

Sheppard's analysis showed ! higher income from various sources, including gasoline tax, cigaret and liquor taxes, gross cil production taxes, gross receipts taxes, and sulphur taxes.

Simultaneously, members of the Senate's special subcommittee drafting preliminary state budgets were at work here, and Morris Roberts, of Pettus and Harold Feck, of Texarkana, members, declared their belief substantial reductions could be made in appropriations without impairing service. Roberts declared his studies already have convinced him that consolidation of duplicted work done by various departments, elimination of useless employees, and savings in buying supplies, can effectuate at least a 20 per cent cut in department budgets, which last biennium totaled about \$23,000,000. If Roberts' plan is adopted, a saving sufficient to retire the general fund deficit within two years, without additional revenue, could be made.

Deaf School Probe

Refusing to adopt a resolution offered by Rep. Lonnie Smith, Fort Worth, calling for resignation of T. M. Scott as superintendent of the State School for the Deaf, a special House committee has agreed to check further into the situation. The Board of Control, which supervises the State institutions, after listening with the committee to 25 charges of inefficiency against Scott, voiced by the Texas Asociation of the Deaf, also agreed to look thoroughly into the matter. Scott, long a state employe in various departments, has been superintended 15 years. The complaints charged he had refused to use the sign language in teaching deaf children, and that the school had a low standing. They declared Scott with only a high school education, is not qualified to direct the institution. Scott said he did no teaching, and therefore, did not require high educational qualifications. He declared the school enjoys a high ranking, said sign language teaching was unnecessary.







PITTSBURGH, April 28 .- Marijuana, foster parent of murder, sex crimes and holdups, today has become a nation-wide menace to the youth of America and a source of never ending worry to law enforcement agencies.

This cheap weed, growing wild and uncultivated in thousands of fields and vacant lots, present one of the most difficult problems the law enforcement agents has ever had to contend with.

The adaptability of the weed to any soil and its cheapness make it a constant menace in every city and state in the Union.

The Cost Is Cheap

Its abundancy brings it within the price range of everyone-including school children, who are anxious to show their friends they can "take it," without realizing the harm they are doing themselves-or their companions.

For as little as 15 cents a cigarette the crafty "smuggler" worms his goods into the hands of thrilled high school students who then sneak behind barns and buildings and "bodly" smoke the "reefers" as a taunt to their more timid playfellows.

So deadly are the effects of the weed the federal government itself is engaged in a battle to stamp it out at its source.

Under federal narcotic experts in Washington, groups of police from the various states are receiving training which will help them in their task of wiping out the sources of the evil weed.

Leads to Insanity






