lowering of the interest rate on commissioners' loans from 5 to 4 per cent, and the continuation of the present 31/2 per cent interest rate on regular loans.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 12 .- Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, states that infantile paralysis, like typhoid fever, is largely a summer disease. Although cases may occur during any month o fthe year, over half the total number come in July, August, September and October. To date, 69 cases of polimyelitis have been reported to the State Health Department in 1937.

Direct contact between persons regarded as being the chief factor in the sperad of infantile paralysis. Be-Eemery Longbrake, Scoutmaster of cause of the seasonal prevalence of the disease, flies and other insects have ben suspcted of conveying the virus or germ. Insect transmission has not, however, been demonstrated. Although animals are subject to paralysis, they are seemingly not susceptible to the human type of this paralytic disease. Carriers are difficult to determine; this fact makes advisable the reduction to a minimum

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis comprise headache, fever. and irritability, followed by neck or back stiffness. Prompt medical care, early recognition and reporting


